Mrs. Morton was Ruth Hitchcock, born in Modesto. When a small girl, she moved with her parents to Trinity County, and later the family lived in Klamath Falls. While there, Mrs. Morton attended school, until the family made another move to Portland, where she met her husband-to-be, Matt Morton.

He was born in Kellerton, Ia. He tells how his family traveled from Iowa to Nebraska, then to Centralia, Wash., and finally to The Dalles. The next move was made by covered wagon to Willow Creek, a district of Shasta Valley in Siskiyou County in 1894. The trip, he said, took 20 days.

It was on this ranch that the newlyweds made their first home after their wedding in Burney on Nov. 24, 1910. Mrs. Morton's sister, Mrs. Lois Everett of Mount Shasta, who had served as her bridesmaid at the wedding, was present at the 50th wedding anniversary event. Bert Hitchcock, Mrs. Morton's brother, best man at the wedding, was unable to be present.

The Mortons resided at the Willow Creek ranch until 1951, when they moved to Yreka. In addition to their three children, they have five grandchildren and six great-grandchildren.
