

Owls Tripped By Pioneers; Wilson Captures Fans' Eye

PORTLAND (Special)—A brilliant individual effort by little Leon Wilson couldn't overcome a decided Lewis and Clark edge in depth and rebounding as Oregon Tech fell before the Pioneers, 84-68, in the first round of the District 2 NAIA Tipoff tournament here Thursday.

Wilson earned the plaudits of the partisan crowd for his sparkling play and was felt by most impartial observers to be the outstanding player on the floor.

The speedy Owl ace paced all scorers with 25 points, while hitting 11 of 24 shots from the floor. In addition to pacing OTI in the point column, Leon continually harassed the taller Pioneers on defense, came up with seven rebounds, and set up the Owl attack.

He was followed in the point column for Oregon Tech by hook-shot specialist Gene Branson who had 17 and Van Zilek with 13.

Bob Petersen was limited to four points, but more than held his own on the backboards by leading all rebounders with 18 recoveries. He was paired against LC's Bob Fox, the leading rebounder in the Northwest Conference last season, and edged him by two grabs in their individual battle.

The hustling Owls, who caught the fancy of the crowd with their determined play, trailed by only

three points at 35-33 when the halftime buzzer sounded.

They stayed with the Pioneers early in the second half until a

strong bench and rugged rebounding shot the winners into a commanding lead.

Oregon Tech held a pair of leads in the first period, one at 11-5, and their final bulge at 22-19.

The top pointmaker for Lewis and Clark was guard Ron Langos who hit for 17. He was closely followed by Mike Vermillion with 16 and Bert Lundmark with 15.

LC enjoyed a lopsided 73-46 edge in rebounds. Shooting percentages from the field favored the victorious Pioneers, 39.0 to 33.9.

The Owls meet youthful Pacific University of the NWC in the consolation bracket semifinals of the tourney tonight at 7 o'clock.

Portland State of the OCC downed Pacific 61-45. At Salem, Willamette of the Northwest Conference defeated Oregon College of Education 85-73 and Southern Oregon of the OCC nosed out Linfield 82-77. In addition to the game between the first night winners, OCE and Linfield will clash tonight.

'Van' Packs Eagle Hopes

ST. LOUIS (AP)—The Philadelphia Eagles hope to move into the Eastern Conference football throne room Sunday — just as they did 11 years ago — with a "Van" carrying much of the load.

Steven Van Buren, one of the greatest ball carriers in National Football League history, spurred the Eagles to the conference and league championships back in 1949.

This season the Eagles' fortunes ride on the accurate throwing arm of Norm Brocklin, the resourceful Dutchman.

In between the two "Vans," with a few exceptions in the middle '50s, Eagle fans had little to cheer about. Philadelphia started to make headway with the advent of Van Brocklin, just as it had in the '40s with the arrival of Van Buren as a full-fledged star.

The Eagles, under Greasy Neale, posted a 12-1 record in 1949. They beat the Rams 14-0 at Los Angeles for the world championship as Van Buren piled up 198 yards in mud and rain.

This season, with Buck Shaw in command, the Eagles own an 8-1 record. A victory over the St. Louis Cardinals here Sunday means the Eastern title and a shot at the world championship.

Sea Of Mud Faces Bucs, Lumberjacks

EUREKA, Calif. (UPI)—Humboldt State and Whitworth College of Spokane, Wash., two of the few unbeaten college grid teams in the country, clash here Saturday night in an NAIA play-off battle.

To the winner will go an invitation to play in the national championship Holiday Bowl for small colleges at St. Petersburg, Fla., on Dec. 10.

The prospects are strong that the game will be played on a sea of mud at Albee Field. Heavy rains for the past week have made it almost impossible to dry out the field.

However, a crowd of close to 10,000 is expected to jam the little stadium which normally seats only 6,500. About 2,000 additional bleachers have been installed. And standing room will be arranged for others.

The game figures to feature the passing attack of Whitworth, with Denny Spurlock doing the throwing and John Murio the catching, against the all-around running and passing game of Humboldt State.

The visitors from Spokane have a win streak of 13 in a row going, while Humboldt State has won 19 in succession.

The Humboldt backfield offers Freddie Whitmore, the little all-Coast ace to do the signal-calling and passing; and the running of halfback Cecil Stephens and fullback Ed White.

Pilots Beat Tough Quint

PORTLAND (AP)—Idaho kept the University of Portland's feared big men under control but a little man broke loose in the waning minutes to bring a 53-50 victory to Portland in an opening basketball game Thursday night.

Idaho's nemesis was Frank Bosone, who plunked in a field goal to cut Idaho's lead to 47-46, then followed with another to put Portland in front 48-47 with 2:20 minutes remaining. Bosone led scoring with 14 points.

Idaho held 6-10 Bill Garner to 10 points and 6-5 Jim Altenhofen to 12. Idaho's 6-8 Ken Maren led his team with 13 points.

AP All-America Stars Bellino; Kilmer Rates 2nd Team Spot

NEW YORK (AP)—A mammoth line and a backfield built around Navy's Joe Bellino, the Heisman Award winner, highlight the 1960 All America announced today by The Associated Press.

With Bellino in the backfield are Jake Gibbs, Mississippi; Pervis Atkins, New Mexico State; and Bob Ferguson, Ohio State.

The line is composed of Dan Larose, Missouri, 221 pounds; and Mike Ditka, Pitt, 218; end; Ken Rice, Auburn, 250; and Bob Lilly, Texas Christian, 244; tackles; Tom Brown, Minnesota, 234; and Ben Balme, Yale, 215; guards; and Roy McKasson, Washington, 205; center.

The team was selected on the graded recommendations of eight regional boards of sports writers and newsmen who also voted on the top ten throughout the season. All games through Nov. 34 were taken into account.

Bellino was a standout in a season in which, generally, attention centered on the line rather than the backfield. He scored 110 points for Navy's Orange Bowl-bound team, including 18 touchdowns, and gained 834 yards rushing, 290 yards catching 17 passes, and threw five passes for 112 yards.

The 5-8, 181-pound halfback wound up his academy career in a blaze of glory by intercepting a pass on the goal line in the closing moments of the Army-Navy game, saving Navy's 17-13 lead.

Aikins, 25, a wingback, carried the ball 65 times for 611 yards in New Mexico State's unbeaten season. He caught 34 passes for 468 yards. He stands 6-1 and weighs 190 and was drafted before his senior year by the Los Angeles Rams.

Ferguson, the only junior on the team, is a 217-pounder who was moved from halfback to fullback and crashed through for Ohio State with 13 touchdowns and 833 yards rushing.

Gibbs, who weighs 185, completed 66 of 109 passes for 970 yards and 13 touchdowns, and wound up the regular season by connecting on 12 of 18 passes against Mississippi State. He also was rated the most dangerous runner on an unbeaten but once led team, and is a good punter as well.

Not far behind the first team backfield comes a second team combination of Francis Tarkenton, Georgia; Bill Kilmer, UCLA; Ron Bull, Baylor; and Ernie Davis, Syracuse.

End Ditka, who caught 11 passes for 229 yards and two touchdowns, was most feared for his hard tackling and blocking. Buddy Parker of the Pittsburgh Steelers called him "the best college player in the country." Larose, at the other end, caught 10 passes for 151 yards and two touchdowns, and recovered six fumbles.

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Packer 'Golden Boy' Closing On NFL Scoring Mark

GREEN BAY, Wis. (AP)—A former Notre Dame great who reached pro stardom while entertaining thoughts of quitting last year is on the verge of shattering an old National Football League scoring record.

Paul Hornung, Green Bay Packers' "Golden Boy," needs just 10 more points to set an individual scoring mark. He gets his next crack at the record against the Bears in Chicago Sunday and then will have chances in two more games.

Hornung, NFL scoring king with 94 points in 1959, has piled up 129 in nine games this year on 11 Lisle Blackburn and then Ray McLean. Hornung was shifted point conversions and 11 successful in the backfield and per-

formed capably. When Vince Lombardi took over as coach last year, he immediately made Hornung a permanent halfback.

"If things hadn't gone well last year I would have quit," Hornung said recently. "The situation was pretty hopeless up here, before Vince Lombardi came and I was fed up."

Hornung decided to give it one more year when Lombardi became coach. He soon found out, he says, that "Lombardi makes football more enjoyable."
