

Late Judge May Be Last In His Post

BLY—Dale B. "Snuffy" Smith, who died Sunday in a car accident, may have been the last of a long line of justices who presided in Sprague River Justice Court here.

Gov. Mark Hatfield, when queried Wednesday morning, said he will appoint a justice of the peace to replace Smith providing the county court wants the office continued.

He said he has written the court to ask about continuation of the office. The court was scheduled to meet in regular session Wednesday morning.

One county commissioner said that at first glance abolition of the justice court here would appear to be the economical thing to do.

He indicated final judgment would depend on further study. Meanwhile, Bly residents formed hastily for a counterattack when they learned late Tuesday of the possible abolition of their court.

They contrived a petition and obtained 17 signatures Tuesday night for presentation to the county court Wednesday asking that discussion concerning the court be held over until the regular meeting Friday.

The county court during its morning session asked District Attorney Dale Crabtree to look up laws governing whether abolition of a justice court is within the province of the county court, whether the governor at his own discretion may or may not abolish the court, and whether the governor need ask the county court for its recommendation.

Crabtree was deep in his research just before noon. One way or the other, said County Court Judge Robert Walker, the issue will require a lot of discussion and study before it is resolved.

He said the issue is too young for action today and that it certainly will be discussed at Friday's meeting.

At least two Bly residents indicated they were planning to attend the county court meeting.

They contend that a court should be maintained to serve the residents of Bly, Beatty and Sprague River. Without it they would have to come to Klamath Falls for court service.

So far during 1960, the court has handled 82 cases and has taken in \$1,558.50. The Bly justice of the peace receives a salary of \$2,500 annually.

Smith was killed instantly early Sunday morning on Ivory Pine Road when his car pitched over an embankment and pinned him beneath it.

Sheriff Murray "Red" Britton who investigated the accident with deputies said Smith apparently fell asleep at the wheel.

Klamath County's Share Of Forest Revenue Down Slightly To \$730,809

Although Klamath County's 1960 list of money receivers, Lane County, with \$2,507,686.67, and Douglas, Linn and Clackamas counties topped Klamath's total receipts.

Mrs. Cook received a check for \$730,809.16 Monday from the federal government as the county's share of the sale of timber and forest products from national forests. Last year's share was \$754,689.34. National forest money for the state of Oregon was up almost \$1 1/2 million this year.

Klamath County, which was fourth last year, was fifth on the list this year.

Three fourths of the money, or \$548,106.87, will go into the county road fund and the remainder will be used for county school support.

County Engineer Jack Kalinski said a portion of the money will be used to strengthen the surface of 14.8 miles of the Diamond Lake Highway and to surface 16.3 miles of road from the Lake of the Woods Junction across McAllister Springs to the West Forest Bound-

ary in Jackson County. Grading work has already begun on the latter project.
