SHA Honors '60 Gridders With Banquet

A full house was on hand at Sacred Heart Academy Wednesday night to honor coach Marv Delplanche and his 1960 football players with a big feed and an awards presentation ceremony.

The banquet was sponsored by the SHA Boosters Club, under the direction of president Frank Rieky who emceed the affair, and the Sacred Heart Mothers' Club. Twenty-four Trojan gridders including seven seniors, 10 juniors, four sophomores and three freshmen received SHA block letters from coach Delplanche who is in his first season as Trojan coach.

Also receiving letters were team managers Jim Hatfield and Jim Novak. The crowd, which included speaker Rex Hunsaker of Oregon Tech and a number of other special guests, enthusiastically approved the selection of a trio of players named to receive special awards.

Selected as the "Most Inspirational Player" on the squad was 116-pound sophomore linebacker Junior Hurlley. He accepted the award from Chuck Bailey, a past president of the booster organization.

Jerry DeNault, a junior who also figures strongly in the SHA basketball plans, received the "Most Improved Player" award from guest Hi Hatfield, who at the same time was lauded for his work with SHA Jayvee athletic squads.

Father Beagan, cited by coach Delplanche as the staunchest supporter on the SHA staff, presented junior Mike Holland, an all-league fullback his award as the "Most Valuable Player."

The letter-winners, each of whom drew a comment from his coach, included seniors Johnny Jackson and Ken Moty, Trojan co-captains; Jim Cox, Con Fitzgerald, Mike Slawey, Roland Bailey, and Bob Amberg; juniors Mike Arne, Shan Britton, John Brunner, DeNault, Holland, Dave MacGregor, Vic Milani, Keith Murray, John Phillips, and Dick Wiles; sophomores Doug Murray, Mike Gralian, Hurlley and Elmo LeBeau, and freshmen Chuck McNoise, Bob Neeley and Marvin Davis.

Backing them up are Johnny Jackson, 5-5, and Bob Amberg, 5-9, both seniors; Milani, Shan Britton, 5-10, and Mike Arne, 5-5, all juniors; and sophomore Doug Murray, a 5-10 forward. Football injuries may plague the Trojans for their first few games. Slowly is relegated to limited duty because of an ailing knee and LeBeau has a troublesome back.

While the Bly Bobcats lack height and beef they should make up for it with good speed and agility. The tallest man on the club is 6-1 center Bob Washburn. At 162 pounds he is also the heaviest man.

A pair of guards, Jim Hall, 5-10, and Bill Pruitt, 5-9, were the only two lettermen on the scene when brand new coach Gene Christiansen took over this year. Christiansen named as his probable starting forwards Dan Thompson and Bob Hathaway, both 5-10.

The young Bobcat mentor feels that his first five will be able to go with the best in the league but is frankly worrying about the lack of depth on the Bly bench. Mike Crawford, and Jim Watts, both 5-10, and Merle Clemens, Ted Nelson, and Ted Stafford, all 5-8, round out his 10-man crew.

Gilchrist coach Les Martin expects to floor a well-balanced ball club when he opens against Paisley Friday night. He has a pair of senior lettermen back from last year's squad and his other three starters show signs of determination and hustle that may offset their lack of height.

Gerald Warren and Eric Erikson, 5-11 and 5-9 respectively, will lead the squad experience-wise and could also provide an interesting duel for high-scoring honors. Jon Harris, a 5-11 junior, will handle a forward post as will Mike Hazelwood, a 5-9 senior. Warren will also operate as a forward in Martin's planned offense.

Erikson and Mike Elms, a 5-9 senior, will hold down guard spots. Martin's second five includes Jerry Goodwater a 5-11 sophomore, Jim Sample, a 5-11 senior, and juniors Tyra Hitt, 5-10, Max Bishop, 5-7, and Bill Taylor, 5-9. A squad of 12 Jayvee ballplayers, including some good height, shows more promise, said Martin, who serves as the JV handle as well.

The current crop of Grizzlies shows an aptitude that prompts Martin to feel he will play his Jayvees in scheduled contests with little LaPine this season.

Only two lettermen, senior-Henry Dearborn, a 5-9 forward, and junior Denny Ellis, 5-11, also a front court man, are back to form the nucleus of coach Erv Ellis' Bonanza Antler squad.

Middle Back, Gopher Guard Lead UPI All-America Grid Selections

NEW YORK (UPI) — United Press International today presents the finest 11 collegiate football players in the land, its 1960 All-America team.

Chosen by the ballots of a record number of 402 sports writers and broadcasters from all parts of the nation, these are the players selected as the best at their positions this season:

Ends: Mike Ditka, Pittsburgh, and Dan Larose, Missouri

Tackles: Bob Lilly, Texas Christian, and Ken Rice, Auburn

Guards: Tom Brown, Minnesota, and Joe Romig, Colorado

Center: E. J. Holub, Texas Tech

Quarterback: Jake Gibbs, Mississippi

Halfbacks: Joe Bellino, Navy, and Ernie Davis, Syracuse

Fullback: Bob Ferguson, Ohio State

Bellino and Brown are the big guns on the mythical eleven, the answer to any football coach's dream. The Navy halfback received a total of 4,010 votes to

lead the balloting in the annual UPI poll, which this year set a record for the number of participants. The previous highest number of voters was 354 last year.

Bellino was named on all but 27 of the ballots, receiving 332 first team votes and 23 for second. Brown rolled up a total of 3,283 to lead the linemen by a wide margin. Eleven points are awarded for a first-place vote and six for a second.

East Dominates Team

For the first time since World War II seasons, when Army was the national gridiron power, the East dominates this all-star team with three players — Davis and Ditka in addition to Bellino.

The Midwest, Southwest and South are represented by two players each while one player each was chosen from the Rockies and the Midlands. Only the Far West of the seven geographical sections of the nation was shut out.

Brown and Ferguson are from the Midwest, Lilly and Holub

from the Southwest, Rice and Gibbs from the South, Romig from the Rockies and Larose from the Midlands.

There are no repeaters from the 1959 UPI All-America as all the players on that team were seniors. However, Davis was on the 1959 UPI second All-America team and Rice on the third.

Eight of the 11 players on the 1960 team are seniors, Romig, Davis and Ferguson are juniors.

Guard Race Close

The closest contest for a first team position was for the guard spot opposite Brown. Romig won by 68 points over Al Vanderbush of Army.

It's a well-balanced team, not only with brawn, but brains as well. The team averages 214 1/2 pounds per man, the line averaging 223 1/2 pounds and the backfield 198 pounds. It is a tall team, too, averaging over 6 feet in height per player.

On the basis of players named to the first three teams, the South dominated the all-star selections

with a total of eight players. There are six each from the Midwest and Southwest, five from the East, four from the Far West, three from the Rockies and one from the Midlands.

UO, UW Dominate All-Coast Choices

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Washington and Oregon, both headed for post-season bowl games, landed three players each on the 1960 Associated Press All-West Coast Football Team.

The Rose Bowl bound Huskies landed guard Chuck Allen, one of two repeaters from 1959, center Roy McKasson and halfback Don McKeta.

Oregon, which plays in the Liberty Bowl at Philadelphia, had tackle Steve Barnett, one of three sophomores on the all-star team, guard Dave Urell and all purpose quarterback Dave Grosz.

Southern California's 230-pound Marlin McKeever repeats at an end position, with Washington State's sophomore pass catching phenom Hugh Campbell getting the nod at the other terminal.

A pair of Steves won the tackle positions—Barnett of Oregon and Bauens of UCLA.

No less than three triple threat backs were named in the vote of the AP West Coast board.

Grosz can run, pass and punt plus operating Oregon's T-formation.

Bill Kilmer of UCLA and sophomore Terry Baker of Oregon State can do the same, but they both

operate as tailbacks in single wing offenses.

McKeta's selection could surprise many, because in headlines he's been overshadowed by teammates. Over and over opposing coaches declared, "He's the guy that gets the yardage on those crucial third down situations. He'd run right through a tree if it were in his way."

Injuries kept two members of the

1959 team from repeating. All America quarterback Bob Schloredt of Washington suffered a broken collar bone in mid-season, and ankle injuries kept Keith Lincoln of Washington State from showing his true ability.

The 1960 squad, chosen from teams rated major by the NCAA, includes three sophomores, one junior and seven seniors. From end to end the average weight is 209, with McKeever the heaviest and Campbell, at 183, the lightest. But the WSU end set two NCAA records this season with 66 receptions for 881 yards.

This multi-talented backfield averages 191 pounds with quarterback Grosz the heaviest at 200 and McKeta the lightest at slightly over 180.

In most cases the voting was close, with only two unanimous choices—McKasson and Baker. Kilmer was named to the first team on all but one ballot.

This year's team was balloted by the eight members of the AP West Coast board. These members are Art Rosenbaum, executive sports editor of the San Francisco Chronicle; Don Klein, sports editor of KCBS, San Francisco; Morton Moss, Los Angeles Examiner; Bill Brundige, KHJ, Hollywood; Harry Missidine, sports editor of the Spokane, Wash., Spokesman-Review; Rod Belcher, sports director KING-TV, Seattle; George Pasero, sports editor of the Oregon Journal, Portland; and John Carpenter, KOIN-TV, Portland.

Schloredt and Lincoln weren't the only promising stars hampered by injuries. So many good tackles were hurt, the race for the all-star position, with no less than 14 receiving either a first or second-team mention from a board member.

PSC Viks To Go With Experience

PORTLAND — Coach Sharkey Nelson is expected to throw an experienced lineup at youthful Pacific tonight when Portland State College makes its first appearance of the 1960-61 basketball season in the District 2 NAIA Tip-Off tournament at Lewis and Clark College. Game time is 7 p.m.

The Vikings will continue to participate in the Tip-Off tourney Friday when they will meet either Lewis and Clark or Oregon Tech, depending upon the outcome of Thursday's first round games. PSC winds up Tip-Off action Saturday in the final round, which is set for Willamette University in Salem.

Scheduled to start for the Vikings against Pacific in the season opener are Don Bridges, 6-2 senior, and Bill Turner, 6-5 sophomore, at forwards; Jack Bertell, 6-5 sophomore, at center; and Don Powell, 5-9 junior, and Eldon Lathi, 6-0 junior, at guards.

This is an all-letterman group and includes three regulars, Bridges, Powell, and Bertell, off last year's team. Bridges was PSC's leading scorer, top rebounder, and a District 2 NAIA all-schools a year ago.

star choice last season, while Powell finished second on the team in scoring and earned all-star rating in the Oregon Collegiate Conference.

The Vikings are riding a 'ten-game winning streak against the Badgers and have not lost to their first round foes since the 1953-54 season. Pacific, on the other hand, will be attempting to break a 37-game losing streak, against all opposition, which extends over two seasons. Portland State notched a 58-33 victory in the only meeting between the two schools a year ago.

DETROIT (AP) — The power, as far as the National Basketball Association is concerned, still rests in the East.

This was proved again Wednesday night as the Boston Celtics smashed the Detroit Pistons 125-110 and Syracuse, third-ranked in the Eastern Division standings, whipped St. Louis, the top team in the Western Division, 135-126. Both games were played in Detroit's Olympia Stadium.

The victory was the ninth straight for Boston, top team in the Eastern Division with 14 wins and only three losses. The Celtics now hold a 1 1/2 game lead over second-place Philadelphia and are 7 1/2 ahead of Syracuse.

Syracuse collected its sixth triumph in 16 games and gave the Hawks their second loss in a row and sixth in 18 games.

The Hawks now hold a slim three-game lead over second-place Los Angeles in the Western Division standings.

Klamath County basketball breaks out on two fronts Friday night when all eight Klamath County teams converge on either Henley or Chiloquin for the first round of the annual County Jamboree.

The Henley Hornets play host to Bonanza, Merrill and Malin while the Chiloquin Panther gym will take care of Sacred Heart, Gilchrist and Bly.

With the exception of the Fly-Gilchrist encounter Friday night none of the games will count in regular season action. The Grizzle-Bobcat tussle, the first on the slate at Chiloquin, counts because of the obvious travel difficulties the two clubs would experience in a later meeting.

At Henley, Bonanza and Malin tangle in the evening's opener, followed by Henley versus Merrill in the nightcap. At Chiloquin a Panther-Trojan match is the second game scheduled.

The tourney will continue through Saturday night with the losers of the Friday games meeting in the opener, followed by a clash between the Friday winners in both gyms.

Henley, a member of the Rogue League, is an A-2 school, but will include games with the County B representatives, throughout the season. The Hornets league opener is against Rogue River there Jan. 6.

Among the county schools, the Chiloquin Panthers get the nod as favorite from the enemy coaches, although the Malin Mustangs, the state's defending B champions, could easily take over the top spot.

Both the Chiloquin and Malin teams have good height although the Panthers can summon up an advantage in experience.
