Plane Burns In Hangar

Two youths were released to the custody of their parents Saturday morning after a fire broke out in an airplane hangar on the Link River.

Slated to appear in juvenile court later are Roy Scott, 14, and Robert Johnson, 15. Firemen said the Scott boy had fallen into Lake Ewauna while hunting and the two had come to the hangar where they poured gasoline on the floor and ignited it to get dry.

The fire spread to the plane which was a total loss. The hangar, owned by Elbert Stiles of Klamath Falls, was valued at \$4,500.

A hole was burned through the roof of the hangar valued at \$1,500. Firemen responded to the call at 9:15 a.m.

State Must Alter Welfare Law

SALEM (AP) — Oregon can not meet the legal requirements of the new federal act for medical care to the aged unless it changes its welfare laws, Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton said Saturday.

The act authorizing medical assistance for the elderly through state welfare departments was passed by the last Congress.

Thornton said there were several requirements of the federal act which conflicted with present Oregon law. Included among these, he said, were residence requirements, lien provisions and public access to welfare records.

He pointed out that the Oregon Legislature convening in January could pass the necessary legislation without delay or hardship to the state's elderly citizens.

Babcock was arrested by Dunsmuir police Monday for driving without due caution near an automobile accident.

Five Die In Car Accident

ROSEVILLE, Calif. (UPI) — A head-on crash Friday night killed two mothers and three children in a crowded sedan on its way to a Mormon Church Christmas social.

Highway patrolmen said there were four more youngsters in the car when it slammed into another vehicle on Rocky Ridge Road, one mile east of here.

Four died Friday night: Driver Mrs. Margaret Doreen Case, 31, of Roseville, and her daughter, Donna Lorraine, 4; Mrs. Rosalee Butler, 25, of Roseville, and her son, David Scott, 3 months.

Today another of Mrs. Case's children, Susan, 10, died from injuries suffered in the collision.

Injured were Susan's brother, Brian, 12, and Brenda, Ray and

Thomas Butler, aged 7, 8 and 3. Highway Patrolman Emmanuel Staudinger said that Mrs. Case's car was struck from the rear by another vehicle, then bounced across the divided line and smashed into an automobile driven by Irl Bruce Robison, 37, of Sacramento, who suffered major injuries.

The driver of the car that struck Mrs. Case's vehicle, 17-year-old Richard Rogers of Roseville, escaped with minor injuries although his car overturned, Staudinger said.

To Enter Plea

Judge Joseph J. Thalhofer in district court Friday afternoon gave Herbert Garrison, Klamath Falls, until Monday at 9:30 a.m. to enter a plea for charges of furnishing liquor to a minor.

Garrison was committed to the county jail in lieu of \$100 bail, dinger said.

Ward Waives His Hearing

Arthur John Ward, 40, 914 Pine Street, charged with passing worthless checks and distributing part of the spoils to needy-looking homes, waived a preliminary hearing in district court Friday morning and was bound over to the grand jury by Judge Joseph J. Thalhofer.

District Attorney Dale Crabtree filed an information of felony against Ward last week. Ward subsequently was arraigned in district court and bail was set at \$1,000.

During Friday's appearance, Judge Thalhofer ordered Ward committed to the county jail in lieu of bail.

Board OKs Two Phases Of Policies

DUNSMUIR — Two phases of a school policy guide were adopted Tuesday night by the Dunsmuir Elementary School Board of Trustees.

One phase of the guide outlines functions, responsibilities and objectives of a school board as a governing body. The other deals with student behavior, including areas in which the school is responsible and corrective measures that may be taken when student attitudes and behavior are not as desired.

The remaining phases of the policy guide still being prepared deal with personnel, maintenance and transportation. Board members believe a written policy will be valuable to new board members and help provide understanding for parents, students, teachers, supervisors and others concerned with school matters.

In other business, Harold Baughman, a board member, suggested that school building inspectors be licensed and bonded.

The other board members concurred that some certification of building inspectors is needed on school building and maintenance contracts to insure the work is properly done. Use of a county-wide inspector was not considered necessary.

The board went on record as favoring continuance of paying half the cost of health insurance premiums for teachers, even if the teachers association changes insurance companies.
