CORVALLIS (AP) — Oregon State snapped a three-game losing streak and defeated Arizona State, 65-54, in its home opener before 3,103 fans here Friday night.

It was Oregon State's second victory and avenged a 79-77 loss to the Arizonans earlier in the month.

Oregon State coach Slats Gill, in his third year as head man, tried a new starting combination that worked. It was made up of two sophomores, Steve Pauly and Gary Rossi, and three veterans: Rob Jacobson, Jay Carty and Karl Anderson.

Pauly and Carty topped the OSC scorers with 12 points each although the visitors' Larry Armstrong was the game's top point-maker with 17.

Billikens Belt Cincinnati; Eye Crown

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS. Now that Oscar Robertson is making life miserable for the pros instead of the collegians, someone other than the university of Cincinnati may have a chance to win the Missouri Valley basketball title.

At least, the St. Louis Billikens think so today after their first triumph over Cincinnati since four years ago when St. Louis last won the league championship. Cincinnati has taken it the past three years.

While the Billikens defeated the Bearcats 57-40 Friday night, three major tournaments got the jump on the others upcoming during the hectic holiday action. In the Steel Bowl, Pittsburgh downed Colgate 78-62 and Duquesne whipped Tennessee 79-64. Auburn nosed out Virginia Tech 76-43 and Alabama swamped Baylor 72-55 in the Birmingham classic. In the City of Roses tourney, Portland (Ore.) downed Santa Clara 43-41 and Gonzaga beat Iona of New Rochelle, N. Y., 73-64.

In the Bluebonnet Bowl (not a tournament since pairings were set in advance), Houston edged Oklahoma State 56-54 and Oklahoma defeated Texas A & M 69-56.

In other major games, Kansas State knocked off fifth-ranked North Carolina 77-69 in overtime and Kansas beat Michigan State 93-69 in a doubleheader. In a twin bill at Madison Square Garden, St. John's ran over Ohio University 78-50 and NYU handed Holy Cross its first setback 79-65.

St. Louis, which boosted its season mark to 4-1, had a relatively easy time against Cincinnati. The Billikens led all the way, opening an eight-point lead at halftime and increasing it to 20 points near the end. Glen Makowski had 17 points for the winners.

Colgate and Tennessee both were knocked from the unbeaten ranks in the Steel Bowl. Pitt led Colgate 32-25 at halftime and after the Red Raiders later closed the gap to one point, the Panthers pulled away to a 12-point edge. Duquesne took an 11-10 lead over Tennessee in the third minute and was never headed. New Twayman paced Duquesne with 30 points.

Auburn's unbeaten Tigers were deadly from the free-throw line, connecting on 36 of 43 attempts. Virginia Tech, which hit only nine of 20 free throws, had a 32-30 edge in field goals. Alabama, which registered its first triumph of the season in the Birmingham classic windup, moved ahead of Baylor 35-30 at halftime. The Tide ran up a 15-point margin midway through the second half.

Brian Etheridge scored 23 points as Oklahoma turned back Texas A & M in the Bluebonnet nightcap. Tommy Thomson was the big man for Houston in its opening game triumph over Oklahoma State. State went without a field goal for the final 4½ minutes.

Elsewhere, LSU wiped out a 13-point deficit and defeated Texas Tech 73-69 in overtime. Iowa State rallied in the second half to beat Washington 63-60. Wake Forest, led by Len Chappell and Billy Packer, finished strong to whip Virginia 88-82 in the Atlantic Coast Conference. George Washington racked up a Southern Conference victory by holding off VMI 90-86. California tripped San Francisco 53-39. Oregon defeated Muhlenberg 84-67. California tripped San Francisco 53-39. Oregon State defeated Arizona State 65-54, and UCLA whipped Notre Dame 85-54.

The rangy Portlanders came from behind and defeated Santa Clara, 43-41, after Gonzaga had downed Iona of New Rochelle, N.Y., 73-64.

Interleague Trading Subdued This Year

Baseball's second annual interleague trading period ended at midnight Friday after a three-week stretch that found dealing considerably subdued from the pace set by swap-happy general managers a year ago.

From Nov. 21 until the deadline Friday night, there were only 10 transactions involving 23 players, eight of the interleague variety including three cash sales. The last one, several hours before the clock struck midnight, saw the new Washington club in the American League ship veteran left-hander Bobby Shantz to the world champion Pittsburgh Pirates in exchange for three minor leaguers — first baseman R.C. Stevens, third baseman Harry Bright and pitcher Benny Daniels.

Shantz, a key relief man for the New York Yankees last season, had been obtained by Washington only last Wednesday in the American League draft to stock its two new teams.

The only other last-day action was sale of left-hander Danny McDevitt by the Los Angeles Dodgers to the Yankees for a sum reported slightly above the \$200,000 waiver price.

Last year, when the interleague period made its debut, there were 15 deals involving more than 50 players.

The 1960 interleague trades were topped by the Dec. 3 swap that sent former American League batting champ Harvey Kuenn from the Cleveland Indians to the San Francisco Giants for left-hander Johnny Antonelli and outfielder Willie Kirkland.

Four days later Detroit traded second baseman Frank Bolling plus a player to be designated later to Milwaukee for outfielder Bill Bruton, second baseman Chuck Cottier, catcher Dick Brown and relief pitcher Terry Fox.

Thursday, the Braves were active again as they figured in a three-way deal with the Cincinnati Reds and the Chicago White Sox. In that one, Milwaukee traded pitchers Juan Pizarro and Joey Jay to the Reds for shortstop Roy McMillan. The Reds kept Jay and swapped Pizarro and right-hander Cal McLish to the White Sox for third baseman Gene Freese.

The other interleague trade of a major nature was Thursday's deal that sent right-hander Gene Conley to the Boston Red Sox with Frank Sullivan, another right-hander, going to the Philadelphia Phillies.

Friday night the Pelicans, always a little wary of the Bend club on their home floor, eventually cooled off the determined Lava Bears 61-49.

In the prelude the KU Jayvees swamped the Bend Jayvees 76-48. Given a chance to try out their

ball control strategy for the first time this season, the victorious Whitebirds put their pattern into operation with 50 seconds left in the third period when the Bears had chopped their margin to an eight-point spread and the game was running away at a torrid clip.

Bend put the Pelican stall to the full-court press test in the final period with bedlam reigning at the high school gym, but they failed to break up the stall or close the gap between the 49-39 third quarter score as Klamath continued to run out the clock.

The Bears had taken an early lead in the game, only to have Klamath catch fire and command leads of 19-9 at the end of the first stanza of play and 34-25 at halftime.

For the first time this season the Pelicans and their big men on the boards, Bruce Brickner, Gary Patzke and Ray Taylor, ran into some real competition as Bend's 6-5 Chuck deSully and teammate Rex Chambers, also 6-5, hauled in more than the Bears' share of rebounds for the night.

However, the Bears couldn't seem to find the range during the first half of the action and hit only 15 times from the field for the night. They were called 23 times on personal fouls, and their big guns deSully, Chambers and Jim Hawes fouled out.

Klamath, on the other hand, bucketed 21 field goals, 19 out of 34 from the charity land and was charged with 20 personal fouls.

All five of the Pelicans turned in outstanding defensive performances and earned praise from coach Dean White, especially Patzke on the backboards and guards Wally Palmberg and Freddie Biehn.

Palmberg scrapped all the way for the ball during the course of the game and held Mike Riley to eight points, while he in turn picked up 14 before he was forced out of the game on fouls.

Biehn also came through for the Pelicans on defense by keeping Bend's big scoring threat, Wally Donohue, in check, allowing him only three points.

Brickner played his usual good game by pumping in 15 counters and sparking the KU defense under the basket. Taylor and Wayne Dennis were also called upon to put down the Bend uprising.
