

GOP National Chairman Declares Voting Check Would Take 2 Years

WASHINGTON (UPI)—GOP National Chairman Thruston B. Morton says President-elect John F. Kennedy will have been in the White House nearly two years by the time Republican efforts to upset election results in Illinois and

Texas are settled. By then, he said, it will be too late to reverse the election outcome and make Vice President Richard M. Nixon the chief executive.

Morton said in a TV interview Sunday (ABC—Issues and Answers) that there always was a possibility that Nixon could be elected president when the electoral votes are counted next Monday if Illinois' 27 votes were shifted from Kennedy and some unpledged southern electors backed the Republican.

But, Morton said, "As a realist, I don't think there is a chance."

He said he had been told by Republican lawyers that if a recount were held in Chicago's Cook County, Illinois would go for Nixon. Some Republicans charge that vote frauds enabled Kennedy to roll up a huge majority in Cook County which helped to carry the state by less than 9,000 votes.

But, Democratic Sen. Paul H. Douglas denied that any evidence of fraud had been produced in his home state of Illinois. "The whole matter has been blown up out of all proportion to its real importance," Douglas said in another TV interview (NBC—Meet the Press). He said a recount in Illinois would show Kennedy picking up enough votes in the traditionally Republican downstate area to offset any Nixon gains in Chicago.

Morton's claim that 18 months to two years will pass before the Illinois and Texas fights are resolved is based on Republican plans to take to court their charges of election irregularities in the states.

Urge Christmas Parties Be Dry

SALEM (AP)—Oregon business and industrial leaders should keep this year's office Christmas parties dry, the chairman of the Oregon Traffic Safety Commission said Monday.

Every December, several Oregon residents are killed on their way home from cocktail parties, said Vern Hill. "In my book, those who arrange these parties and then permit their employees or guests to drive home after drinking are as guilty as the person behind the wheel in an accident or death should result," he said.
