Improvement boosted the stock market level to the upside late this afternoon in active trading. Volume for the day was estimated at 1.2 million shares compared with 1.5 million Thursday. Gains of fractions to a point or 2 among key stocks outnumbered losers.

H. J. Heinz jumped 2 points following news of a raised dividend and a 3-for-1 stock split proposal. International Business Machines, subject of stock split rumors, halved an early gain of about 8.

North American Aviation was bought briskly, rising more than a point.

General Electric and Westinghouse Electric traded about unchanged about canceling early losses. The companies are involved in a big antitrust suit.

U.S. Steel started slow then spurred to a gain of well over a point.

DuPont picked up more than 2 points. Gains of about a point were scored by Jones Laughlin, Ford, U.S. Gypsum and Johnson & Johnson.

Lionel dropped a point on profit taking.

U.S. government bond prices faltered but held substantial gains for the day. Corporate bonds edged upward.

Kennedy To Take Rest; Stevenson Mulls Offer

WASHINGTON (AP)—President-elect John F. Kennedy, relaxing his pace after inviting Adlai Stevenson and two others to join his new administration, takes his wife and new son to Florida today.

Before the early afternoon departure for Palm Beach, Kennedy planned a round of conferences with callers at his Georgetown home. But only two were listed, compared with the 16 he saw in a busy day Thursday.

The schedule called for breakfast with Rep. Hale Boggs, D-La., and a meeting with Dr. Walt Rostow, a specialist in Soviet and U.S. economics. Rostow, now with Massachusetts Institute of Technology, has been mentioned for high office in the new administration.

Stevenson was offered the job of U.S. ambassador to the United Nations. Although he gave the impression he will accept, he withheld an immediate decision. He said he wanted to talk the matter over further with Kennedy but emphasized that "I have tried to make it clear that I want to help."

Kennedy announced the offer to Stevenson from his doorstep and described the U.N. post as one of the three or four most important in the administration.

Then he said of Stevenson: "I can think of no American who would fill this responsibility with greater distinction."

Earlier, Kennedy offered government jobs to two other callers, Byron Leslie (Whizzer) White of Denver and John J. Hooker Jr. of Nashville, Tenn. Both said they hadn't decided yet.

Just what was offered them wasn't announced.

White, a Denver lawyer and long-time friend of Kennedy, has been mentioned for the job of attorney general or solicitor general. Hooker, also an attorney and a Kennedy campaign worker, was rumored to have been offered a Justice Department job.

In another major doorstep announcement, Kennedy said he will ask Congress to establish a department of urban affairs—a new cabinet position to deal with such problems as slum clearance.

Legislation to do this is now being drafted, Kennedy said, and "I hope to put it up to Congress by this winter."

For Stevenson, who reportedly has long coveted the job of secretary of state, the offer of the U.N. ambassadorship could have been something of a disappointment. But he didn't show it.

Nor did a big throng of Georgetown University students, some of them carrying homemade signs urging Stevenson's appointment as secretary of state.

Stevenson, smiling broadly, got a rousing cheer as he arrived at the Kennedy house on foot. There was another big cheer when he emerged with Kennedy and still another when Kennedy announced the job offer.

Stevenson said he appreciated Kennedy's confidence in him.

"I share his view about the difficulty and the importance of this assignment," he added. The United Nations is the very center of our foreign policy and its effectiveness is indispensable to the peace and the security of the world."

Stevenson was vague about just what he wants to discuss further before announcing his decision.

Girl Hurt When Hit In Hospital

Karla Hunt, 8, a Mills School pupil, was struck and injured by a car Friday morning while waiting for a school bus at the corner of Shasta Way and Washburn Way.

She was taken to Klamath Valley Hospital by Peace Ambulance for treatment. Personnel there said her condition appeared satisfactory at 11 a.m. Further examination was under way.

City police said the girl suffered head lacerations and possible other injuries.

Officers said evidence indicates the girl dashed in front of a car driven by Sharon W. Davidson, 21, 2205 Patterson Street. The collision was unavoidable, they said.

The little girl is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Hunt, 2466 Pershing Way.

Coed Case Stalemated, Police Say

PORTLAND (AP)—Police continued the investigation today but said they had nothing new in the slaying of a college student and the probable abduction of his coed friend.

What had been thought a good lead turned out Thursday to be a case of mistaken observation, deputies said. They investigated a tip that the missing Beverly Ann Allen, 19, Port Townsend, Wash., had been seen in company with two men at Olympia Nov. 27 and 30.

Thurston County Sheriff Clarence Van Allen said, however, the description of the clothing did not match that worn by the Allen girl.

Multnomah County sheriff's Capt. Gordon Auburn said tips continued to come in today on the missing girl, thought kidnapped by whoever killed her boy friend, Larry Ralph Peyton, 19, Portland.

All clues are being investigated, Auburn said.

Alex Rosborough, Author And Adventurer, Dies

YREKA — Alex J. Rosborough, an author, miner, adventurer and a near-inventor in this area, died at Siskiyou County General Hospital here Thursday, Dec. 8. He suffered a stroke last month.

Funeral services will be in St. Joseph's Catholic Church Saturday at 10 a.m. Girdner's Funeral Chapel here is in charge of arrangements. Interment will be in Oakland.

Rosborough, 96, was born Aug. 20, 1865, in the family home on Yama Street. He was the son of Judge A. M. Rosborough, who distinguished himself as a special Indian agent. He was appointed by the government in 1853 and made responsible for reducing friction between Indians and settlers in Northern California and Southern Oregon.

Borrowing from the many papers, letters and other documents his father left, Rosborough for years wrote historical articles for a column in the Oakland Tribune.

He later condensed these writings and added them to originals to compile his big history of Siskiyou County, "Out West with the Pioneers." The book has been published.

A nephew, Alex A. J. Gardiner of Oakland, plans to crusade for the book's publication. The material contains history never before published.

Rosborough entered the University of California in 1887 and studied medicine, then mining engineering. When he was graduated, he spent time in California's Mother Lode gold region examining, sampling and reporting.

He was a Roman Catholic and attended mass at St. Joseph's Church each Sunday and feast day. He served as church acolyte as a boy.

Until he turned 90 and was too infirm to continue the spots, Rosborough hunted and angled. He drove his own car until last June.

He was a member of the Siskiyou County Historical Society and the Siskiyou County Pioneer Club.

He is survived by the widow, Viola, Lakeview; his father, Percy E. Pollard in Nevada; two sons, Odell Anderson, Japan, and Herbert A. Lakeview; four daughters, Mrs. Ruth Hodges, Oakland, Mrs. Sherrill Cary, Klamath Falls, and Cinda and Susan, Lakeview; three brothers, Mike Pollard, Dos Palos, Calif., Percy Hagerman, Idaho, and George of Idaho Falls; one sister, Mabel Burns, Boise, and five grandchildren.

Briton Hints At Chou Visit

LONDON (AP) — Prime Minister Harold Macmillan dropped a broad hint today that when the time is ripe he may invite Premier Chou En-lai of Red China to visit Britain.

The prime minister made it clear to questioners in the House of Commons, however, he does not consider "such an invitation would be useful at the present time."

Macmillan also said he would consider a suggestion to undertake a visit to Peking in any future journey he makes to the Far East.

Corvallis Man Sent To Prison

CORVALLIS (AP)—William D. Bloor, 37, the father of 7 children, was sentenced to 13 years in the state prison Wednesday on a charge of rape of a 12-year-old girl.

It was the second time Bloor had been sentenced on the charge. The first time, early in 1959, he drew a 20-year term.

It was after he had served almost two years that an error was found in the original proceedings—a psychiatric report had not been presented to him as required by law.

A Marion County circuit court ordered him returned to Benton County for re-sentencing. Bloor failed in an attempt to get a new trial, and Judge Fred McHenry, who pronounced the original sentence, ordered him back to prison for not more than 13 years.
