WALL STREET

NEW YORK (AP)—The stock market closed mixed today, although prices generally were improving in the final few minutes of the week's trading.

Volume for the day was estimated at 3.1 million shares compared with 3.09 million Thursday. Failure of any general follow-through to develop to the market's higher early tone seemed to confirm analysts' suspicions that the recovery was largely technical in nature.

Changes ran to small fractions for the most part, although here and there moves of 2 and 3 points were spotted.

Borden was one of these, running 3 points ahead after being nearly 7 points higher earlier. Polaroid was up more than 3.

American Motors snapped back from an even bigger block (30,000 shares off 1/2 at the opening) and showed a small gain. Chrysler held a gain of well over a point in a good recovery from recent 1960 lows.

Kennecott extended its loss to about a point while General Dynamics shaved its decline to a bit less. Republic Steel turned lower, although U.S. Steel clung to a small gain.

U.S. government bonds edged upward; corporates were mixed.

Sprague River Man Dies As Cars Hit At Bypass

A collision at the north entrance to the Westside Bypass resulted in Klamath County's 20th traffic fatality for the year shortly before noon today.

Reginald Baker Sargent, Sprague River, who would have been 75 years of age Dec. 17, died either instantly or soon after his car was struck in the side by a Spokane man's car.

Dick Sieger, Spokane, said he was northbound on the bypass. State police say they believe Sargent was southbound on Highway 97.

The impact caught Sargent's car almost squarely on the right side, virtually demolishing the vehicle. The engine caught fire and county firemen were called.

Sieger was given first aid by a Peace Ambulance attendant for a possible broken right arm. Sieger was water.

The body was taken to O'Hair's Memorial Chapel where funeral arrangements are pending.

The death was the third on the bypass since the 2 1/2-mile stretch of highway was opened last fall.

A woman and her granddaughter drowned in Lake Ewauna last summer after their car rolled through a railing and into the water.

Louisiana House Passes Private School Aid Bill

BATON ROUGE, La. (AP)—The Louisiana House without debate today passed a key bill to provide grant-in-aid funds for parents who wish to send their children to private schools.

Gov. Jimmie H. Davis' leaders let Rep. Arthur Crais of New Orleans, a cosponsor of the bill with them, briefly explain the measure.

Crais stressed that State Sup. Shelby M. Jackson told him the new grants-in-aid program could be operated without additional taxes. Crais said he wanted to go on record now that "under no circumstances will I vote for any raise in taxes."

"We can do this," he said, "because the United States government itself is providing grants-in-aid for foreign students to study in this country."

There's nothing in the bill to tamper with the public school system, he added.

Historic Meeting

VATICAN CITY (AP)—Pope John XXIII today received the Archbishop of Canterbury in an hour-long meeting, the first in history between a pontiff of the Roman Catholic Church and a primate of the Church of England.

After the historic meeting, both the Vatican and Church of England released carefully worded communiques.

That issued for the archbishop, Dr. Geoffrey Fisher, said Pope John expressed his great desire to increase "brotherly feelings among all men, and especially among all Christians."

Both communiques stressed the cordiality of the meeting. The 79-year-old pontiff met the 73-year-old archbishop on the threshold of his private library, where the historic meeting was held.

Chairman Challenges Vote Probe

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Henry M. Jackson, Democratic national chairman, today challenged the Republicans to submit to a Senate investigation their charges of vote frauds in the presidential election.

Republican Chairman Thurston B. Morton announced Thursday the formation of a national recount and fair elections committee to check unofficially "on every suspicious state."

Jackson told reporters the Senate Privileges and Elections subcommittee, created to handle election contests, has received not a single Republican request to investigate the election in any state.

This, he said, showed "their aim is not to prove their allegations" that fraud figured in the apparent election of Democrat John F. Kennedy as president.

Kennedy holds a slim popular vote edge over Republican Vice President Richard M. Nixon but has an Electoral College margin of 300 to 223, with 14 unplugged Electoral College votes.

Road Work Bids Called

The Oregon State Highway Commission this week recognized the Winnemucca-to-the-Sea Road as a state highway by calling for bids for grading and structural work on nine miles between Adel and the Nevada state line.

Bids on the project will be received Dec. 9 by the State Highway Department in Salem. The nine-mile segment will complete grading of the Winnemucca highway in Lake County. The work is scheduled for completion by mid-summer of 1961.

County Engineer Jack Kalinoski said this is the first action on the Winnemucca-to-the-Sea Highway that the State Highway Commission has undertaken at its own expense.

The proposed interstate highway is paved in Nevada but progress has been slow in Oregon. The route would definitely go through Lakeview and Klamath Falls. A route to the sea has not been decided upon.
