## The 'What's-In-It' Mystery

NEW YORK—Wrap your Christmas presents in mystery packages and your "gifts" will have more fun than reading a "whodunit."

Mystery packages that look like what they're not can range from balloons full of money to a fake firecracker stuffed with home-knit socks. More ideas: roll a belt in a coffee can, nest a tiny bottle of perfume in layers of tissue in a huge hatbox, swirl something lacy—or colored beads—in a pretty jar.

Here are directions for gift wraps guaranteed to keep their contents a deep dark secret right up to the moment they're opened. Basic rule is never to keep anything in the box it came in; it's a dead give-away.

**Firecracker:** Tape paper and ribbon around a mailing tube. Insert present. For frills at ends, cut two pieces of tissue, each two feet long, eight inches wide. Fold over and over and cut four-inch slits down one edge. Curl tissue by pulling scissors up against it quickly but firmly—it's like curling paper ribbon. Stuff straight ends in tube and fluff out frills.

**Fake jackets:** Disguise names of books by making extra jackets out of gift paper. Letter labels and rubber-cement in place.

## Lakeview Couple Observes Fifty Years Of Marriage

LAKEVIEW—Several hundred guests gathered at the Indian Village banquet room Saturday afternoon, Dec. 3, to extend felicitations to Mr. and Mrs. Hugo Leyva on the occasion of their 50th wedding anniversary.

The celebration was arranged by their son, Gar (Gerald H.) and his wife, Helen, of Lexington.

The widely known couple looked back 50 years when they were married in the Methodist parsonage in Lakeview Saturday evening at 8 o'clock, Dec. 3, 1910, by the Rev. Melvin T. Wire, now of Salem, Mae Leyva, a native of Lake County, was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. Frank Barnes. Hugo Leyva was recently of Walnut Creek and San Francisco. In the news story at the time she was listed as wearing a "pretty white dress with orange blossoms." Attending them were Mr. and Mrs. Fred Keene (now of Bieber), the latter being the former Faye Barnes, a double cousin of the bride. The Keenes just recently celebrated their golden anniversary. Also present was Lena McShane, now Mrs. Stanley Hanson of Lakeview. The story also indicated that the old custom of carrying the bride and bridegroom made it difficult for them to leave on a wedding trip.

For the golden wedding reception Mrs. Leyva wore a pale blue lace dress and a corsage with two gold purple-throated orchids. Her original wedding dress of white wool batiste was worn during the afternoon by Lorraine Linneum, with a white rosebud corsage. Those assisting at the reception had corsages of yellow rosebuds. Bouquets of yellow and bronze chrysanthemums decorated

the tables and the banquet room. The wedding cake, topped by a white crown with white roses and gold leaves, was served by Mrs. Clarence Rinehart a long-time friend. At the coffee table was Mrs. Earl Cogburn, sister of Mrs. Leyva, and the punch was served by Mrs. O. W. Cutsforth of Lexington. Terry Linneum supervised the signing of the guest book. Others assisting were Mrs. Glen Terzich and Mrs. Duncan Linneum.

At the time of their marriage Hugo was working as a blacksmith for Leonard and Barnes in Lakeview, and later went into that business for himself. He was appointed game warden in the county in 1928 and went into the state police in 1944 in the same capacity when that body took over administration of game laws. That year he was appointed manager of the bird refuge at Summer Lake for the State Game Commission and was retired in February, 1956. However, he has been associated with other activities, especially that of the Lakeview Roundup with which he has worked since 1920, and is still the chief arranger for the annual barbecue breakfast each August.

Mrs. Leyva was employed in the county clerk's office and totaled 19 years there, serving with four different holders of the office. For a short time in the early 1920s they operated a confectionery and soft drinks parlor.

Gerald Hugo Leyva, or "Gar," is his better known, was their only child. He is manager of a flying service at Lexington. He and his wife, Helen, have two sons, Gregory and Hugo, both of whom were here for the celebration. Gregory is a commercial

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art student, and Hugo, recently married, is going into business with his father. Telegrams were received from the Reverend and Mrs. David St. George of Shorthills, N.J., formerly of St. Luke's Episcopal Church in Lakeview, and Mr. and Mrs. Gene Branson of Tulare. Blessings were requested by the Rev. Hal Hargreaves, pastor of St. Luke's.

Out-of-town guests included Mr. E. E. Linville and granddaughter, Marilyn Troxell, of Wilcox. The Linvilles are aunt and uncle of Mrs. Leyva and have recently celebrated their 64th wedding anniversary. They are also the grandparents of Louis Linville of Lakeview. Mrs. Leyva's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Barnes, had also celebrated their 64th anniversary before she died on March 16, 1954, and he Dec. 21, 1955.
