WALL STREET NEW YORK (AP)—A scattering of selected stocks held gains as the stock market backed away from an early rise and turned mixed late this afternoon. Trading slowed. Volume for the day was estimated at 3.7 million shares compared with 3.6 million Wednesday. Gains and losses of key stocks were mostly small, a few going to a point or so. Some companies involved in the B70 supersonic bomber project held gains. Motorola and Minneapolis-Honeywell rose more than a point each. Hupp was a full point higher. Underwood added another couple of points and International Business Machines advanced more than 3. Losses of about a point were taken by U.S. Steel, DuPont and Westinghouse Electric. Parke Davis fell. Sperry Rand rose more than a point. Around a point higher were Jones & Laughlin, Air Reduction, Lionel and American Tobacco. Trans World Airlines advanced more than a point. U.S. Steel was off about a point. Republic Steel kept a recovery of more than a point. U.S. government bonds expanded their early gains. Corporate bonds continued mixed.

Disaster Area Set In Oregon

PORTLAND (AP)—The Small Business Administration today declared Clackamas County a disaster area because of wide-spread flooding late in November. Thus eligible for federal loans to repair damage are property owners whose homes or business firms were hit by water from rivers that swelled out of their banks from Nov. 23 to 25, said John G. Barnett, manager of the SBA office here. Non-profit organizations also are eligible for loans. However, Barnett said "summer or winter cottages, camps, lodges or other residential property occupied for recreation... are not eligible for this assistance." Clackamas County was among the areas hardest hit by extensive flooding through the Willamette Valley. Barnett said investigators also had checked flood damage in Marion and Tillamook counties. He said, however, those counties probably would not be declared disaster areas. There probably will be 10 to 15 applications for loans from Clackamas County, he said, adding that was only a guess. Barnett said his office had made no estimate of the flood damage in the county, but he said it was extensive.

Rapist Hunted By City Police

PORTLAND (AP)—Police disclosed today they are hunting a teenage rapist. A 15-year-old girl was pulled off the street into a car in Tualatin and raped Nov. 21, and a 13-year-old was similarly attacked here Tuesday. In both cases, the girls said the youth appeared to be about 17, was about 5-6, weighed about 150 pounds, had long black hair and wore jeans and a white jacket. Police said the same person apparently attacked both girls. In addition, they said, the youth also was probably the one who stole a car in Salem early Tuesday and robbed a service station here at 7:30 p.m. on Wednesday night.

Guss Zumbrun, Pioneer, Dies

FORT KLAMATH—Guss Zumbrun, 82, member of a pioneer Klamath County family, died Nov. 20 at Haledon, New Jersey. He was the eldest of six brothers, William, Charles and Fred, Fort Klamath, and George, Klamath Falls, have resided for a long time in Klamath County. A sister, Mrs. Jack Knott, died at her home in Bell, Calif., several years ago. Another brother, Emil, died last year in Klamath Falls. He also leaves his widow, two daughters and a son, all of Paterson, New Jersey.

Boivin Will Ignore Caucus Of Demos

State Sen. Harry Boivin of Klamath Falls said in Salem today he does not plan to attend a caucus of Democratic senators called for Monday night in Salem by Sen. Robert Straub of Eugene. Senator Straub billed the meeting as one arranged to settle differences over selection of a Senate president. Boivin is an announced candidate for the post. Senator Boivin said he doesn't plan to attend a caucus until Sen. Walter Pearson of Portland calls one, explaining that historically, the outgoing Senate president is the only person with the right to call one. Pearson is expected to call a caucus the night before the next Legislature convenes. "Nothing is going to be changed by the caucus, that I can assure anyone," Boivin said in comment on Monday's meeting. He said he has 18 firm pledges for the Senate post and has a possible 19th from the successor of Senator Durno of Jackson County. He expressed confidence that nine of the 20 Democrats in the Senate will stand by him in his bid. Boivin was to leave for Klamath Falls today with his wife who has been spending some time in a Salem hospital with an attack of berisitis. (See story on caucus on Page 11-A)

A police officer said Bellm ran a stop sign and was speeding Wednesday night on Main near Second Street.

Hope Fades In Portland Murder Case

PORTLAND (AP)—The hope of a promising lead faded away today and authorities said they still were without a major clue in the slaying of a teenager and probable abduction of his coed girl friend. Sheriff's Capt. Gordon Auburn said earlier he had hopes of an interesting development. Today, however, he said checks had eliminated the lead. He did not elaborate. Auburn's comment Wednesday that "there may be an interesting development on this thing in a day or so," had brought hope of a solution of the slaying of Larry Ralph Peyton, 19, and the disappearance and presumed kidnapping of Beverly Ann Allan, his girl friend.

Brown Trial Set Thursday

A trial date was set for Ralph E. Brown, 32-year-old Bellflower, Calif., man accused on a bad check charge, Thursday morning in circuit court. Judge David R. Vandenberg set Dec. 19 as the trial date after Brown pleaded not guilty to a charge of obtaining money and property by false pretense. His court-appointed attorney is Hal F. Coe. P. K. Puckett, court-appointed lawyer, for accused burglar Robert Allen Woodford, asked for additional time to study the indictment against his client. Judge Vandenberg ruled that a plea must be entered by Dec. 19. Woodford, 21, San Jose, Calif., is accused of burglary not in a dwelling.

Man Injured

James Davis, Talent, was reported in satisfactory condition at Klamath Valley Hospital this week where he is convalescing following an ankle injury he received recently. Davis was reported unloading some lumber from a Ned Putnam Logging Company truck and was struck by some falling timber.

Dog Licensing Drive Set

The Klamath County Dog Commission, headed by Gerald D. West, and Poundmaster Don Libbey have announced a new dog licensing drive for 1961. West and Libbey said the purpose of the drive is twofold. One purpose is to facilitate lost or strayed dogs being returned to their owners and the other reason is so that responsibility can be placed for damage that the dogs do. "The metal tag should be clipped to the collar after the license is purchased," West said. "State law requires the dog to be licensed and also to wear a tag." Libbey said more than 60 sheep were reported killed during the month of November by dogs. He said dog owners should be aware not only that they are responsible for damage caused by their pets, but also that sheep farmers have a right to protect their property. "Dogs, running alone or in packs, can cause hundreds of dollars damage to a farmer," Libbey said. He cited the case of a Poe Valley rancher, Melvin D. Fiegl, who had 34 of his prize sheep slaughtered by two dogs. The dogs returned several days later and killed 10 more sheep. The value of the animals killed was almost \$1,000. "I've had dogs all my life," Fiegl said, "but I wouldn't hesitate to shoot a dog if I caught him running or killing my sheep. The place for a dog is at home." If the owner of a sheep-killing dog cannot be located, the county may reimburse the rancher for a small portion of his loss. Libbey pointed out, however, that this money comes out of the taxpayers' pockets. Dog licenses for 1961 may be purchased beginning Jan. 1 in the county clerk's office or at the Klamath County Dog Kennels, 2853 Memorial Drive. Libbey urged that all presently licensed dogs be tagged immediately for their own protection. Besides West, other members of the dog commission are Merl Loosley of Malin and M. G. Burk of Bonanza.

Chiloquin Chief Gives Ultimatum

Chiloquin Police Chief Lou Jones offered an ultimatum to the city at a hearing held by the City Police Committee. Jones said he would resign unless Police Officer Ken Schoonover were fired immediately. The hearing was called by committee chairman, Mayor Aubrey Starkey, to investigate the facts of the situation. "No definite action was taken at the meeting," Starkey said. "A final decision will be made at the regular city council meeting Monday night." Starkey indicated that the facts of the case did not appear to warrant a dismissal. Schoonover appealed to the committee after Jones allegedly fired him for his handling of a recent case involving a man arrested for illegal possession of slot machines. Jones has said publicly that he cannot work with Schoonover under any circumstances. He has been police chief in Chiloquin for two years and was formerly in Lakeview. Besides Starkey, other members of the police committee are Luther Shirer and George Hobbs.

Film On Rabies Will Be Shown

The general public has been invited to see a special rabies film called "Rabies Can Be Prevented" to be shown Friday night at 7:30 p.m. at the Klamath Auditorium. The 30 minute film is being shown by the Klamath Dog Fanciers and President Robert Starbuck emphasized that the public is invited to come and see the film. Dr. Vernon Reitan, veterinarian, will talk following the film presentation. A meeting of the Klamath Dog Fanciers will follow the film showing.

Roast Smokes Up Building

A roast at Greer Apartments, 710 Main Street, was so well-done Wednesday morning, it smoked up both floors of the apartment building and brought city firemen to the scene with smoke ejectors. Firemen said no damage resulted. City firemen also were called to the home of Jim Ray, 245 Huron Street, Wednesday evening. An oil furnace "exploded" they said, scattering soot around the home's basement. No other damage was caused.

Rescue Method Sessions Set

The new rescue method of mouth-to-mouth breathing is being demonstrated on a 30-minute film which has been shown to a number of groups such as policemen and firemen as well as to schools by Jim Cronin, Pacific Telephone Northwest. Cronin reported that the film has been well received, and that he is willing to show it to any interested group. He will have the film until Dec. 15. It is a 16 mm film.
