LOS ANGELES (UPI)—Movie king Clark Gable's estate valued at more than \$1 million, went to his widow, Kay, except for one bequest to his first wife.

Josephine Dillon, 75, drama coach and first wife of the 59-year-old actor, was bequeathed

the home in North Hollywood, Calif., in which she has resided for years.

Superior Judge Frank S. Balthis admitted the will to probate Friday when it was uncontested. The document was dated Sept. 19, 1955. Gable, who died Nov. 16 of a heart attack, was about to become a father for the first time when he died. Kay's child is due early next year.
