Nylon Pajamas: News In Print

The latest production of the pajama game is playing strictly to home audiences. Staged by lingerie designers, it has among its stars some vibrant new prints of Du Pont nylon which are transforming the pants-and-jacket idea into a new look for lounging that is chic and madly feminine.

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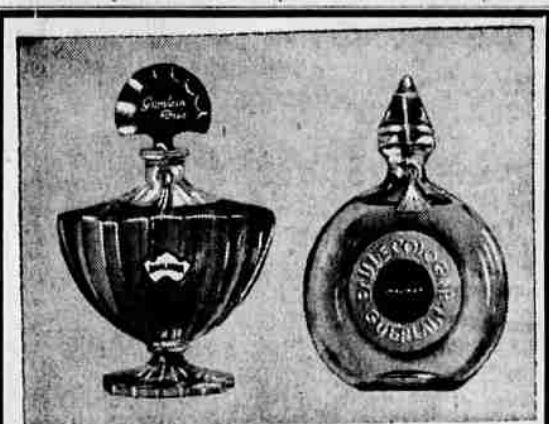
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
