

US Lawn Tennis President Denies Amateur Netters Paid Under Table

"I know of no cases in this country where players are paid under the table," the president of the U.S. Lawn Tennis Association said in reply to comments by Davis Cup player Earl Buchholz on the integrity of the amateur game.

Buchholz, of St. Louis, and Barry MacKay, Dayton, Ohio, signed contracts in Sydney, Australia, Wednesday to play with Jack Kramer's professional tennis troupe. The two top U.S. stars were on the team which recently lost the interzone finals to Italy. The contracts promised each at least \$50,000 in three years.

In signing the pro contract, Buchholz remarked: "We have been taught to be honest and it

is always a very uncomfortable and dirty feeling for us to take money under the table as we do as amateurs."

George E. Barnes of Chicago, USLTA president, visiting in Houston, Tex., said in reply: "I feel sure that Mr. Buchholz is referring to world tennis and not to tennis in the United States. If that is so, then he is correct. Other countries do not observe the amateur rules as we do. I know of no cases in this country where players are paid under the table."

Barnes said Buchholz and other U.S. Cup team members had been under supervision of the team captain, David L. Freed of Salt Lake City, while in Australia, and observed of Buchholz: "He has received no monies other than

the expenses that are approved by the U. S. Lawn Tennis Association."

Edward A. Turville of St. Petersburg, Fla., the association's first vice president, said: "If a tennis player wants to take money under the table, by his own act he is showing his dishonesty. I am pleased that they are turning professional."

MacKay had said professional tennis was the only realistic way for a person who wanted to compete on a big time basis.

"Technically, a person wishing to devote himself entirely to tennis—as I do for the next few years—could not do it as an amateur because he couldn't afford it," MacKay said. "We know that it is possible under our present

structure, but it is not for me. I want to do it above board."

Turville said that MacKay had been supported and kept by the USLTA since he was graduated from the University of Michigan, and declared he "shows little respect for the organization that made it possible for him to rise to a position worthy of recognition by the pro group."

"Virtually the same applies to Buchholz," said Turville. "What organization provided them the opportunities to enter Davis Cup play? . . . The day that an individual feels that he should be able to make his living out of amateur tennis is the day he should either turn pro or leave our tennis ranks."

UW Mentor May Surprise Minnesota

LONG BEACH, Calif. (AP)—There may be some surprise line-up changes by Washington when it ties into Minnesota in the Rose Bowl Jan. 2.

The Huskies' coach, Jim Owens, says some of the second stringers who were developing fast toward the end of the regular season, are giving the regular starters fierce competition in practice sessions here.

Owens declined to say who's in danger of losing his job, and "anyway, things are changing so fast it probably wouldn't be accurate by the time it got into print."

Washington is a 6½-point underdog. This is the same point spread that existed last year, with Wisconsin the favorite, but the Huskies won the game, 44-8.

Bob Schloredt, who was Washington's regular quarterback until he suffered a broken collarbone Oct. 15, has indicated that Bob Hivner probably will start as the Huskies' signal caller.

"I don't think it would be fair if I started," said Schloredt, a fine passer. "However, I think I'll be alternating in practice with Hivner in a few days."

The thermometer climbed to a pleasant 75 degrees as the Huskies held two drills Wednesday. There will be two Thursday, and the first scrimmage session has been called for Friday.

Cousy Slowing Up? Just A Lot Of Talk

All that talk about Bob Cousy slowing down turns out to be just a lot of dribble.

Apparently as good as ever at 32, Cousy is one of the main reasons the Boston Celtics lead the Eastern Division of the National Basketball Association today.

The brilliant Celtic backcourt ace put on one of his customary performances Wednesday night when he teamed up with Sam Jones to lead Boston to a 120-108 victory over St. Louis, the Western Division leader.

Cousy scored 25 points and contributed 21 assists, only seven shy

of his own league record of 28. Jones was high man for the Celtics with 28 points, while Bob Pettit of the Hawks was individual high scorer with 37 points.

The Philadelphia Warriors defeated the New York Knickerbockers, 122-117, in the opening game of a Boston Garden doubleheader. Wilt Chamberlain not only controlled the backboards for the winners but also led all scorers with 33 points. Willie Naulls paced the Knicks with 31 points. The victory kept the Warriors a half game behind the Celtics.

No other games were scheduled.

Gopher Loss To Purdue Draws Study

PASADENA, Calif. (AP)—A football team more than a thousand miles removed from the battle could shift the scales in the Jan. 2 Rose Bowl game between Minnesota and Washington.

Purdue was the season's only conqueror of Minnesota's national champions. It achieved that victory with a systematic pattern of attack that has been the object of hour-after-hour of scrutiny by Washington's strategy board.

The Boilermakers whipped Minnesota, 23-14, with a first half offensive go. Ray Jackson was a top Big Five fullback. The Huskies are fond of running trap plays, and Bob Schloredt and Bob Hivner are accomplished passers.

Minnesota is aware of all this, and it has examined its deficiencies of the Purdue game countless times.

Hofstra Threatens Tennesseans' Lead

NEW YORK (UPI)—Hofstra, a Long Island school which has lived in the athletic shadows of its big city neighbors, moved into a challenging position behind Tennessee State A&I today in the United Press International small college basketball ratings.

While Tennessee State's Tigers retained the No. 1 ranking for the second week in a row, Hofstra jumped from fourth to second place, 58 points behind the leaders.

Of the 33 small college coaches who cast their ballots this week, 17 picked Tennessee State, 15 picked Hofstra No. 1 but the Dutchmen from Long Island were mentioned on the ballots of 32 of the 33 coaches. In points, Tennessee State topped Hofstra, 270 to 212.

Tennessee State won seven of its first eight games through last Saturday night. Hofstra won its first seven of the season and has a 20-game winning streak which started last season.

Wittenberg (Ohio) retained third place this week, followed in order by Mississippi Southern, Evansville (Ind.), Southwest Texas,

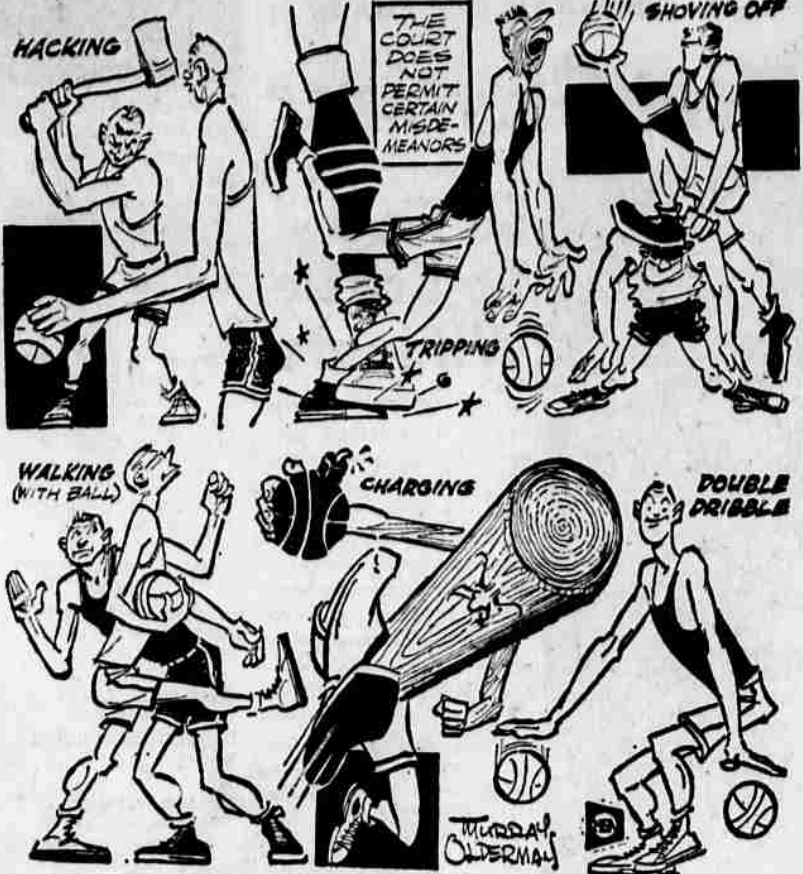

Frick Sees New League '64 Possible

NEW YORK (AP)—Major League baseball could expand to 24 teams and perhaps three leagues by 1964 with further changes as close as 1962, Commissioner Ford Frick predicts.

"You know how these baseball fellows are," the commissioner was quoted by Dick Young of the Daily News in today's edition. "It takes them a long time to get moving, but when they do, they want to keep moving."

"The only thing I'm afraid of is they may try to do it too fast."

Frick said he personally favors expansion that will get away from the 10-club setup the American League will have next year and the National League in 1962 when Houston and New York are taken in.

Kingsley Fights Planned

Plans for a once-a-month boxing show, either amateur or professional, are being considered at Kingsley Field, it was reported Wednesday.

The idea gained momentum last Friday night when a crowd of nearly 400 people were on hand to witness a seven-bout card staged on a trial basis.

Sgt. Johnny Thompson, a veteran of 300 fights himself, directed the initial effort, and noted that nearly 80 per cent of the attendant fans were people from downtown Klamath Falls.

The opening show matched fighters from Kingsley Field and the Chiloquin Boys Club.

Thompson said that it might be possible to procure professionals such as Denny Moyer, Portland middleweight, to appear in exhibition bouts occasionally, and he indicated that he also might return to the ring if the occasion presented itself.

Net-Tender Leaves Goal In NY Win

Removing the goalie is always a risky business in hockey, but it paid off for the New York Rangers.

"I can remember a lot of times it back-fired," said General Manager Muzz Patrick Wednesday night after the maneuver had helped the Rangers gain a 2-2 tie with the Chicago Black Hawks.

"But I can't remember the last time we profited by it."

Trailing, 2-1, with little more than a minute left in the game, the Rangers yanked goalie Gump Worsley and sent six men down the ice. Andy Heberton, one of the six, flicked in a 25-footer 39 seconds before the buzzer sounded to earn New York the tie.

Chicago defenseman Al Arbour was in the penalty box at the time and Heberton's goal not only snapped a two-game losing streak, but also enabled the Rangers to climb within five points of the fourth-place Hawks.

Earl Balfour put the Hawks ahead, 2-1, with a second period goal after Ron Murphy of Chicago and Johnny Wilson of the Rangers had each scored in the first period.

It was the only game scheduled.

North Lineup Said Ready

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—The North offense and defense lineups were pretty well set but the South lineups had yet to jell as the rival all-star college football squads drilled today for their Monday night game in the Orange Bowl.

Coaches Paul (Bear) Bryant of Alabama and Darrell Royal of Texas had put together two distinct backfield units for the South team, but have been shifting the linemen considerably.

Although Bryant declined to name his No. 1 offensive backfield, onlookers considered it would have Howard Dyer of VMI at quarter, Lauren Stapp of Alabama at full, and Bud Whitehead of Florida State and Don Kern of VMI at the halves.

Dale Hall of Army and Bump Elliott of Michigan, the North coaches, are high on their two quarterbacks — Tom Blanda of Army and Jerry Keeling of Tulsa.

Ball indicated Blanda would get the starting call because "I know what he can do."

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Huskies' Schloredt Not Bowl Starter

SEATTLE, Wash. (UPI)—The University of Washington staged one of the greatest upsets in the history of the Rose Bowl by spanking Wisconsin, 44-8, last New Year's Day.

The hero of the game was Bob Schloredt, a one-eyed quarterback who ran for one touchdown and passed for another.

Schloredt, a junior then, is still around but he is not expected to start for Washington when the Huskies return to the Rose Bowl for a battle with mighty Minnesota Jan. 2.

Although Schloredt has fully recovered from a broken collarbone he suffered early in the season, coach Jim Owens of the Huskies plans to use Bob Hivner as his starting quarterback against the Gophers. Schloredt and Kermit Jorgensen, who developed fast during the tail end of the season, will back up Hivner.

Actually, Schloredt and Hivner always have been considered fairly even as signal-callers. Schloredt had a slight advantage because he is bigger, weighing 190 pounds to Hivner's 175, and consequently is a harder runner to bring down.

The rest of Washington's starting backfield has George Fleming and Don McKeta at halfbacks and Ray Jackson at fullback. Each of these is backed up by capable replacements, such as Joe Jones at fullback and halfbacks Charlie Mitchell, Brent Wooten and Bob Monroe.

Fleming led the Huskies in scoring during the regular season with 65 points. The touchdowns were pretty well divided among the first eight backs, but Fleming is Washington's top converter.
