Piemme estimates total cost of
collection lines, a booster station,
force main and sewage lagoons at
\$204,410. In his report, Piemme

Appling Sworn In By Justice

SALEM (AP) — Chief Justice
William McAllister of the Ore-
gon Supreme Court Thursday ad-
ministered the oath of office to
Secretary of State Howell Appling
Jr. and state Treasurer Howard
Belton.

Both men were appointees of
Gov. Mark O. Hatfield and both
won in the Nov. 8 general elec-
tion.

Appling, a political unknown
until his appointment two years
ago, piled up a total of some 415,
000 votes, second only to that of
Sen. Maurine B. Neuberger. Ap-
pling, 41, is a former Portland
businessman.

Belton, 67, served 22 years in
the Oregon Legislature. He was
a representative one term, then
served off and on in the state Sen-
ate and was Senate president in
1945.

Appling, Belton and Hatfield
form the Board of Control, which
supervises operation of state in-
stitutions.

In other action, councilmen
gave permission to the Rev. J.
Marvin Horn, pastor of Dorris
Church of the Nazarene, to allow
extension of the church when it
is built to the street line.

Owl Creek Project Nearly Completed

ALTURAS — The \$44,220 Owl
Creek construction project at Sur-
prise Valley is almost complete,
according to the Cedarville office
of the Soil Conservation Service.

Contractor I. O. Hudson, Susan-
ville, poured the last load of con-
crete during the week. He expect-
ed to move his men and equip-
ment out by the weekend.

Cold weather, deep snow and
rain have caused construction to
slow down during the last month,
but nevertheless, the entire job
will be completed as planned.

Some additional ditch work re-
mains to be done by the Owl
Creek water users.

This, however, will be carried
out in plenty of time so the en-
tire system may be in operation
by next spring.

The pouring of some 300 cubic
yards of reinforced concrete in
the project was done by Drace
Foundation's Ready Mix Company,
of Alturas. The first load was
poured about the middle of Oc-
tober.

In addition the G. C. William-
son Company of Chico installed
940 feet of underground reinforced
concrete pipe. At present, equip-
