

Patrol To Guard State Tree Lands

SALEM — The state forestry department does not contemplate the sale of Christmas tree stumpage from state-owned lands during the current holiday season with the exception of a contract that has been let involving trees on a road right-of-way and a small pilot project in thinning in Clackamas County, according to Vance L. Morrison, assistant state forester. An intensive patrol will be maintained throughout the entire cutting season in order to prevent trespass, he added.

"Last year this proved to be a very effective method of reducing tree losses," Morrison stated, "especially in the Tillamook burn where we are planting some five million trees each year and aerially seeding large areas in order to bring this huge burn back into production."

"During previous years, trespassers have completely denuded the original plantation of noble fir which was established during the winter of 1945-46 just south of the Wilson River Highway near Camp Rogers."

In order to prevent a repetition of such trespass an intensive patrol is to be maintained. It is possible that all forest roads into the burn will be closed and the same precautions taken in controlling entry as are taken during the high fire hazard periods of the summer. Patrols will also be maintained on all other state forests, the forester added.

He pointed out that cutting or removing trees from the land of another without permission is a misdemeanor and the individual is subject to both a fine and jail sentence. In addition state officials are supported in their activities by the 1957 law which requires individuals transporting more than five Christmas trees to have evidence of ownership. This includes the bill of sale, the name and address of the original owner, the number of trees purchased, and the description of the land. The only exceptions are where the individual owns the land or where a common carrier is involved.

Liquor Store Closings Set

At the November meeting of the Oregon liquor control commission, Chairman Hugh Kirkpatrick announced that all commission stores and agencies will close at 6 p.m. Dec. 24 and Dec. 31. In making the statement, Kirkpatrick said, "The commission will adopt this year the same closing hours for stores and agencies on Christmas Eve and New Year's Eve as it has followed for the past three years."

The commission also reminded all licensees that applications for 1961 licenses must be received by Dec. 14 to guarantee receipt of the new certificates prior to Jan. 1. V. G. Van Berge, OLC administrator, emphasized that licensees must have 1961 license certificates in order to operate after 12 midnight, Dec. 31.

Oregon Blue Book Lists More Charts, Statistics

The 1961-62 Oregon Blue Book, official biennial directory of state agencies and government activities, will contain more charts and statistics than ever before, according to word today from Secretary of State Howell Appling Jr. Publication is set for Jan. 15.

Principal changes will be an increased use of charts, maps, and statistical material and a reduction of space allotted to state department.

Containing 376 pages, the new book will be somewhat smaller than the last Centennial edition, but Appling emphasized "there will be no significant features omitted." He said the inclusion of more statistical illustrations "should add to the use and interest" of the publication. "A new page layout carried through the state agency section should make it much easier to locate needed information," he said.

Appling said several innovations in the new edition have been suggested by school librarians who replied to a questionnaire from his office last spring. The inclusion of more sociological statistics was the most frequent suggestion of school authorities, Appling said.

The cover for the new book will feature a photograph of the state's official tree, the Douglas fir in a mountainous timbered setting. Appling said the questionnaire to schools developed several suggestions to "keep the Blue Book blue" in reference to two editions of recent years that used yellow covers.

The new edition will mark 50 years of continuous publication of Oregon's official directory. The book has been issued by the secretary of state every two years since 1911. The first edition contained 135 pages, many photographs of Oregon's resources, and a directory of state agencies and the legislature.

New agencies, such as the State Marine Board, are included in the 1961-62 edition, while departments dissolved by the legislature have been dropped. District judges, who had a change in status as a result of an act of the 1958 legislature, will be pictured for the first time.

Editor for the new Blue Book is Dale Mallicoat, administrative assistant to Appling. He has been assisted by Mae McVay and Jane Hanson, secretaries in Appling's office.

There are approximately 451 boys and 284 girls enrolled at the Chemawa Indian School. About 100 of these children are from Alaska, while the remainder are from the Navajo Reservation, located in the southwestern part of the United States. Both groups are from areas where it is a struggle to provide for necessities, and where few luxuries are known.

The children would appreciate any items by any young people their ages. Among the suggestions made by the school principal are toys, games and books for the younger members; writing materials, good grooming articles, sewing kits, hobby crafts, coloring books, pictures, picture frames, and a multitude of other articles, including clothing, for the older groups.

Gifts may be sent unwrapped, but if wrapped they should be in plain paper.

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Doctor Of Year Is Named

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The American Medical Association (AMA) honored Maj. Gen. Howard McC. Snyder, President Eisenhower's physician, last night for his contributions to the President's health.

Snyder was given a silver cigarette case at a dinner for officers and members of the AMA's house of delegates. Eisenhower, in a letter read at the dinner, said the "American medical profession could not have chosen a better man to honor than Dr. Snyder."

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
