Rotarynans Adopt Tiny Italian Girl

YREKA — A tiny dark-haired 7-year-old girl, Elisa Galano of Foggia, Italy, was recently adopted by the Yreka Rotarynans through the Foster Parents Plan.

At the meeting of the Yreka group held Nov. 28, members heard a report on the little girl as given by Mrs. Lynn Cecil. The report told how Elisa's father died of leukemia in October, 1959. Elisa lives with her mother and four sisters in Foggia, Italy, on a social security pension of \$10.50 per month. They own a house that has one room and a kitchen, also indoor hygienic facilities.

The Yreka Rotarynans are allowed through the Foster Parents Plan to send Elisa one letter a month. It is translated and airmailed to her. Also, one food or clothing package may be sent each week. Under the plan the little girl will receive \$2 a month, plus food and clothing supplies and special medical care. It costs \$180 a year to adopt a child through the plan.

The Rotarynans met at the home of Mrs. Ernest Johnson, with Mrs. Donald Meamber assisting with hostess duties. The 16 members present enjoyed a dessert course.

Mrs. Harold Coleman brought the mystery prize for the evening, a beautiful doll, which will be sent to the group's newly adopted child.

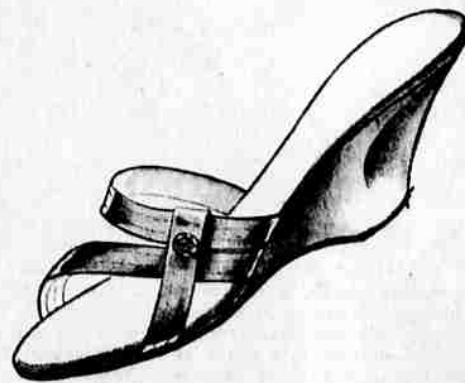
DO-IT-YOURSELF FINISH

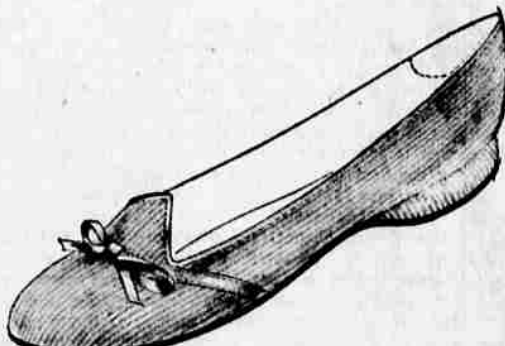

HOME EXTENSION

Forty leaders were trained in Knauss and Mrs. Armal Stump, leader training meetings for the lesson on fabric identification held Nov. 29, 30 and Dec. 1, reports Mrs. Ruth Dyer, county extension agent, Klamath County homemakers will be given this lesson in unit meetings during the month of January.

In this lesson, Mrs. Dyer says, it will be suggested to the homemakers to read the fiber label for clues to clothing care. They will become familiar with the Fiber Labeling Acts and will learn the generic name and trademarks for many of the most common fibers on the market.
