The tax collector's office is snowed under by 10 boxes of mail, Sheriff J. M. Britton reported Wednesday. The sheriff said \$5,288,658.96 in taxes was certified for collection of that amount, \$3,320,326.57 had been counted by Wednesday afternoon.

Five Inches Of Rain Hits Northern California Area

DUNSMUIR — A deluge continued to fall in Southern Siskiyou County and Northern Shasta County as a storm's epicenter swept over the area Thursday morning. A total of 5.01 inches of rain had fallen on Castella, six miles south of here, in the 24 hours ending about 8 a.m., the U.S. Weather Bureau Station at Mount Shasta reported.

At Weed, residents of the residential area around Walnut and College avenues were diking furiously to keep water from their homes. The trouble was caused by runoff from the new county road and a graded area where housing will be constructed near College of the Siskiyou.

Motorists traveling Highway 99 were stopping near Black Butte Summit to put on chains. Heavy snow was falling there, the California Highway Patrol reported. Patrolmen said, however, that the snow is wet and not extremely troublesome.

Snow level dropped from 5,000 to about 3,500 feet during the night. Heavy rains caused streams to rise rapidly. The Sacramento River at Dunsmuir rose five feet near the railroad roundhouse, but was reported well beneath the flood level.

The weather bureau reported a total of 3.85 inches of rain had fallen at Mount Shasta and Dunsmuir, 3.69 at McCloud and 3.35 at Weed.

Volmers, about 25 miles south of Dunsmuir in the Sacramento River Canyon, received 5.09 inches, retaining its traditional leadership as the rainiest spot in the state. Weathermen said the storms should taper off during the next 24 hours.

DA Motions To Dismiss Huitt Case

The district attorney Thursday morning filed a motion to dismiss the concealing stolen property case against Ralph David Huitt, 30, Beatty. Huitt was indicted by the grand jury four times and is entering his sixth month in jail.

In filing the motion to dismiss four days before the trial was scheduled to begin, District Attorney Dale T. Crabtree said, "It is not possible to prove beyond a reasonable doubt that Huitt knew the property (six rifles belonging to Morgan Gadowa of Beatty) had been stolen at the time he had it in his possession."

Crabtree indicated that an important witness could not be located and that "important new facts" had become available during the pre-trial investigation.

After the fourth grand jury indictment, Huitt's attorney, Richard Beesley, had moved to quash the indictment. Deputy District Attorney Max L. McMillin had argued against the motion on the basis that Huitt had entered a plea and the trial date was set.

The district attorney's motion to dismiss, therefore, came as a distinct surprise to the circuit court.

Beesley was out of town Thursday and could not be reached for comment. Crabtree and McMillin are attending a District Attorney's Conference in Portland Thursday and Friday.

Judge David R. Vandenberg said a hearing on the motion would be held Monday. He said he would have "no choice but to grant the motion."

Hearing Held In Fight Case

Appointment of Floyd L. Wynne as executive editor and managing editor of the Herald and News was announced today by William B. Sweetland, publisher. Wynne has been acting as managing editor of the newspaper since July. In his capacity, he supervises the entire news gathering and photographic staff of the Herald and News.

Included are nine full-time staff members and 27 correspondents in the 100-mile area covered by the newspaper circulation. Wynne joined the Southern Oregon Publishing Company in September, 1948, as sports director for radio station KFLW. He became city editor of the Herald and News in April 1957. Married and the father of two boys, Steven and Robert, Wynne is concluding a four-year term as city councilman.

In addition to Wynne, other newspaper personnel include Dean Krenz, news editor, from Kalispell, Mont., who recently joined the staff; Wayne Scott, sports editor; Ruth King, food and church editor; Helen Bechen, society editor; staff reporters Norm Cardoza and Guy Farmer and Mrs. Barbara Schiffman, receptionist. The staff includes two photographers, Wesley Guderian and Donald Kettler.

At the same time, Sweetland announced the appointment of Jack Morgan, Nephi, Utah, as office manager of the Herald and News. Morgan has majored in accounting at Brigham Young University in Provo, Utah. He will bring his wife, Donna Mae, and daughter Suzanne, 1, to Klamath Falls as soon as living accommodations are secured.
