

LA Dodgers Hanging Loose; Ready To Swap For Lemon

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (UPI)—The Los Angeles Dodgers missed the boat on Roy Sievers but don't propose to get caught high and dry again on Jim Lemon.

"We had a shot at Sievers a year ago but we didn't get him and lost," said Dodger Vice-President Buzzy Bavasi. "Now Calvin Griffith tells us Lemon might be available and we're ready to make him an offer that's a cinch to strengthen his club."

Bavasi will offer the Washington-transferred Minnesota Twins a list of six players from which Griffith can choose three.

The six players are Jim Gilliam, Don Demeter, Bob Lillis, Danny McDevitt, Ed Palmquist and Jim Golden, a 20-game winner at St. Paul last season.

Considered pennant insurance, Bavasi feels the long-ball hitting Lemon, a right-handed swinger, could help the Dodgers at the Coliseum where they will have to play next year and perhaps even part of 1962 until the Chavez Ravine project is completed. More than that, Bavasi

thinks Lemon would mean another pennant for Los Angeles. He hit 38 homers and drove in 100 runs for the Senators last season.

The Dodgers, with nine outfielders on their roster already, are pretty popular people around the baseball meetings.

The White Sox offered them catcher Sherm Lollar, but got nowhere, although Bavasi did not rule out the possibility a deal might be made with the Yankees, who admit they're interested in Johnny Podres and Duke Snider.

Meanwhile, San Francisco and Cincinnati hopped on the bandwagon for Frank Bolling, then joining Milwaukee in a bidding contest that has made the Detroit second baseman the most sought-after player of the current meetings. All offers for Bolling were rejected by the Tigers.

Numerous Turn-Downs

There were numerous other turn-downs up and down the line. And it became rather frustrating. Frank Lane of the Indians and Bill Veck of the White Sox, nor-

mally two of the most active traders, packed up and went home.

The Pirates spoke with the Phillies. The world champs inquired about Jim Owens, Gene Conley and Dick Farrell, but nothing was done when the Phils found that Dick Stuart, Roman Mejias and Joe Christopher were the best they could hope for.

The Cubs are offering Frank Thomas around but have had no takers so far.

San Francisco is looking around for a catcher in addition to a second baseman but everyone wants catchers. The Giants again dangled Johnny Antonelli in front of the Yankees for Elston Howard or Johnny Blanchard. The Yanks still weren't interested.

Several clubs are inquiring about relief pitcher Bill Henry of the Reds, but Cincinnati would much rather do business for Joe Nuxhall or Billy Martin.

The Braves came up with Andre Rodgers for Daryl Spencer in proposition to which the Cardinals said no soap.

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'New Look' College Cagers Open Official Season Tonight

The "new look" college basketball season officially opens tonight in all parts of the country.

Last year the headlines went for the most part to Oscar Robertson of Cincinnati, Jerry West of West Virginia, Jerry Lucas of Ohio State, Darral Imhoff of California, Lennie Imhoff of Providence, Lee Shaffer of North Carolina, Tom Sanders of NYU, Tony Jackson of St. John's and Tom Stith of St. Bonaventure.

Of these, only Lucas, and Tom Stith and Jackson are back. Lucas is a junior, Jackson and Stith are seniors.

Expected to come to the fore are such players as Terry Dischinger of Purdue, Roger Kaiser of Georgia Tech, Bill (The Hill) McGill of Utah, Dave Debuschere of Detroit and a giant sophomore, 7-1 Lewis Qualls of Texas A&M.

Whether the Texas Aggies will threaten Texas for the Southwest Conference championship depends a lot on Qualls. He plays his first varsity game tonight, against Trinity of Texas.

The top opening night game is the Ohio State encounter with Ohio University. This will be the first appearance of the Buckeyes since they won the NCAA championship last March by beating California.

Hawaii Receives PCL OK

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (UPI)—The Pacific Coast League went shopping in Hawaii today for a buyer with \$55,000 who would operate a franchise in Honolulu.

The league voted Wednesday to transfer the defunct Sacramento franchise to Honolulu, but a pair of Salt Lake City men who originally thought of the plan to operate a club in the mid-Pacific, backed out of the deal.

According to PCL officials, the league preferred to have a Hawaiian group back the club. They envisioned little difficulty in finding a suitable backer.

"The Pacific Coast League will operate in Honolulu in 1961," said PCL President Dewey Soriano following day-long meetings. "There are still several arrangements to be straightened out, such as park lease and transportation."

Soriano said "there are three other groups, which I cannot identify at this time, who are very interested, and we know one of them is ready to put up the \$55,000 to buy the franchise."

Maurice Yates and Hal Tate, the Salt Lake City men who originally had wanted to buy the Sacramento team and move it to Honolulu, would not offer more than \$35,000 for the franchise.

Soriano said he would meet Friday in San Francisco with Chinn Ho, head of the Honolulu Stadium Corporation, to complete arrangements for use of the 22,000-seat ballpark.

Soriano said "directors of the Pacific Coast League are most enthusiastic about this operation. Honolulu will give the league the prestige city that is most necessary for continued operation at the Triple-A level."

The league president explained that it was probable that a 154-game schedule would be drawn up, with each mainland club making two trips to Hawaii—one for six games and one for five.

It was also reported that the Kansas City Athletics were interested in a working agreement with the Honolulu club, no matter who operates it.

Gothamites Still Seek Beaver Foe

NEW YORK (UPI)—Gotham Bowl officials are casting about for a possible opponent for Oregon State again today after Holy Cross formally rejected a bid to play in the Dec. 10 contest.

NEW YORK (AP)—The inaugural Gotham Bowl football game, scheduled to be played at Yankee Stadium Dec. 10, will not be held this year, bowl director Bob Reedy said today. The game was canceled because of failure to find an opponent for Oregon State College.

Bob Reedy, harassed promoter of the game scheduled to be played in Yankee Stadium, traveled to Worcester Wednesday to make his second invitation to Holy Cross in less than 24 hours. Reedy withdrew a previous invitation Tuesday night when he thought he was about to line up Colorado for the game.

"We're not going to any bowl," said Holy Cross Athletic Director Eugene Flynn. "They invited us once and we were considering it, but they pulled back the invitation before the kids even understood it."

Reedy indicated that he has several other possibilities in mind but refused to reveal what teams they are. In the meantime, time is running out on him.

Houston Club Prexy Waves Anti-Trust Suit Threat At NL

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (UPI)—The president of the Houston club in the American Association waved an antitrust threat at Commissioner Ford Frick and the National League today if they persisted in their efforts to keep the American League out of the Houston territory.

Angered by the stalemate in the negotiations with the National League group seeking to invade Houston, and by Frick's order Tuesday that the American League stay out of the territory, President W. H. Hopkins of the Houston Bulls sent off a stinging wire Wednesday to the commissioner and to President Warren Giles of the National League.

Hopkins, who owns the Houston territory, insisted that his group is free to negotiate with the American League in an effort to bring major league baseball to Houston.

Any "agreement or understanding" that would restrict the Houston territory exclusively to the National League would be regarded "as being in restraint of trade," Hopkins informed the baseball leaders.

The controversy arose with a report Monday that if the AL could not expand to Los Angeles in 1961, Houston might be considered as an alternative. (The American League gave no official credence to this report, however.)

No sooner did it appear when Frick and Giles declared that "any effort of the American League to go into Houston territory at this time would be a complete abrogation of all agreements and understandings in connection with the baseball program."

Frick said they would oppose any such efforts by the American League "with all the power at my command."

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PHILADELPHIA, Pa. (AP)—Coach Buck Shaw said today he is "talking his head off" in efforts to prevent a letdown by his Philadelphia Eagles, who need only a victory over the St. Louis Cardinals Sunday to win their first National Football League Eastern title since 1949.

"The Cardinals will be tough," Shaw said. "They've been improving right along. We're on top and everyone is after us. It's a real race."

"After two successive victories over New York and winning eight in a row it's a natural spot for a letdown and we'll have to fight it all the way."

Actually, the Eagles have three shots at the title. After playing at St. Louis, they have two more road games against Pittsburgh and Washington. They have beaten all three clubs at home this year.

"It's like being on the 3-yard line with three downs to go," Shaw said. "But I think we have to take one game at a time and assume it's the last one we're playing—that there's no second or third chance."

Shaw, 61, said a victory Sunday would mark a milestone in his long coaching career. He never has won a divisional title in 11 years of coaching professional football.

Shaw also announced that line-backer Bob Pellegrini, who had been out with injuries since Oct. 23, was now physically fit and would start. Thus allowing versatile Chuck Bednarik to return to center in the offensive platoon.

'Slippery Cip' Makes UI Debut

MOSCOW, Idaho (AP)—Joe Cipriano, the master of the fast-break when he starred for the Washington Huskies, promises the same brand of basketball in his debut as head coach of the Idaho Vandals.

Thursday night's opener is against Portland's Pilots.

Slippery Cip said his squad has a restyled attack that features "a modified fast-break" and an offensive press.

Baseball Wrangle Still On

NEW YORK (AP)—Baseball Commissioner Ford Frick and the presidents of the American and National leagues went back into another secret huddle today in an attempt to iron out expansion news but with a promised news blackout whatever the decision.

The 10-team American League for 1961 was the problem before Frick and American League President Joe Cronin and National League President Warren Giles. The Los Angeles situation, with Walter O'Malley of the National League's Dodgers blocking the way, was the center of the roadblock.

"There will be no statement of progress," said a spokesman for Frick.

A baseball rule providing that unanimous agreement must come from the 16 major league clubs before one league can invade a city with a big league club is the fly in the ointment.

The American League recently suggested that it go into Los Angeles next year, with a 10-team circuit. The Washington Senators' franchise is off to Minneapolis-St. Paul, with a new group of owners ready to open shop in the nation's capital.

The junior circuit also proposed an interleague schedule for 1961, delaying for a year the Los Angeles invasion, but the National League majority appears definitely opposed. So, the American League has gone back to the 10-team idea for 1961.

O'Malley, who shifted the Dodgers to Los Angeles from Brooklyn, is opposed to two major league teams in that city until the new Chavez Ravine Stadium is completed for his transplanted club.

The Ohio Bobcats, coached by William R. Hess, took half the eight first-place votes submitted by selectors from the eight NCAA districts. Lenoir-Rhyne of Hickory, N.C., was second and Humboldt (Calif.) State was third.

The Bobcats, from Athens, Ohio, play most of their games within the Mid-American Conference, but defeated Dayton 28-0, Boston University 36-6 and Xavier of Ohio 6-0.

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Richardson Assumes Job

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (UPI)—Sixty-five-year-old Tommy Richardson, who guided the Eastern League through many crises during his 26 years as president, today assumed the job of running the International League.

Richardson was elected president of the International League Wednesday as successor to 77-year-old Frank Shaughnessy, who retired Monday. Richardson signed a one-year contract for \$15,000.

"I feel fortunate to follow in the footsteps of a man like Mr. Shaughnessy," said Richardson. "He has helped make the International League one of the finest in the country and I shall do everything possible to keep it that way."

"Naturally, I am leaving the Eastern League with misgivings because I have had many pleasant associations there during the last 26 years," he continued. "This was an opportunity to move up the ladder, however, and I am delighted at the chance."

NWC, OCC Quintets Vie In Tourneys

PORTLAND (AP)—Northwest Conference and Oregon Collegiate Conference basketball teams will compete in the NAIA district 2 Tipoff Tournament in Portland and Salem tonight.

Pacific will meet Portland State and Oregon Tech will play Lewis and Clark in the Portland half of the tourney at Lewis and Clark College.

At Salem it will be Linfield vs. Southern Oregon and Willamette vs. Oregon College of Education. The winners and the losers will meet Friday at the same gym. The championship game is scheduled for 9:30 p.m. at Salem Saturday.

Willamette, the defending tourney champion, was last year's Northwest Conference titlist. Portland State was co-champion of the Oregon Collegiate Conference.

Eastern Oregon of the OCC gets its season under way Friday at Reno against Nevada. College of Idaho and Whitman of the Northwest Conference also will open their seasons. College of Idaho will go against Eastern Washington at Cheney tonight and against Gonzaga at Spokane Friday. Whitman will play Eastern Washington Friday.

AP Little All-Americans Cited; Madden Honorable Mention

NEW YORK (AP)—A line that averages 220 pounds and a backfield that gained over three miles in yardage this season highlight the 1960 Little All-Americans selected by The Associated Press.

Center Dick Greeni, a 233-pound senior center from Ohio University and already drafted by the Cleveland Browns, and Doug Brown, a 246-pound guard from Fresno State, drafted by both the National Football League's Los Angeles Rams and Dallas of the American League, head the line.

They are joined by a repeater from the 1959 team, end Tom Hackler, a 212-pounder from Tennessee Tech, and Erie, Tenn.

Dale Mills, a senior from Northeast Missouri State Teachers who gained 1,343 yards this season and has a career total of 4,502, heads the "traveling" backfield. Mills' career total easily betters the record of 3,943 established by Luther College's Brad Hustad. He is a Columbia, Mo., native.

The quarterback is Paul Terhes, a senior from Bucknell, and hailing from Milford, Pa. He is tabbed an almost sure-shot to make the pros after completing 87 of 155 passes for 981 yards and nine touchdowns this year. In addition he gained 141 yards running and scored 26 points.

Charles (Tornado) Fuller of San Francisco State and Muskingum's Bill Cooper round out the backfield. Fuller, from Vallejo, Calif., had a 7.2-yard average as he gained 892 running and another 182 passing.

The other end is John Simko, from Augustana, in South Dakota. The Sioux Falls, S. D., native, a senior who weighs 190, snagged 12 passes during a rain-drenched game this year against North Dakota.

The tackles — a pair of 220-pounders — are Chattanooga's Charles Long and Willie Crafts from Texas A&L. Long is a senior from Pylfe, Ala., while Crafts is a junior and comes from Brownsville, Tex.

Brown, from Long Beach, Calif., is joined at guard by George Asleson of Iowa State Teachers from Charles City, Iowa. He weighs 210 and is a senior.

Greeni, who is on the East squad in the annual East-West game, also hulked the unbeaten Ohio University team that beat two major opponents in addition to winning the Mid-America Conference title.
