

Law Requires Judges Quit

SALEM (AP)—Some Oregon judges may leave the bench well ahead of schedule because of a new law requiring them to retire at 75.

Voters approved 578,471 to 123,000.

Disappearance Of Woman, 62, Still Mystery

MEDFORD (AP)—State police said today they still are puzzled by the disappearance of a 62-year-old woman from her home near the town of Rogue River more than a year ago.

Mrs. Elsie Marie Campbell vanished from her home in the summer of 1959, police said.

Mrs. Campbell, a slight woman with tinted red hair, could not have left her home alone, since she could not move without a wheelchair, police said. A wheelchair was found in her home.

State police began investigating after friends became worried at not seeing Mrs. Campbell and feared an accident. A woman who served as Mrs. Campbell's nurse told police she had gone to visit relatives.

The case was reopened last Sept. 1 when the missing woman's niece, Mrs. Albert Angelo Tumelio of California, stopped at the Medford State Police to inquire about her aunt, who had not paid an expected visit last year to Mrs. Tumelio's mother in Idaho.

State police said Mrs. Campbell had withdrawn all her money from the bank and had sold her house and car, and had a total of about \$10,000. Mail to her rural route box had been returned to the post office with no forwarding address.

Sweet Home Man Killed

SWEET HOME (AP)—A Sweet Home man was killed Wednesday when he accidentally touched a high voltage power line while gathering mistletoe.

The victim was Robert Ray Fowler, 20, a companion, C. L. Camden, said Fowler was coming down from a tree after cutting the mistletoe when he touched the 2,300-volt line. The accident occurred near Highway 228, four miles east of Brownsville.

Fowler plunged 25 feet to the ground, apparently killed instantly.

He is survived by the widow, a five-month-old child, his parents and a sister, all at Sweet Home.

Mahan To Visit Church

Leo A. Mahan, special representative from the Watchtower Bible and Tract Society world headquarters in Brooklyn, New York, is visiting the Klamath Falls congregation of Jehovah's Witnesses this week. Highlight of Saturday's activity will be the talk by Mahan at 8 p.m. on the subject "Staying Awake With the Faithful and Discern Slave," followed by participation by the congregation in the service.

Guitarist Is Innocent Of Oregon Man's Death

GOODING, Idaho (AP)—An about involving innocent people, erstwhile guitarist was acquitted and freed early Friday after his trial on a charge of murder in the slaying of an Oregon motorist.

The jury chose to believe Roger Hall, 22, Crescent City, Calif., who testified Thursday that it was Emmett Spencer, 29, Sandy Hook, Ky., who pulled the trigger that killed Dr. John Hunt Jr. of Portland, Ore.

And Hall said he tried to prevent the shooting.

The state's star witness, Mary Catherine Hampton, 18, of Sandy Hook, testified that Spencer fired the fatal shot. But at another time on the stand she said she did not see who did it.

Miss Hampton, Hall and Spencer were all charged with the killing. Spencer is now in a Florida prison under death sentence for a murder there.

Charges were dropped against Miss Hampton last month. The prosecution said it did not have sufficient evidence.

However Miss Hampton was charged Thursday with murder in connection with the killing of Perry Ten Eyck, 51, Whittier, Calif., in August 1959, a few days before Miss Hampton, Spencer and Hall teamed up in Crescent City and went to Idaho.

But Miss Hampton's attorney said the California warrant was based on the word of Spencer, whom he described as a "maniacal killer" with no compunction.

Automobile commuter traffic in the San Francisco Bay Area has increased 50 per cent during the past five years.

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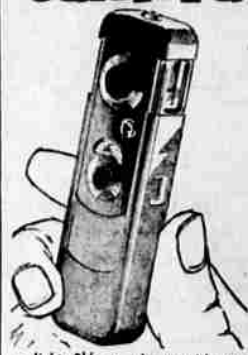
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
