

Panthers Trim Mustangs In County Cage Features

The Chiloquin Panthers lived up to pre-season expectations when they edged the Malin Mustangs, Oregon's defending B champions, 45-40 in the feature game of county basketball action Tuesday night.

Sharpshooter Butch Crume drilled 15 points to lead the Chiloquin quint in their invasion of the Mustangs' home floor. The game was the first league action for each club.

In the only other "counter" on the county slate, the Bonanza Antlers proved a hard-nosed host by whipping the Bly Bobcats 61-38.

Non-league play saw the Klamath Union Jayvees measure the Merrill Huskies 46-30 on Pelican Court; the Tulelake Honkers tromp the Sacred Heart Trojans 49-29 in Tulelake while the Gilchrist Grizzlies whacked LaPine 46-21 at the upper end of the county.

CHILOQUIN 45, MALIN 40
The Panthers got off to an early lead then had little trouble maintaining a seven to 13 point spread most of the way.

The Mustangs, who were led by All-Star Larry Rick, the high man for the night with 19 points, managed to shave the bulge a bit in the closing minutes but never really threatened.

The Chiloquin quint, still short big Paul Harris, led 13-9 at the end of the first stanza, 25-17 at the half, and 37-22 at the close of the third.

Left-handed Mustang Nick Johnson potted 10 for third place scoring honors while Chiloquin's Frank Heglund and Mike Cunningham were next with eight apiece.

Crume counted seven field goals and the lone free throw collected by the winners. They had nine tries.

Rich hit eight field goals from the key and 3-4 at the free toss mark.

In the prelim young Tony Wilder cast off a desperation heave from mid-court that gave the Panther JV a 37-36 win over the Malin Pups.

KU JAYVEES 46, MERRILL 30
The Merrill Huskies, minus the services of rangy Dick Carleton who has an injured hand, ran out of gas in the fourth canto of their match with Pel Jayvees.

The Jayvees height paid off on the boards and the Jayvees led 12-10 at the close of the first frame, 22-16 at the half and 34-26 at the end of the third.

Both KU coach Al Keck and Merrill coach Jerry Greenewald emptied their benches in the final periods.

Kent Hunsaker, who kept the KU quint in the ball game during the second quarter with a seven-point spurt, topped all the scorers with 15 total. He hit seven field goals and 1-1 at the foul line.

Merrill's shifty senior guard, Denny Salvadori, was next with 10 for the losers and KU's Dick Scott followed with nine. Husky Larry Chance and KU's Dave Stippich were next with eight and seven respectively.

Erratic shooting on both clubs and some ragged passing on the part of the Huskies helped to hold the score down.

Merrill travels to Gilchrist Friday night for its first league encounter.

Trojan Keith Murray led the losers with nine while Elmo LeBeau hit eight for SHA while Bill Oehlerich was collecting a like amount for the Honkers.

At the quarter rests the Tulelakers had posted leads of 15-4, 27-14 and 38-26. The SHA quint,

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visibly tiring in the final frame, collected only three points.

The Trojans garnered only three of their total points at the foul line, while the Honkers came up with 11-21.

Murray hit four field goals and one from the foul line while Mike Holland nailed three from the floor and one from the charity stripe. LeBeau got his eight all from the field.

ST. LOUIS (UPI)— Casey Stengel, the man who the new Los Angeles club wants for its manager, said today he is "undecided" whether or not he will return to baseball next year.

Cowboy star Gene Autry and Bob Reynolds made it plain they would like to have the 70-year-old Stengel manage the Los Angeles team which was approved as the American League's newest member Tuesday.

"They're high class people," Stengel said over the telephone from his Glendale, Calif., home. "They talked to me only a few days ago and I could see they meant business. The proof of it is that they want right out and got the franchise."

Autry and Reynolds, who were welcomed here as the new Los Angeles operators by American League President Joe Cronin, said they have another appointment to see Stengel in a few weeks and Casey corroborated it.

"I told them I haven't made up my mind yet whether I'll be back in baseball next year," said the ex-Yankee manager. "That was a few days ago and they said they would check back with me in a few weeks."

CHICAGO (AP)— Champions Don Carter and Olga Gloor join a select field of 30 men and women bowlers today in match game competition in the rich World's Invitational Tournament.

The tough head-to-head play will continue through Sunday. The winner in the men's division will pick up \$7,500 of the tournament's total prize money of \$48,000. The new women's champion will collect \$4,000.

In each of the five days of the finals, the men will bowl four games each against four opponents while the women will roll two games each against four opponents.

Heading the men finalists, after 36 games of qualifying shooting, was Dick Weber, St. Louis, who rolled 7,756 in 36 games.

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No Single Oddity

1960 Football Takes Crazy Bounces

A quarterback returned a missed field goal attempt 108 yards for the winning touchdown. A coed ran on the field to kiss Harvard's Charley Ravenel in full view of a regional television audience.

Indiana played a full Big Ten schedule that didn't count.

Yes, Virginia (the Cavaliers lost 10 games and tied Kansas State's major college record losing streak of 28), it was an odd college football season.

So odd, in fact, no single oddity stands out today among the results of 120-odd ballots cast by sports writers and broadcasters voting in The Associated Press postseason poll.

The missed field goal attempt might have won feet down, only it happened at Burlington, N. C., in a North State Conference game that received scant national attention.

George Wooten of Elon will never forget that Oct. 22 game against Catawba. He was the quarterback who picked up the missed field goal in the end zone and took off on the 108-yard run—longest in conference history.

Coach Pres Mull of Catawba won't forget either. In fact he's probably still mulling over why he ordered the field goal try with his team ahead 12-7 and only 15 seconds remaining.

The ball was on the Elon 17. Back Ronnie Evans tried the

field goal and it went wide. Then Wooten went for the TD and out the window, 13-12.

Ravenel got his kiss for Harvard's touchdown in a 39-6 beating by Yale.

Indiana was left out of the Big Ten standings as a disciplinary measure for working too hard at getting football players that could win the conference title.

Then there was Mrs. Elliott, a fan from Bloomington, Ill. She's so much a fan that she prayed for a tie when Michigan (coached by son Pete) played Illinois (coached by son Pete). Bump won 8-7.

The field goals that were made provided as much oddity as the

one that missed.

Ed Dyas of Auburn, the national collegiate field goal champ of the modern era, kicked three as Auburn beat Georgia, 9-6. How did the losers score? On two field goals.

Mississippi beat Arkansas 10-7 on a last-play field goal by Allen Green—after a referee's timeout had canceled what appeared to be the winning FG on the previous play.

A Navy touchdown was called back, but Greg Mather then kicked a field goal and tagged Washington with its only defeat, 15-14.

Georgia Tech beat Rice 16-13 on three field goals and a blocked punt.

Michigan completed a pass off a blocked field goal against Wisconsin.

Pitt's Panthers, who kicked two field goals in games in which they didn't make any difference, played three 7-7 ties and lost two other games (8-7 and 15-14) for want of a field goal or a two-point conversion.
