

TB Association Outlines Program To Curb Disease

A campaign to bring tuberculosis under control as quickly as possible in Oregon through detection, treatment, prevention and supervision was announced at the mid-year meeting of the board of directors, Oregon Tuberculosis and Health Association, held at the Multnomah Hotel, Portland, on Dec. 2.

Attending from Klamath Falls was Mrs. C. L. (Mae) Speirs as representative from the Klamath County Tuberculosis and Health Association.

The recommendations, said Mrs. Speirs, came as the result of an action conference held at Cottage Grove last October, when some 40 persons representing local, state and national official and voluntary health agencies concerned with tuberculosis control met to make plans for Oregon's participation in a nationwide campaign to eliminate this disease.

Although the goal ideally would be complete eradication, it is not believed it can be accomplished within the foreseeable future, according to Dr. Ambrose S. Churchill, state tuberculosis control officer. Despite the tremendous gains made against this disease, he declared there is still a huge reservoir of infection estimated at upwards of 360,000 persons in Oregon alone—persons who at some time have been exposed to tuberculosis and now carry the germs.

Tuberculosis still strikes five to six hundred new victims in Oregon every year, killing some 10 per cent of that number and costing several million dollars for prevention, treatment, welfare and related services, Dr. Churchill said.

Dr. James T. Speros, tuberculosis control officer for Portland and vice president of the state association, emphasized at the meeting that a strong detection program is of number one importance. Increased emphasis, he said, should be placed on tuberculin skin testing of groups that historically have had a high incidence of the disease; of young children before the third birthday; of all candidates for marriage as well as prospective par-

Siskiyou Gets Forest Share

YREKA — Siskiyou County received \$1,028,977.99 this week of forest reserve funds which is to be divided equally between the special county road improvement fund and the school forest reserve fund, according to an announcement on Monday by Kenneth Blev, assistant county auditor.

The amount of the funds returned to the county by the U.S. Forest Service is determined by 25 per cent of the receipts taken into the forest service within the county.

Total receipts in the Klamath National Forest amounted to \$3,163,810.21, from which the largest share comes to Siskiyou County. The remainder of the fund comes from the Shasta, Modoc and Rogue forests.

KAILUA, Hawaii (AP)—Rickey Sheets, 10, put the garden hose down a gopher hole and turned on the water.

Believe Body Is Identified

PORTLAND (AP) — Authorities said Monday they have given a new tentative identity to the body of a woman found in a wooded gulch. The circumstances of her death still posed a mystery, however.

After the discovery of the body Nov. 15, the coroner's office said it was that of Frances Pearl Johnson, 52, of Portland.

Police said Monday, though, that a fingerprint check ruled out the possibility that it was the body of the Maben woman.

It now is tentatively identified as the body of Hazel Viola Seeley, 52, of Portland. A photograph provided part of the basis for the identification. Police said a friend of the woman said she had scars similar to those found on the body.

An autopsy earlier showed there was no indication the woman had been murdered. However, police said they still had no idea how the body came to be in the wooded, rugged gulch just northwest of the city.

Red China Expected To Have 'Bomb'

LONDON (UPI) — British experts were reported today to have warned the government that Red China can be expected to become a nuclear power in its own right "very soon"—possibly next year.

No details were available to substantiate the warning, but the suggestion of Peiping's advance in the nuclear weapons field was believed to have played at least some part in the Soviet Union's anxiety to get world communism lined up behind its policy of "peaceful coexistence."

A new "Communist Manifesto" adopted by a summit gathering of world party leaders in Moscow and released Monday revealed to the West that the Soviet Union had won the battle for peaceful coexistence—at least on the surface.

Although Red China's early nuclear potential is expected to be only rudimentary, the fact that Peiping has been able to develop itself in this field creates new problems not only for the West but also for Moscow.

Authoritative sources said there was reason to believe that Peiping may not be far off now from exploding its first nuclear device. This would make it an atomic power along with the United States, Britain, the Soviet Union and France.

Last week, unsubstantiated reports from Moscow said Red Chinese President Liu Shao-chi had claimed before the Red summit that his country was on the verge of becoming an atomic power.
