Educators Planning Public Meet

Local educators and parents are working hard on plans for what they hope will be their first biennial public "Lights On For Education" program Thursday evening, Jan. 5.

The state legislature will convene shortly thereafter, and teachers throughout the state are arranging such programs to acquaint the public with bills involving education that will be processed by the solons when they meet.

Here, meetings will be conducted simultaneously by personnel of 11 schools in the suburban area and the vicinity in Altamont Junior High School and by city schools staff members and others in Mills School that evening.

The Altamont program will feature a panel discussion of measures concerning school finance, child welfare, professional standards, tenure, reorganization of the state Board of Education and recommendations of the Oregon Conference on Children and Youth.

Panel participants will include Carrol Howe, state representative-elect from Klamath County and

former County School District superintendent; Francis Skinner, county 4-H Club leader and chairman of the Klamath County Committee on Children and Youth; Mrs. L. W. Saunders, president of Altamont Parent Teacher Association and legislative chairman for the Klamath Council of Parents and Teachers; and Harvey Denham, principal of Altamont Junior High and legislative chairman of Klamath County Unit, Oregon Education Association.

Each will speak about 15 minutes, and a 30-minute question and answer period will follow. The audience will be invited to ask the questions. So, the entire program is expected to last about 1 1/2 hours.

About 30 proposals are up for action by the legislature during the session beginning Jan. 9.

In Oregon, the program is sponsored jointly by the state OEA, the Oregon Congress of PTA and the state School Board Association.

Nationally, the National Education Association is one of the sponsors. Similar meetings will be arranged in other states on the eve of their respective legislative conventions.

Residents of the county not only are asked, but urged to come.

Schools outside the city and suburban areas will arrange their own programs, educators say.

Local meetings, more specifically, are planned to accomplish the following:

1. Provide information on possible legislation.
2. Inform citizens of where and how they may secure legislative information.
3. Provide an outline of the state's legislative procedure, of the way bills become law.
4. Focus interest and attention on needs of education and welfare of the state's youth.
