Nittany Lions Hand Ducks Lopsided Defeat

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — The powerful Penn State football team gave the University of Oregon a sound trouncing, 41-12, before a sparse, chilled crowd in the second annual Liberty Bowl game Saturday.

Twice Oregon moved out as though it was going to spring an upset over the favored Staters, but it could not match Penn State power.

An Oregon fumble in the second quarter and two pass interceptions by State's Dick Hoak in the last quarter made the scoring lopsided. State tallied three touchdowns in each of those periods.

Oregon opened the game in impressive fashion and similarly

had no trouble moving downfield at the opening of the second half. But the second and fourth periods were wholly Penn State's, a team called by some the strongest in the East this season.

Oregon speedster Cleveland Jones went out on the first play after the opening kickoff, injured in catching a pass.

The temperature hovered near freezing and 16,624 fans were in the stands.

The first touchdown came early. Quarterback Dave Grosz threw an 11-yard pass on the first play from his own 20, to little Cleveland Jones, who was hurt on the play. The next series was held by Penn State and Grosz punted

a fourth and 15 situation. But couldn't move either and punted out on Oregon's 12.

Then came the march. Dave Grayson ripped off 26 around right end. Grosz passed to end Paul Bauge for 17, then Grayson, Duane Cargill and Mickey Bruce took turns driving to the 15. On an option Grosz went to the 1, then plunged over. Jones' kick was wide.

That kick became seemingly important in a very brief time, for Penn State moved steadily down the field from the kickoff and scored, then kicked the point for a 7-6 lead. The key play in the scoring series came when Oregon had forced Penn State into

for Penn State by now was sending its big backs through the Oregon defense, and State scored its second touchdown with Al Gursky going over.

State's next kickoff went to tackle Steve Barnett who fumbled and Penn State recovered on the Oregon 29 and again, with quarterback Galen Hall mixing in a pass to end Henry Oppmann, they scored. Dick Hoak's rollout was the counter and for the third time State's conversion kick was good.

The half cut short an Oregon burst in which Grosz passed from midfield to Dave Grayson who grabbed the ball from the hands of three defenders and was downed on Penn State's 12.

The intermission seemed to give Oregon a lift and it moved quickly into threatening position with a long pass from Grosz to Mickey Bruce who was downed a yard short of the goal. Bruce Snyder fumbled and Penn State recovered but that did not halt the Webfoots long.

They held State and Grayson received the punt on State's 38. Grosz passed to Bruce for 28, then Grayson raced off right tackle for the score. An effort to make up for the missed conversion failed, a pass attempt falling short, and it was Penn State 21, Oregon 12.

From then on it was all Penn State which wrapped up the game long before the final gun.

A series of hard driving plays made it 28-12, then came the breaks on alert defensive work by Hoak that shut Oregon out of all hope. Right after the kickoff Hoak intercepted a Grosz pass and returned to Oregon's 17. On the second play Hoak raced 11 yards for the score and this time the kick was wide and it was 34-12.

This was repeated. A Grosz pass on the first series of downs after the kickoff was deflected, Hoak grabbed it and was downed on Oregon's 33. On the third play Dick Pae was all alone and gathered in a pass for the touchdown which, with the conversion made it 41-12, and that was the way it ended.

Packers Win Division Title With 35-21 Win Over Rams

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The Green Bay Packers sailed into their first National Football League division title in 16 years Saturday, winging to a 35-21 victory over the Los Angeles Rams.

Performing before a crowd of 53,445 in Memorial Coliseum, plus a nationwide television audience, the Packers' quarterback Bart Starr and right halfback Boyd Dowler connected with a spectacular 91-yard pass in the second quarter. It was the go-ahead score for the long starving Packers and the first of three explosive touchdowns by Green Bay in the second period.

The victory gave Green Bay the clear title to the Western Conference, erasing any possible playoff with the San Francisco 49ers, Detroit Lions or the defending champions Baltimore Colts.

Green Bay now goes into a playoff Dec. 26 with the Eastern Conference champions, the Philadelphia Eagles in Philadelphia.

A jubilant squad of Packers carried their coach, Vince Lombardi, halfway across the field after the final gun.

The outcome was their eighth triumph of the season against four losses, a tribute to the Lombardi regime since he took over at Green Bay in 1959.

The long-range aerial attack

paid off for the Packers. Starr completed touchdown strikes to Max McGee for 57 yards, to Dowler for the 91-yarder, and Paul Hornung completed the devastation through the air lanes with a 40-yard scoring pass to McGee.

Defensive halfback Paul Winslow blocked a Ram punt in the end zone and recovered it for another Packer touchdown. A controversial pass interference penalty against Los Angeles set up the fifth and final Green Bay score with Hornung piling over from the one.

Raiders Bury Denver Club In Basement

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — The Oakland Raiders buried the Denver Broncos in the American Football League's Western Division cellar, 48-10, Saturday.

Sharing honors for the Raiders were quarterback Tom Flores and Babe Parilli, halfback Tony Teressa and fullback Billy Lott.

Flores scored on a one-yard sneak and seven-yard run. Teressa plunged one yard for another. Oakland exploded for 31 points in the final period before an estimated 7,000 in Candlestick Park.

Parilli tallied on a one-yard sneak then threw touchdown passes of 44 yards to Nyle McFarland and 21 to Charlie Hardy.

Larry Barnes booted field goals of 18 and 28 yards, plus six conversions.

Denver's Gene Mingo, the league's leading scorer, collected only four points — a conversion and a 37-yard field goal.

Denver's touchdown came on a six-yard pass from Frank Tripucka to Lionel Taylor in the second period.

Victory left Oakland in third place.

Field Goal Earns Texans 3-3 Bluebonnet Bowl Tie

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP) — Ray Poage, a 205-pound sophomore, provided the power for a 71-yard fourth quarter surge that set up a 20-yard field goal by Dan Petty and permitted the Texas Longhorns to tie Alabama 3-3 Saturday in the second annual Bluebonnet Bowl.

Petty's kick came with just 4 minutes 1 second remaining in the nationally televised game.

Until Poage cut loose with his power plays it had appeared the tough defensive battle was to have been settled by a 30-yard third quarter field goal by Tommy Brooker, a 206-pound Alabama junior.

An interference penalty at the Alabama 18 gave Texas another chance on the final play of the game but Petty's third field goal attempt of the day was wide. A third period kick also was wide after Texas had moved 58-yards to the Alabama 19.

An 18-yard punt return to the Texas 34 started the drive that led to Alabama's field goal. Brooker's kick was on the third play after Bobby Skelton passed 14 yards to Norbie Ransom to the Longhorn 14.

Among the fighters already matched are a number of Oregon novice champions and lads that have competed in the National AAU amateurs.

The completed bouts range from the 100 to 160 pound weight classifications but Jones noted that among the added fights he will pair some of the fly and paperweight fighters that have always proved such crowd-pleasers.

The Burns group is handled by Ray Thornberg who has produced a number of amateurs that have gained national recognition. Thornberg and his club are in constant demand for programs all over the state.

Leading the Burns contingent is a pair of 130 pound brothers, Bob and Keith Capps, who are paired with Ozzie Gallagher and Leon Weeks, both of Chillicothe, in a double main event.

Kicking Specialists Go Great In 1960

The foot was back in football during the 1960 college season. The kicking specialists were more successful with their punting, extra points and field goals than in any previous season.

Teams and individuals set all kind of kicking records, including net yards advanced by punting and points gained by field goals.

No fewer than 38 major college games were won by three-pointers, compared to 23 in 1959 and 15 in 1958. Ten of the 17 games won or tied during the final minute of play were pulled out of the fire by field goals. Two of the winning kicks came on the last play.

Ed Dyas of Auburn led the record-smashing assault on modern placekicking records, boosting 13 field goals, nearly double the former mark of seven set by Karl Holwarth of Wisconsin in 1959.

Two others — Durward Pennington of Georgia and Tommy Wells of Georgia Tech, with eight each — also topped the old record.

NCAA modern records cover the period since 1937 in which official service bureau statistics have been kept.

Dyas, whose three-pointers defeated Kentucky, Georgia Tech, Florida and Georgia, also set records for most points scored in one season by kicking (51) and most games won by field goals (4). He booted four field goals in 1949 to give him a record total of 17 in two seasons.

Dick Fitzsimmons, a Denver U. end, won individual punting honors, averaging 44.2 yards for 25 punts. His longest was one of 67 yards.

Low Average Wins For Buc

CINCINNATI (AP)—The National League made it official Saturday that Dick Groat of the world championship Pittsburgh Pirates won the 1960 league batting championship but with the lowest winning average since 1919.

Official averages showed Groat, with 186 hits in 573 times at bat in 138 games, finished with an average of .325. Groat, who missed a number of games near the end of the season because of an injury, nosed out Norm Larker of the Los Angeles Dodgers by two percentage points.

The last time a batting championship was won with a lower average was in 1919 when Edd Roush of the Cincinnati Reds led the league with a .319 mark.

Milwaukee's Hank Aaron, who led the league in 1959 with .355, finished in a 12th and 13th place tie this year with Eddie Kasko of the Cincinnati Reds with .332.

Angels Name Tub-Thumper

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — The Los Angeles Angels, moving full steam to get an organization set up for the 1961 American League baseball season, selected Palm Springs, Calif., as their training site and named a publicity director.

General Manager Fred Haney telephoned both announcements to his local officers from Chicago, where he spent the entire day Friday conferring with major league teams that train in Arizona on a spring exhibition schedule.

The publicity director's job went to Irv Kaze, formerly of the Hollywood Stars club of the Pacific Coast League and later assistant publicity director of the Pittsburgh Pirates.

Bill Skovron of the Yankees finished fifth in American League slugging last season with a .528 mark.
