

Gov. Brown Hints He'll Run In 1962

SACRAMENTO (UPI) — Gov. Edmund G. Brown today postponed talking about his future political plans but hinted that he would be a candidate for reelection in 1962.

The first-term Democrat told his news conference he did not want to announce his plans at least until after the 1961 legislature next summer. Tuesday night he told newsmen he would not make his announcement until "the snow hits the Sierra" next year.

Today Brown volunteered that his first two years as governor have been "the toughest, hardest job I ever had."

"But I like it. I enjoy it and I am particularly proud of two things—the master plan for higher education and the water program," both proposed by Brown in the 1960 legislature. "I want to see them through," he said. "You men have been around a long time and you know I like a short campaign," he told newsmen. "I don't intend to announce my plans until after the legislature and any statements I make that might indicate intention are solely because I want to direct my entire energy to the last two years of the term to which I was elected."

Leigh, Olivier Divorce

LONDON (UPI)—Actress Vivien Leigh, 47, won a divorce today from her award-winning husband, Sir Laurence Olivier, after testimony disclosed both committed adultery.

Judge for Lloyd granted the actress an interim decree on an unopposed petition that charged Olivier, 53, committed adultery with actress Joan Plowright, 29.

At the same time, the judge ended the marriage of Miss Plowright and her husband, actor Roger Leonard Gage.

Miss Leigh, who admitted two

adulteries herself, cited Miss Plowright, while Gage, admitting misconduct in Helsinki, Finland, cited Olivier, who was ordered to pay the costs of both cases.

Miss Leigh said she dried out nervous through the proceedings. A private detective testified finding Miss Plowright and Olivier together in night attire last June in an apartment in London. He said they signed a statement willingly.

Miss Leigh, who was married to the Academy Award winner in August, 1940, in Santa Barbara, Calif., told the court her marriage to Olivier "was very happy" until 1952.

Bids Received On Tunnel Job

SACRAMENTO (UPI) — The state has received a low bid of \$3,431,743 to build the Oregon Mountain Tunnel on Highway 199 about two miles south of the Oregon line.

The tunnel will be 1,835 feet long, with a 26-foot two-lane roadway and two-foot safety sidewalks.

Lowest of 11 bidders Wednesday was Grafe-Callahan Construction Co., Los Angeles.

The project is one of three construction jobs required to complete the relocation of U.S. 199 at Hazelview Summit. Grading is now in progress on the 1.4-mile north approach to the tunnel. A third project, still to be financed and advertised, will involve paving the north approach and construction of the 2.5-mile approach on the south.

Banker Suggests New Tax On Tobacco And Betting

RIVERSIDE (UPI)—A Los Angeles banker and former member of the California Board of Forestry has urged imposition of tobacco and pari-mutuel taxes to help save state forests.

Carl Sugar of the First Western Bank also told the board meeting here Tuesday that "strong police action is the cure for all these slobos who come to California and start fires."

Sugar's recommendations and comments included:

—A long-term research program covering reforestation and urbanization.

—Reactivation of the Civilian Conservation Corps on a national level, or at least a state level.

—Toughening of laws to make it a felony for causing any fire which does more than \$200 damage, and manslaughter when anyone dies in a fire caused by carelessness.

—More fulltime fire employees.

—A green belt of farms, golf courses and orchards to protect forest areas from urbanization, with a tax break providing encouragement for such developments.

—Establishment of scholarships for forestry students.

In calling for imposition of tobacco and pari-mutuel taxes, Sugar called tobacco "the great enemy of the forest."

Sugar criticized the spending of tax money for fairs and entertainment while the state's natural forest resources are being destroyed.

Snow Means Hazardous Roadways

YREKA — Snow in the mountains means fun for the ski enthusiast but trouble for the unwary driver, Capt. J. B. Booth of the Yreka area, California Highway Patrol, said this week.

"Chances are, if you're a skier, you are also a driver, since most winter sports fans drive to recreation areas," he said.

"Therefore it is only common sense to learn and accept the limitations of motor vehicle operation on snow and ice-covered roads."

"Snow driving demands slower speeds. Even if traffic stops completely, be patient. Don't pull out of line only to be confronted by a stream of traffic approaching from the opposite direction."

"Starting and stopping on snow and ice require special attention," Booth said. "Starts should be slow, since rapid acceleration results in wheel spinning. Stops should be gentle, accomplished by a soft but rapid pumping of the brake pedal. Hard, fast stops frequently result in skids."

"It takes from three to 12 times as far to stop on icy roads as on normal, dry pavement. Allow yourself this extra margin of room to avoid the necessity of making a rapid stop."

"If a skid starts, turn the steering wheel in the direction the back end is skidding. When the car begins to straighten out, gently pump the brakes to halt the vehicle."

"Don't forget to carry skid chains. When signs indicate that chains are required, you must stop and put them on immediately."

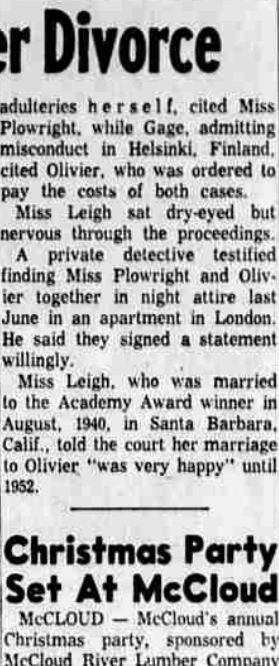
Christmas Party Set At McCloud

Siskiyou Sheriff Reports

YREKA — Sheriff A. B. Cottar reports the following activities of the Siskiyou County Sheriff's Office and in the county jail during the period between Nov. 20 through Nov. 25:

Franklin Delano Winship, 27, Oklahoma, was arrested by California Highway Patrol officers at Tulelake Nov. 20 and booked at Siskiyou County Jail on charges of drunk driving. He was released after posting bail.

Amos Raymond Hilbert, 39, was returned to the county jail from Vacaville State Medical Facility Nov. 21 to face charges of burglary and auto theft. Hilbert is accused of burglarizing a filling station in Happy Camp Aug. 28.

He is charged with theft of a station wagon belonging to James R. Foote, Happy Camp.

He appeared before Judge Philip Toleman of Happy Camp Justice Court Nov. 21 for arraignment, and is being held pending further court action.

John Firster of Edgewood reported to Cottar the theft of a saw, an electric drill and miscellaneous small hand tools from his dairy in Big Springs. A 150 reported was theft of a bench saw and jointer from Ieka Kethels near Grenada. Both thefts are under investigation.

Cottar is conducting an investigation into a charge of indecent exposure filed by a Montague couple. They reported that their 11-year-old daughter was accosted Nov. 22 on her way home from school.

Trygve Noldan, 48, Happy Camp, was booked at the Happy Camp branch jail on charges of public intoxication. He appeared before Judge Philip Toleman and was released after posting bail.

Lloyd Andrew Boswell, 37, Redding, was booked in the county jail on charges of vagrancy. Boswell was arrested by Yreka police Nov. 24. He appeared before Judge George Tyler of Yreka Justice Court and was sentenced to serve 20 days in the county jail.

Sheriff's deputies were called Nov. 24 to Deer Mountain Lodge on Highway 97, and took into custody Warner Alexander Roberts, 33-year-old truck driver from Florida.

He was charged with defrauding an innkeeper after he made a lengthy long-distance telephone call to New Mexico, and refused to pay the charges.

He was placed under citizen's arrest by one of the operators of the lodge and turned over to sheriff's deputies.

He appeared before Judge Kenneth Stone of Weed Justice Court the next morning and was given a 15-day sentence — suspended providing he made restitution to the innkeeper.

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — Three children were burned to death Thursday night while their mother was next door making a telephone call. Firemen said the blaze apparently started from a wood stove. The dead were Patricia Weston, 3; her brother Charles, 2; and sister Melody, 8 months.

G. R. Dillman Dies In Etna

ETNA — George Robert (Dad) Dillman, 75, Etna constable, special deputy and resident for many years, died Sunday evening, Nov. 27, at his home.

Dillman was city marshal for 12 years and had been constable for the past five years. He was active in church and civic affairs.

He was a member of Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints, Etna Lions Club, Siskiyou County Peace Officers Association, the county Sheriff's posse, and president of Etna Pleasure Park Association.

He was a former member of Etna Odd Fellows Lodge. Dillman was instrumental in founding Pleasure Park, a community playground and rodeo center. He donated the land.

Dillman was born June 26, 1885, in Acencion, Chihuahua,

Mexico, and was married there to Rose Ann Beecroft in 1906. They came to Scott Valley in 1928 and to Etna in 1942.

One of their nine children died in infancy. A daughter and two sons have since died.

Dillman is survived by his sons, Hearst and Charles, Etna; three daughters, Mrs. Rose Hovenden, Etna; Mrs. Katherine Luttrell, Fort Jones, and Mrs. Evelyn Hallstrom, San Diego; two half-brothers, Ralph, Riverside, and Ivan, Salt Lake City; 17 grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

Funeral services were conducted Wednesday at 2 p.m. in LDS Church, Etna. Interment was in Etna Cemetery.

The family requests that memorial tributes be donated to the LDS Church building fund, care of Charles Hovenden, Etna.

Hike License Fees—Collier

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — State auto registration fees should be increased an average of \$7 a year, according to state Sen. Randolph Collier, D-Yreka.

Collier, head of the Senate Transportation Committee, told the highway section of the California Chamber of Commerce Thursday that the proposal would yield \$78 million a year, and could be used to provide cities and counties with additional road money.

The fee is now \$2 per \$100 market value of the car. Collier asked that it be increased to \$3.

McCLOUD — Nearly twice the normal precipitation for November has been logged at the U.S. Weather Bureau station here. A total of 10.55 inches of moisture has been measured. Average for the month during the past 10 years was 5.50 inches. The wettest November recorded during the 10-year period was in 1953, when 10.58 inches were recorded.

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — Gov. Edmund G. Brown said Thursday night that he is determined to present a balanced 1961-62 state budget to the legislature next month, despite the recent business downturn.

He made the pledge in an address to the 45th convention of the National Association of State Auditors, Comptrollers and Treasurers.

"I will ask the people of California for no new tax revenue in 1961, but I am determined that California will remain a solvent state," he said. "We have been paying our bills and we will continue to do so."

Brown noted that personal in-

come in California had dropped in the last three months, while unemployment had increased. He said the state was fortunate to have had a general fund surplus last July "to help see us through the 1961-62 fiscal year."

SOUNDS INFLATION WARNING
NEW YORK (UPI)—Ralph J. Cordiner, board chairman of General Electric Co., Thursday warned that another round of inflation would be economically "ruinous" for the United States.

But Cordiner said that, "by sound and conservative measures, the federal government and the business community have been bringing inflation under control."

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
