

American League Faces 'If' In LA

ST. LOUIS, Mo. (AP) — The American League has been given the green light to go to Los Angeles next year — if.

The big if is that the league's 10th club must play its home games in the Rose Bowl in Pasadena.

That is the stipulation Dodger owner Walter O'Malley and National League President Warren Giles gave to a committee to present to the American League at today's meeting.

A counter proposal that would allow the new Los Angeles club to play its home games either in the Coliseum or in Wrigley Field was rejected by O'Malley.

"We thought enough of the Rose Bowl to survey it so I don't think there is any reason why they shouldn't give it some consideration," said O'Malley.

A committee of club representatives met in the commissioner's suite late Sunday night in an 11th-hour attempt to reconcile differences between the two leagues and pave the way for the American League's expansion to 10 clubs in 1961.

Pott Trims Sam Snead

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla. (UPI) — Golf's old guard had its notice today from Johnny Pott and company that the old game ain't what it used to be.

Pott, a 25-year-old from Shreveport, La., came sailing out of nowhere with a final round four under par 68 to make up three shots on Sammy Snead and snatch the West Palm Beach Open from the Slammer.

And 23-year-old Bobby Nichols of Midland, Tex., hung on gamely for fourth money ahead of a lot of the old heroes — including leading money winner Arnold Palmer, who finished in a fifth place tie.

Pott was three shots back of Snead as they started the final round Sunday but it was Snead who "took the pipe." The Slammer, seeking his 106th tournament victory, faded to a 35-39-74. Playing right in front of him, Pott whacked out a 32-36-68 for a winning 108 par 278 which wound up three strokes better than Snead's second place total.

Oregon Trio Slates Play

Oregon's three major college basketball teams, which got a taste of victory in the opening week of play, all will see action in the coming week.

Oregon State College, which split a pair on the road in the Southwest last weekend, goes into action tonight, playing at Santa Barbara College. Oregon State will be idle the rest of the week.

Oregon, which opened its season by defeating the University of Portland Saturday night, 56-41, will go on the road next weekend, playing at Wyoming Friday and Colorado Saturday.

Portland, which edged Idaho then lost to Oregon, will play Portland State Tuesday, Fresno State Friday and Pepperdine Saturday. All the games will be at Portland.

Oregon State downed strong New Mexico State 65-57 Friday night, only to be upset at Arizona State Saturday night 79-77. It was action at the free throw line that did it in Oregon State. Thirty-two fouls were called on the Beavers and Arizona State made 43 of 53 free throw chances. Arizona State was called for 20 fouls, and the Beavers made 17 of 28 free throw tries. Oregon State made 30 field goals to Arizona State's 18.

Scoring honors were shared by OSC's Carl Anderson and Arizona State's Larry Armstrong with 20 points each.

Coach Steve Belko of Oregon was pleased with his team's first game, especially the defensive play. He particularly lauded 6-8 Glenn Moore, who limited Portland's 6-10 Bill Garner to 4 points while scoring 12 himself.

When Jim Lee Howell retires as coach of the New York Football Giants after this season he will work in the office as director of personnel.

Elsewhere on Saturday night, Georgia Tech, the Southeastern Conference favorite, walloped Furman 80-54. California made it 23 in a row at home, beating Santa Barbara 60-54. Duke beat LSU 80-74. St. Bonaventure won its second, whipping Murray State 92-39. Dayton beat LaMar Tech 73-51. Arkansas smacked Missouri 84-73. Oklahoma won over Minnesota 60-56. Washington whipped Brigham Young 74-54. North Carolina State conquered Georgia Tech 88-68. Kent State won the Midwestern Invitational title, beating Clemson 79-65.

West Virginia, missing its great Jerry West, won its 44th consecutive home game, 74-72 over William & Mary in the last half-minute of overtime and plays The Citadel Tuesday. Wake Forest Friday and Duke on Saturday.

Utah State showed it may be ready to take over for Utah in the Skyline after beating NYU in the final six seconds 67-65. But Utah State has three more games on the road, meeting Detroit to night, Nebraska Wednesday and South Dakota State Friday.

Utah's dreams of grandeur really went crashing Saturday night in a 59-56 loss to Stanford after being upset last Thursday by Loyola of Los Angeles. Villanova, after a victory, came back to earth when Buffalo pulled a 63-62 upset.

One or two games don't make college basketball season but as far as some of the favorites are concerned, the first weekend was far from encouraging.

Take Utah, one of the top picks to win the Skyline Conference title and wind up in the NCAA's post-season playoffs. The Utes have lost their first two games, and so have Purdue's supposedly talented Boilermakers.

Also wearing the look of surprise today are Kentucky (1-1), NYU (1-1), Wake Forest (1-1) and Villanova all of whom lost Saturday night after winning openers earlier last week.

But still unshaken are Ohio State, the defending NCAA champ, and 1959 NIT winner Bradley. The Buckeyes play St. Louis tonight and face Army on Saturday. Bradley, idle last Saturday night along with Ohio State, plays the Cal Aggies and tough little Butler this week.

Honkers Hit KU Wildcats

TULELAKE (Special) — Coach Hank Smith's Tulelake Honkers slipped past the visiting Klamath Union Wildcats 47-42 in double overtime here Saturday night.

With the score deadlocked at 40-40 at the end of the regular time, both squads battled on to a 42-42 tie at the end of the first overtime. But then Tulelake's speedy Jim Long caught fire and canned two field goals and a free toss to give the Honkers a five-point lead which they never lost.

Long's performance topped that of any player on either club as he scorched the net for 21 points and turned in a shining offensive job for the victors.

Gail Phelps paced the Wildcats with 10 counters and hustling teammate Grover Dahm added another nine to the Klamath cause.

In the "B" team preliminary match the KU "seconds" whipped the Tulelake second stringers 47-29.

Smith's squad will face the Sacred Heart Trojans next Tuesday, while the Wildcats will stay home on Pelican Court.

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Techmen Honored At Feed

Five Oregon Tech football players, including a pair of graduating seniors who have never played on a losing Owl team in a conference game, carried off glistening trophies at the OTI grid banquet Sunday night as awards for their efforts during the season just completed.

Quarterback Roy Johnson, termed by coach Rex Hunsaker "the finest all-around football player we've ever had at OTI," was honored as the "Most Outstanding Player" on the 1960 Oregon Collegiate Conference championship squad, and was awarded a share in a second trophy, which has won All-Conference honors three years straight.

Center Don Anderson and Johnson were voted a tie for the "Most Inspirational Player" cup. Anderson also has been selected an All-Conference honorable mention.

Halfback Ardell Hamilton, a two-time All-Conference award winner, who, like Johnson, has never played in a losing conference effort, was announced the "Most Outstanding Backfield Man."

"The Outstanding Lineman" trophy was awarded to big Jim Madden, an All-Conference tackle, recently named to Little All-Conference honors.

Ted Morris, the Owl defensive end and second honorable mention in All-Conference voting, was selected the "Most Improved Player."

Another award, made by Johnson, went to Terry "Little Dobe" Kincaid for his performance as the team mascot. The youngster is the small son of Lathan Kincaid, Owl equipment manager. The lad was presented with a white inscribed football.

Elmer Belcastro, president of the Owl Hoots, the banquet-sponsoring organization, was chosen by the Owl coaches to receive a plaque denoting him "Mr. Football Fan" of 1960.

The banquet, which featured Ray Hunsaker, city school superintendent, as the principal speaker, and which was emceed by Wayne Scott of the Herald and News, was held in the Oregon Tech cafeteria.

The program included messages from Dr. Winston Purvine, head of Oregon Tech, Belcastro and coaches George Miller and Jim Cordial, line and backfield mentors respectively.

Head coach Hunsaker introduced each member of the 1960 Owl team which completed the season with the first unbeaten-untied record in the history of the school.

In his comments on the individual players he had words of praise for guard Andy Cook, a third member of the club who has never been on a losing Owl team in conference activity. Cook was voted an All-Conference choice this season.

Other team members who received All-Conference awards were guard Wendell Winterbottom and halfback Charlie Wilson, the third graduating senior, who has been named to All-Conference honors twice as a defensive player.

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Eagles Clinch Eastern Title; Chargers Explode For Win

Colts Lose; West Battle Still Rages

The National Football League championship game will match Philadelphia's streaking Eagles against Baltimore or Green Bay or San Francisco or Chicago or Detroit.

That was the situation today, with only two weeks left in the regular season.

The Eagles clinched their first Eastern Conference title since 1949 by whipping the St. Louis Cardinals 20-6 Sunday for their ninth consecutive triumph.

The Baltimore Colts, seeking to gain a playoff berth for an unprecedented third consecutive time, were beaten by the Detroit Lions 20-15 when Earl Morrall connected with Jim Gibbons for a 64-yard touchdown pass on the last play of the game.

The loss dropped Baltimore into a three-way tie for first place in the Western Division with Green Bay and San Francisco, all with 6-4 records, while Chicago (5-4-1) and Detroit (5-5) remained solidly in contention.

The Packers, getting a 23-point performance from Paul Hornung that gave him 132 for the campaign and broke Don Hutson's 18-year-old one-season scoring record, walloped the Bears 41-13. The 49ers moved into position by blasting Los Angeles 23-7 before a crowd of 77,254.

The Cleveland Browns grabbed the runner-up spot in the East with a 27-16 victory over Washington while winless Dallas tied the New York Giants 31-31.

Willamette, SOC Favored

Willamette and Southern Oregon emerged over the weekend as the favorites for the basketball crowns of their respective conferences.

Willamette of the Northwest Conference won three straight games and carried off the Tipoff Tournament title for the second consecutive year. Willamette downed Lewis and Clark 81-73 in the final game at Salem Saturday night.

That gave Lewis and Clark (2-1) second place in the tourney.

Southern Oregon gained the highest ranking of the Oregon Collegiate Conference teams, placing third with a 2-1 record and a 50-33 victory over Portland State in Saturday night play.

Linfield downed Pacific 99-74 Saturday night and emerged with a 2-1 record.

Oregon College of Education downed Oregon Tech 76-67 for a 1-2 mark. Portland State and Pacific also wound up with 1-2 records.

Oregon Tech emerged without a victory and took solace only in the fact that Tech's Leon Wilson won tournament scoring honors with 60 points in his three games.

Portland State will play the University of Portland Tuesday and Central Washington Friday at Portland.

Southern Oregon will entertain Chico State Friday and Saturday. Eastern Oregon, which dropped a pair on the road to Nevada last weekend, will be at home against College of Idaho Friday and Saturday.

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Oilers, LA Within One Of Cincher

The Houston Oilers and Los Angeles Chargers of the American Football League are within one game of clinching the Eastern and Western division titles today.

Houston missed a chance to wrap up the Eastern championship Sunday, when the Dallas Texans pulled a 24-0 upset.

With two games remaining, Houston and Los Angeles have won eight and lost four games and can get no worse than a tie for the championship. Los Angeles came from behind with four touchdowns Sunday to subdue the Oakland Raiders 41-17.

New York, holding second place in the Eastern division, boasted a 6-6 record after the Titans edged the Denver Broncos 30-27. Dallas has a similar 6-6 won and lost record.

Playoff plans will be completed during the AFL meeting opening today at Dallas. The playoff will be during Christmas week.

In a fourth game Sunday, the Buffalo Bills broke a 14-14 halftime deadlock and went on to trim the Boston Patriots 38-14.

Dallas Coach Hank Stram had threatened \$500 fines for poor play, and the Texans poured it on Houston for the Oilers' worst defeat of the season.

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
