

# Educator Says Problem Of Federal Aid Obsolete

COTTAGE GROVE, Ore. (AP)—The controversy over federal aid to higher education long has been outmoded, a college president said Thursday night.

Furthermore it is a time-consuming burden to educators who know colleges need all the money sources they can get — private, state and federal—to meet their growing needs, said John D. Millett, president of Miami University of Oxford, Ohio.

Millett told the Pacific Northwest Assembly, a group of educators and others interested in education, that:

"Perhaps it is a sign of our times and an indication of the weakening in the self-reliance of individuals and private groups and state government, that we who are administrators of institutions of higher education and we who are vitally concerned with the welfare of those institutions should have to spend so much time debating the merits of federal government financial assistance."

He said federal assistance already was accepted in a variety of forms and was almost certain to become more important in the years ahead.

He also said:

"The financial well-being of our colleges and universities is an urgent national necessity. Under such circumstances it is not reasonable to expect that some of the increased requirements for enlarged operating and capital income should be obtained from the federal government?"

Fifty-nine persons are participating in the conference, which will continue into Sunday.

# Sanitary District Vote Monday

Seven candidates have filed for a position on the South Suburban Sanitary District Board of Directors, and an election will be conducted all day Dec. 5 in the district's headquarters, 2321 Gettle Street.

One man will be picked for a three-year term on the three-man board. Terms are staggered so that one is elected each year.

The members are the incumbent candidate, Fred Lewis, and Walter Nitzel and Carl Yancey. Candidates, besides Lewis, are Art Anderson, Raymond Bramwell, Raymond Broilner, William N. Goen, Ned Putnam and George (Al) Schriber.

The board is expected to face some considerable problems during the coming year, including a \$250,000 lawsuit brought against the district by Lee Hoffman Inc., Beaverton, maintaining the district owes for gravel used in pipeline construction and that the district deleted more than the maximum allowable percentage of work from a contract for construction of a sewerage in the unincorporated area.

Only residents of the area served by the district who own property and who are registered voters will be allowed to cast ballots.

The Herald and News has received statements from five of the candidates. All were queried. Their backgrounds and statements follow in alphabetical order:

Arthur E. (Art) Anderson has been a resident of Klamath Falls for the past 23 years. He came here from Bend.

He is a veteran of World War II Navy service and is active in several civic and fraternal organizations. He is past president of Employee's Federal Credit Union and has been a board of directors member for nine years. He has worked with Boy Scouts, Job's Daughters and is a Masonic and Elks Lodge member.

Anderson, a South Suburban area resident for three years, says he filed to the office because some things need to be corrected immediately. Residents simply cannot afford to pay more for living in the district, either through the existing financial structure or through taxation.

The district business is big business and should be conducted accordingly. First job, he says, is to reorganize the structure and change management so that the district may operate efficiently on money now available to the district, thereby lowering the present rate.

Anderson said he will strive, if elected, to promote sound economic and to prevent rates and property taxes from fluctuating.

He and his wife, Lucille, and daughter, Patricia, a KUHS senior, live at 1330 Carlson Drive.

Raymond Broilner, 3756 Allamont Drive, says he was asked by his neighbors and friends to run for the position.

He said he plans, if elected, to study problems before the district and to act accordingly. He is interested in efficient and economical operation of the district, he added.

Broilner is a machinist for Iron Works. He is a native of Kansas. He came to Klamath Falls from Kansas in 1937 and entered the filling station business, and for the past 18 years has worked for his present employer. He has lived 13 years in the South Suburban area.

He and his wife, Lucille, have a daughter and two sons.

William N. Goen says he will work for the following program if he is elected:

He will lower costs to subscribers, secure competitive bids on all major purchases or repairs, establish one revenue system, not two, respect rights of property owners, cooperate with all divisions of government, utility suppliers and departments serving the district, and endeavor to keep everyone informed of district management and business at all times.

His slogan: "A Vote for Goen Will Get This Program Going."

Goen, a Missouri native, came to Portland in 1935 and to Klamath Falls in 1946. He is a partner in an insurance agency. Insurance has always been his business here.

He says friends asked him to run for the position. He also says he is doing it to fulfill a civic duty. People in the district have been negligent in taking an interest in district business, he says.

Goen, his wife, Alice, and their daughter, Karen, a KUHS senior, live at 4650 Thompson Avenue.

Fred Lewis is just completing a term on the board. He has been a Klamath Falls resident since 1918 and has lived within present boundaries of the district since 1921. He was born in Portland. He and his wife, Marian, live at 615 Washburn Way. They have a daughter and a son in college.

His company produces farm and logging equipment.

Says Lewis, "I have been connected in one way or another with the program of securing sewer services for the South Suburbs ever since the inception of this program a number of years ago.

"In the past three years, while I have been serving as chairman of the board of directors for the sanitary district, this vast sewer system has become a reality. The installation of this system has, or will, remove many unpleasant conditions in the area and has certainly alleviated a real threat of epidemic in our community.

"For this community accomplishment I am very thankful. However, there is more work to be done. The feeling has been expressed by our many friends and co-workers that the team that has carried the ball this far is the best qualified to finish out the job.

"We are advised by our legal, financial and engineering counselors that the next three years will be nearly as critical as the past

three in establishing sound financial and operational policies.

"Present members of the board have intimate knowledge of decisions that were made and agreements that were entered into between the district and the contractor. For this reason, it is particularly important that the present board, together with supervisory personnel, be kept together as a team in order to successfully defend the quarter million dollar lawsuit which was brought against the district by the contracting firm of Lee Hoffman."

"In order to bring the project to full completion and to put the roads in good repair, the district budget calls for a tax levy on all property in the district during 1960 and 1961. It is my intention and intention of the present directors that this tax shall not continue past that date.

"If the majority of the voters in the district believe that these policies are sound and should be carried out by your board of directors, I will be happy and honored, if elected, to serve as your director for another three years."

George A. Schriber has been a construction machinery operator and maintenance man and supervisor for various contractors for 15 years. He has been a resident property owner in the South Suburban Sanitary District for the past nine years.

He and his wife, Billee, have two children attending elementary school. They live at 2015 Gettle Street. They came here from Tulare, Calif. Schriber has lived in the Klamath Basin since 1939. He is a Missouri native.

He has spent the past nine years working for Klamath Powder and Equipment Company.

"In seeking this position, it is my desire to make my experience in construction methods and equipment maintenance and operation available to the South Suburban Sanitary District," Schriber said.

"If elected I shall report the progress and problems of the district to the property owners and, wherever possible, act in accordance with desires and wishes of the majority of these taxpayers."
