

State May Be Facing Hopeless Task At College Level, Legislator Says

SALEM (AP) — Rep. Robert Duncan, D-Medford, said Thursday at a legislative fiscal conference that he was terrified by the prospect of doubling college enrollment in the next 10 years in Oregon.

Duncan, who is speaker of the House of Representatives, said he believed the state is faced with almost an impossible task of accommodating all of these students. He said he seriously questioned whether it could be done.

He asked Chancellor John R. Richards, head of the state system of higher education, if the state system was taking advantage of educational foundation money for research on educational techniques.

He asked if the legislature should consider providing more money for developing new educational techniques.

Richards said that Oregon's educational television system is the most advanced in the nation and it will reach 75 per cent of the television sets in the state by Jan. 15, 1961.

In a few years, he said, it should reach by relay station or directly some 95 per cent of the sets in the state.

He said there is a teaching research laboratory at Oregon College of Education and the System of Higher Education is working with the Department of Education on a major research proposal seeking foundation money. He said he will be visiting these foundations early next week.

Richards said he doubted that the present System of Higher Education can accommodate all potential students in the next 10 years. He said he believed the development of a community college program around the state will help.

Richards said the community college program should be under local control rather than higher education control and should be an upward development of high schools.

Henry Cabell, chairman of the state Board of Higher Education, said because of confusion over the intent of the 1959 legislature it probably will be necessary to delay the full operation of a school of Social Work until the fall of 1962.

Sen. Jean Lewis, D-Portland, said she wrote the legislative resolution and there was no confusion. She said the legislature's intent was for the School of Social Work to be open by the fall of 1961. She said this was clearly stated in the resolution.

Leo Margosian of the Department of Finance told the conference that the amount budgeted for public welfare in the next biennium will be second only to that for the highways. He said that prior to this higher education always has cost more than welfare.

Margosian said that the state provided \$43,712,000 of the more than \$100 million budgeted for welfare.

Henry Kane, executive secretary of the Legislative Interim Committee on Public Welfare, summarized the findings and recommendations of that committee.

It urged no change in the present commission form of administration. Gov. Mark Hatfield proposed considerable change in the welfare department in his reorganization proposal.

The committee also asked that the governor reconsider his order to the state Public Welfare Commission to move from Portland to Salem.

The committee also urged that a one-year limit be placed on the length of time Oregon will continue to grant assistance to a recipient who has left the state. There is now no limit.

They said they discussed the proposed national seashore park on the Oregon coast near Florence, economic development, state government reorganization, federal aid to education, and offshore oil drilling.

They said the discussions were quite general.

"We found that differences of opinion in some areas don't mean that we can't agree on other things," Mrs. Neuberger said.

She said that she and the governor "agreed that we could

agree" on the seashore park, but said she can't tell yet just what her park legislation will propose.

They agreed that Congress should pass a housing bill, which both described as a benefit to Oregon's lumber industry.

They also agreed that Oregon's economic problems are caused by the fact that the state depends too much on seasonal industries, such as lumber and agriculture.

Sen. Neuberger said the first order of business for her will be to seek ratification of the treaty with Canada, under which water resources of the Columbia Basin will be developed jointly.

She said she favors giving educational aid to the states, and then let the states decide how to spend the money. But she conceded there isn't much chance of passing such a bill.

Hatfield said he favors aid limited to school construction, fearing that other forms of aid would subject school districts to federal domination.

Mrs. Neuberger replied that she doesn't want federal control of education, either, and that her proposal would be a safeguard against it.

Police Plan Next Steps

Attending Thursday's conference, called by Sheriff Francis Lambert, were Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton, FBI agents, city police.

Lambert said some conclusions were reached but he did not reveal them. He said, however, that Mr. and Mrs. Robert Allan, parents of the missing girl, would be asked for samples of the girl's blood.

"This could tell us quite a bit. It could indicate part of the blood found in Larry's car was Beverly's or that it was not."
