From Washington:
The United States ended the 1960 fiscal (money) year with a BIGGER BUDGET SURPLUS than it had expected. The treasury department says in a report this morning:

"The surplus reached \$1,224,000,000 (in round figures) or 156 million dollars MORE than the department had predicted in its preliminary calculation a few weeks ago."

It worked out like this:
Revenue \$78,457,432,872.73
Expenditure 77,233,385,451.09
Surplus 1,224,047,421.64

What to do with the surplus? PAY IT ON THE DEBT!

The first law of sound business is that debts must be paid. The way to get the money to pay our debts is to spend less than we take in. In that direction lies the road to happiness.

You may ask:
Who's your authority for the statement that spending less than is taken in leads to happiness?

The answer is Mister Micawber—the charmingly inconsistent old windbag who enlivened the pages of Charles Dickens' immortal David Copperfield. He was fond of lecturing on the values of THRIFT, and he liked to put the case to his hearers like this:

"Annual income twenty pounds, annual expenditure nineteen pounds, nine pence, result HAPPINESS. Annual income twenty pounds, annual expenditure twenty pounds ought and six, result MISERY."

At this point, a thought occurs. Two or three generations ago, EVERYBODY was familiar with Charles Dickens, who is one of the immortals of English literature. Maybe he isn't as widely read NOW. Perhaps we'd better provide a profile of Mister Micawber.

He was an old SPENDTHRIFT. He spent every farthing he could lay his hands on as fast as it came into his possession. He was always in debt. But he loved to ORATE about thrift.

Let's put it this way:
He was a perfect example of the modern "liberal" politician.

Sober thought in conclusion:
For those many years our "liberal" politicians have spent it as freely as Mr. Micawber spent it. The result is a national debt of nearly three hundred billion dollars.

And—
A situation in which it is beginning to look like we may not have gold enough to meet our commitments under the international system of balance of international payments.

The result of that is misery!

No Relief In Sight

Oregon shivered under a third straight day of chilling cold today with no immediate relief in sight.

Forecasters had expected a storm front off the coast to move in over the Pacific Northwest, bringing warming rain. But today the Weather Bureau said the storm would veer north to Alaska. The bureau said temperatures would remain about the same—low as five degrees tonight for the higher areas of Eastern Oregon and close to freezing in Western Oregon.

Baker registered a low of eight this morning, and Bend reported 10. The Highway Department said it was four degrees below zero at Seneca. Portland's low was 27 again for the second day. Salem dropped to 29.

The usually moderate Oregon coast temperatures remained near freezing. Low at Astoria was 35. Newport had 37.

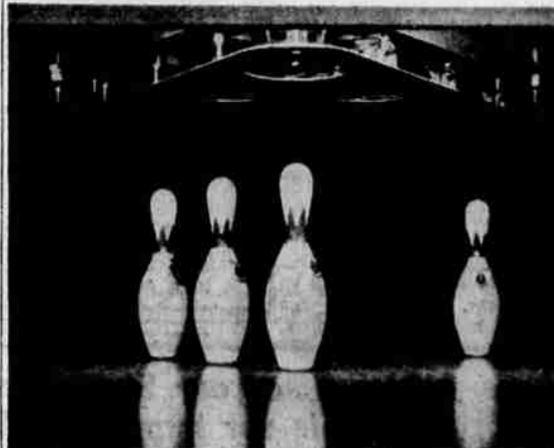

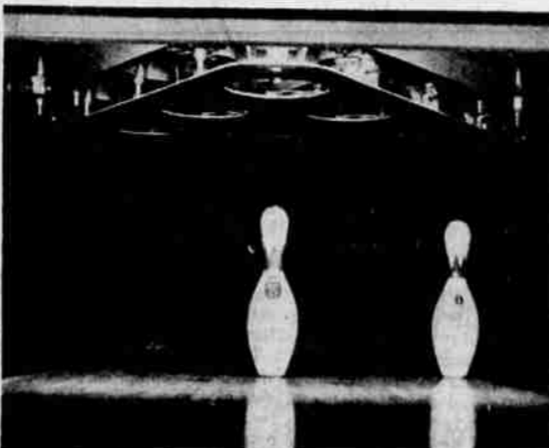

Zorin Seat In Council Challenged

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP)—The United States demanded today that Soviet Delegate Valerian A. Zorin disqualify himself as president of the U.N. Security Council during the Congo debate. U.S. Ambassador James J. Wadsworth told the 11-nation council Zorin should vacate the chair because of his attacks on the United Nations, Secretary-General Dag Hammarskjold and Congo President Joseph Kasavubu.

"I can hardly see that you will be able to preside over the council in these circumstances," Wadsworth told Zorin. The surprise U.S. move came as the council met to debate a Soviet demand that imprisoned ex-Premier Patrice Lumumba be released and that the troops of Congo strongman Col. Joseph Mobutu be disarmed.

Memory Of Pearl Harbor Attack Returns On Anniversary Today

PEARL HARBOR, Hawaii (AP)—The memory of a grim piece of history returned today—as it does each year—to remind Hawaii and the world of a searing lesson written in bombs and blood. Nineteen years ago—Dec. 7, 1941—more than 2,400 sailors, soldiers, Marines and civilians died during the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor, called "the day of infamy" by the late President Franklin D. Roosevelt.

Bowlers To Roll For United Fund

Two insurance firms in Klamath Falls, Lawrence State Agency and Paul Landry Insurance Company, local dealers for the Oregon Auto Insurance Company in Portland, have insured both bowling lanes against any payoffs in the special spare shoot for Operation 1-3-9 up to \$200. These two firms have offered this special feature free as an assist to enable the United Fund to reach its \$139,000 goal.

Both bowling lanes in Klamath Falls are joining forces in a special United Fund Operation 1-3-9 activity which should pose a problem and mean some fancy shooting for Klamath bowlers.

Bowlers will be able to shoot at either \$5 or \$10 spares. They contribute 50 cents per shot, and if they make the spare, they get either \$5 or \$10 in return. The \$5 spare will be a 1-2-4-10 combination and the \$10 spare will be the 5-10 split.

Both are good spare-shooting tests. Holiday Bowl will open the Operation-1-3-9 spare shoot Saturday from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. and both Holiday Bowl and Lucky Lanes will have the spare shoot feature operating from 11 to 1 o'clock on Sunday. Bowling alley employees will not be permitted to participate.

Blast Wrecks Church; Communists Get Blame

HAVANA (AP)—Church officials today blamed Communists for a shattering bomb explosion in a Roman Catholic church whose pastor is a leading critic of Prime Minister Fidel Castro's regime.

The attack, first on a church since Castro's feud with Roman Catholic officials began, took place just after Tuesday night's vesper services. None of the 50 persons inside was injured but pews and flooring in the Our Lady of Charity Church were damaged extensively.

The bombing underscored the growing tension between the church and Castro. Problems appeared to be mounting on three other fronts: economic, labor, and armed opposition.

A small red flag was left inside the bombed church. It bore a hammer and sickle and the inscription: "Viva Khrushchev, down with the clergy. Viva Fidel Castro."

Hoffa Faces Mail Charge

WASHINGTON (AP)—President James R. Hoffa of the Teamsters Union was indicted by a federal grand jury at Orlando, Fla., today on mail fraud charges involving alleged misuse of union funds.

Order Tests For Mother Of Sleepers

CLEVELAND, Ohio (AP)—Convicted of mistreating her "sleeping beauty" daughters by drugging them with barbiturates, Lillian Fratantonio will undergo a psychiatric examination before she is sentenced.

A Juvenile Court jury of six men and six women took two hours to find the tiny, 29-year-old mother of five guilty late Tuesday and end a trial that began Nov. 21.

Mrs. Fratantonio was released in custody of her husband, Vincent, 33, and her \$1,000 bond was continued. Her attorneys said they would decide later whether to appeal. The conviction carries a maximum sentence of one year in jail and a \$500 fine.

Udall Named Secretary Of Interior As Expected

NEW YORK (AP)—President-elect John F. Kennedy today selected Rep. Stewart Udall of Arizona to be his secretary of the interior—the third of the 10 Cabinet posts to be filled for the new administration.

Passenger Train, Truck Collide; Five Are Dead

NASHUA, N.H. (AP)—A crowded passenger train and a loaded bottled gas truck collided at a grade crossing today, touching off an ear-splitting explosion and fire that killed five persons and injured more than a dozen others.

Blue Laws' Face Legal Challenge In High Court

WASHINGTON (AP)—State laws which forbid commercial activities on Sunday faced their most serious legal challenge in many years today. Faced with conflicting rulings by lower courts, the Supreme Court called for arguments today and Thursday involving the validity of Sunday closing laws—commonly known as blue laws—in Massachusetts, Pennsylvania and Maryland.
