

# State Treasurer Receives \$12,629,206 in FS Money

SALEM (AP)—State Treasurer Howard C. Belton Wednesday announced he has received \$12,629,206 from the U. S. Forest Service. This is the annual 25 per cent share of the amount collected by the federal government from forest reserve rentals, sales of timber, and other sources.

The amount for the fiscal year that ended June 30 was up from the \$11,207,368 received in 1959. The money will be distributed to the various counties. It is apportioned with 75 per cent assigned to road funds and 25 per cent for school funds in the counties.

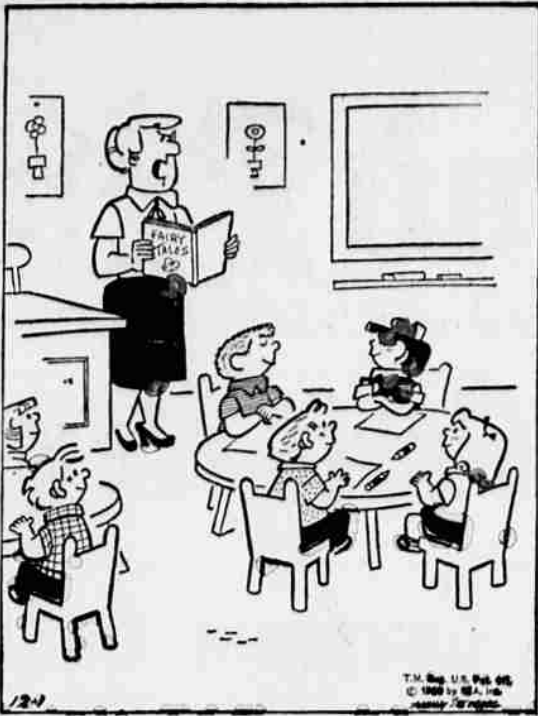
He replaces Robert B. Chessman, who has resigned. Chessman did not disclose his future plans but says he plans to remain in the printing and publishing business.

## Pine Company Closes Sawmill

BAKER (AP)—The North Powder Pine Company has closed down its sawmill and planer plant because of the declining timber market.

It is the third sawmill in this area to suspend operations. The Eastern Oregon Lumber Co. halted operations in June and the Baker Lumber Mill shut down in October. Some other sawmills in the Baker area are operating on an every-other-week or a four-day week schedule.

## Supreme Court Decision Backs Moonlighting Ban

SALEM (AP)—The Oregon Supreme Court, in a decision by Justice Alfred T. Goodwin, today upheld the right of Multnomah County Sheriff Francis Lambert to ban moonlighting by deputies.

This reversed a circuit court decision by Judge Alan F. Davis in the case of Kenneth E. Craft et al versus Lambert. Lambert had appealed.

Davis had granted an injunction suit brought by certain deputies which restrained Lambert from enforcing an order prohibiting moonlighting—the holding of another job.

The outside employment of the deputies is prohibited by law, but Davis held the statute unconstitutional.

# FBI Arrests Prospector For Murder

EUGENE (AP)—The Federal Bureau of Investigation today announced the arrest of Carl Michael Wilberding, 25, accused in Mono County, Calif., of the murder of a prospecting partner. Joseph Thornton, special agent in-charge of the Portland FBI office, said Wilberding was taken into custody Tuesday afternoon by agents and Eugene police who surrounded the home of a relative. Wilberding was unarmed and offered no resistance, Thornton said. He was arrested on a federal complaint charging unlawful flight to avoid prosecution for murder.

A warrant charging first degree murder was issued Aug. 26 at Bridgeport, Calif., Thornton said. The agent said he assumed Bridgeport was Wilberding's home town.

Thornton said California authorities accused Wilberding of killing Harley Lester Bollinger, a prospecting partner, near Hawthorne, Calif.

Agents locate another cache. LOS ANGELES (AP)—FBI agents have found another \$100,000 of sportsman Anthony Alessio. To date \$122,515 of the \$200,000 paid has been recovered.

Agents discovered the money Wednesday in a Los Angeles apartment occupied briefly by Frank Marrone, 31, one of five arrested suspects. The money was in a panel on the inside of a refrigerator door.

Alessio, kidnaped in San Diego Nov. 21, was freed unharmed after payment of the ransom.

Engineer Named. PORTLAND (AP)—Donald H. Westrick, 32, member of the Bonneville Dam technical staff for seven years, will be project engineer at Detroit Dam on the North Santiam River. His appointment was announced today by Col. Walter L. Winegar, Portland district engineer.

Westrick, a native of Longview, Wash., will succeed Walter A. Mackie who will become Bonneville Dam engineer next month.

Lisa June Oliver, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Eugene Oliver, weighed only 23 ounces when she was born June 29 at nearby Palmer, Tenn. Her weight dropped to 15½ ounces soon after.

This week she tipped the scales at 5 ounces over the 5-pound minimum when hospital authorities released her.

RANDON, Ore. (AP)—Five crewmen are recovering today from injuries they suffered Wednesday when their tug crashed into a rock jetty and sank.

The most serious injury, a broken ankle, was suffered by Charles May of Fort Dix, Calif. Skipper of the 117-foot, \$200,000 tug, Elizabeth Olson of Eureka, Calif.

May and nine crewmen were rescued by the tug Rebel which dashed into the breakers alongside the stricken vessel. They jumped to the safety of the Rebel's deck.

Another crewman, Paul Madson, was swept overboard, but he made it to the jetty. Thomas M. Miller of Coos Bay, local manager for the tug's owner, Oliver J. Olson Towboat Co., San Francisco, ran out along the jetty and helped Madson to safety.
