

# Packers To Follow The Script; Eagle Star, Coach May Retire

## Packer Strategy Planned

GREEN BAY, Wis. (AP)—Coach Vince Lombardi said today that the Green Bay Packers will follow his script when they meet the Philadelphia Eagles in the National Football League title round.

The Packers and the Eagles play for the NFL crown at noon EST Monday in Philadelphia.

Lombardi wouldn't spell out definite strategy for the contest. However, he hasn't tried to make it a secret that the Packers will rely heavily on their powerful running attack. And he also wants control of the ball.

He has two things in mind. Philadelphia's Norm Van Brocklin—who has 24 touchdown passes for the season—can't throw the ball unless he has it. The running attack has proved to be the best type of offensive against the Eagles.

To carry out his conquest plans, Lombardi has backs Paul Hornung and Jim Taylor—just about the best one-two running slant in the league. He also has the passing ability of Bart Starr at hand should anything happen to break up the Hornung-Taylor combination on the overland trail.

The team Lombardi takes to Philadelphia and Franklin Field Saturday is in good physical shape. Taylor had been listed as being fairly well banged up. Center Jim Ringo had a stubborn Charley horse and defensive back Jesse Whitenton pulled leg muscle. But Lombardi said all of them will be ready for any kind of action by game time.

The Packers worked out for an hour in the city stadium Thursday, and Lombardi said one of his worries is whether the team will thaw out in time for the game. The temperature was the lowest of the week, one above zero, with no break in the cold front seen before the team leaves town.

Most of the players had stocking caps and mittens on for the workout on a field so frozen that cleats were left in the locker room to avoid twisted ankles.

Another outside session was on tap for today with a coaches' and players' meeting to follow.

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Babe Hollingbery, who guided the Washington State College's Cougars, has been named to the Hall of Fame of the Helms Athletic Foundation.

Hollingbery, coach from 1928 through 1942, now lives in Yakima, Wash.

Other football coaches whose selection for the honorary roster was announced Thursday include: Hugo Bezdek, Oregon coach in 1906 and again from 1913-1917; Clipper Smith, Gonzaga mentor from 1925-1928; Clarence Spears, Oregon boss in 1930-1931, and Elmer Henderson, former Seattle high school coach who moved to Southern California.

Among former players voted into the Hall of Fame were Paul Schweigler, Washington tackle in 1931; Mel Hein, Washington State center of the same era, and Bob Grayson, former Stanford player now a Portland city councilman.

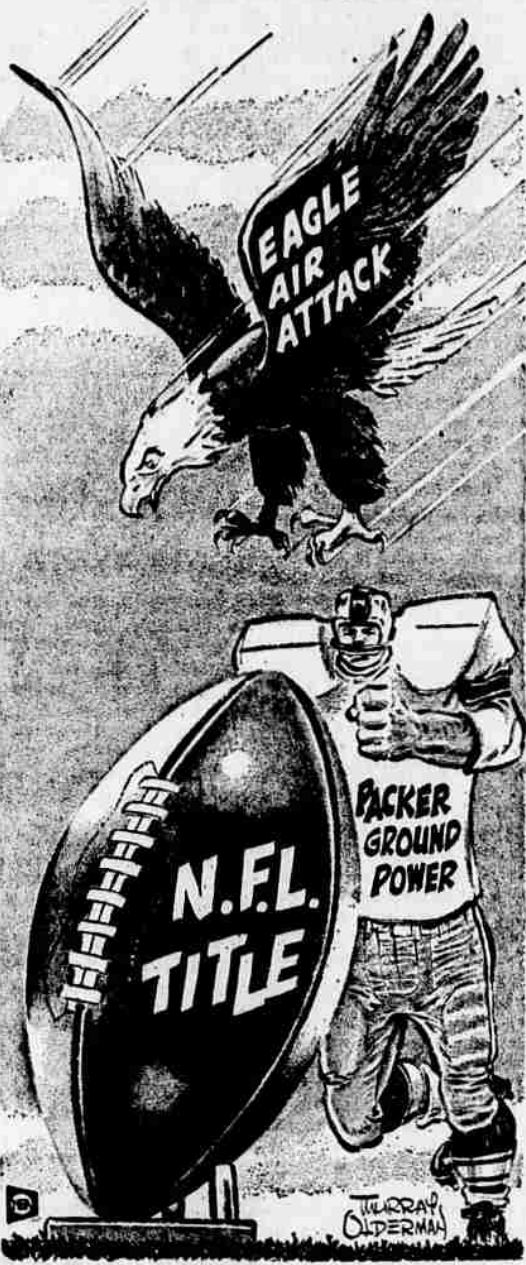
Phil Gregory potted 14 points to lead the winners but the losers' Larry Kerr and Chuck Groves shared high honors with 19 each.

## Shaw, Van Brocklin Rate NFL Accolade

NEW YORK (UPI)—Coach Buck Shaw and quarterback Norm Van Brocklin, who led the Philadelphia Eagles Monday in quest of pro football's biggest prize, today were named the National Football League's men-of-the-year for 1960 by United Press International.

The white-haired, 61-year-old Shaw was voted the NFL Coach-of-the-Year and Van Brocklin was chosen Player-of-the-Year in a UPI poll of 39 writers who covered the 1960 campaign. The panel was made up of three writers from each league city.

Both To Retire Coincidentally, both Shaw and Van Brocklin have announced they intend to wind up their respective coaching and playing careers with Monday's NFL championship game against the Green Bay Packers in Philadelphia.

Shaw and Van Brocklin joined the Eagles together in 1958 when the club was one of the doormats of the NFL. Within three years they guided the Eagles to the Eastern Division championship.

In the player-of-the-year voting, Van Brocklin was a one-sided choice. He received 27 of the 39

## Titan Boss Still Confident

NEW YORK (AP)—Harry Wismer oozes confidence that his New York Titans and the American Football League are here to stay despite a bath of red ink for both in the first year of operation.

Titans' president said his outfit blew \$350,000 and all clubs in the league a collective \$2 million.

"I know I'll get it back because this is the league of the future," said Wismer at a press conference Thursday. "All of our people were prepared to lose money at the outset."

To show his confidence, Wismer pointed to the following: 1. A decision to buck the rival New York Giants of the National Football League by playing home dates on Sundays instead of Friday nights and telecasting the road games back into New York when the Giants are at home. The Giants telecast their Sunday road games into the New York area.

2. An agreement to lease the new Flushing Meadow stadium for 20 years, starting in 1962 when the stadium is expected to be completed.

Wismer said the AFL also will give the NFL a run for the TV money in the Los Angeles area. He said the Los Angeles Chargers will shift their home games to San Diego's Balboa Stadium, and

## Ex-Duck May Quit Gridiron

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—The Green Bay Packers will pit power runners Jim Taylor and Paul Hornung against the passing of quarterback Norm Van Brocklin of the Philadelphia Eagles in Monday's National Football League championship game.

A sellout crowd of some 67,000 will watch the contest in Franklin Field with thousands of others looking in on television. The kickoff is noon, EST.

It could be the last game for the 34-year-old Van Brocklin and also Eagles' coach Buck Shaw, 61, both of whom have announced their intention to retire.

Ironically, both Van Brocklin, a 12-year NFL veteran, and Shaw, who has been coaching for nearly 40 years, came out of retirement to join the Eagles in 1958 and guide them from a last place finish that year to the Eastern Conference crown this season.

Green Bay has been established an early 6-5 favorite on the basis of a solid line and the running of Taylor, a 215-pound fullback from LSU who finished second in rushing in the NFL, and Hornung, also a passing and place-kicking threat who finished seventh in rushing and set a new NFL scoring record. But some observers feel it's a tossup while others favor the Eagles because of Van Brocklin's precision passing.

Shaw is hoping for a dry field because he feels a muddy or soggy field would be advantageous to the Packers.

In leading the Packers to their first western conference title since 1944, Taylor ground out 1,101 yards while Hornung, the 215-pound triple-threat fullback from Notre Dame, picked up 671. Hornung set the new league scoring record with 176 points on 15 touchdowns, 15 field goals and 41 conversions, surpassing the old mark of 138 set by Don Hutson of Green Bay in 1942.

Van Brocklin is virtually the Eagles' entire offensive attack. The former Oregon great who played in four championship games during his nine seasons with the Los Angeles Rams finished second in the league in touchdown passes (24), total yards gained (2,471) and average gain (.870 on 153 completions in 284 attempts).

Both teams have been practicing all week but have been hampered by snow, rain and cold. Philadelphia and Green Bay did not meet each other this year. But in previous games, the Packers hold a 13-1 edge. The last time the two teams met was in 1958 with Green Bay winning 38-35.

This will be the first meeting between the two clubs for the title. Green Bay last won the NFL championship in 1944 by defeating New York 14-7. The Eagles did it last in 1949 with a 14-0 victory over Los Angeles.

## AFL Heads Announce Candidates

HANOVER, N.H. (UPI)—The American Football Coaches Association today announced the list of candidates from which college football's major and minor coaches of the year will be selected.

Eight major college coaches and eight small college mentors were named for the final balloting with the two winners to be announced at Pittsburgh, Jan. 11.

Included on the list of those in the running for the major college award is Murray Warmath of Minnesota's national champion Gophers. He was chosen the top candidate in District Six.

One major college coach and one minor college coach were selected from each of eight districts with 740 of the association's 850 football coaches eligible to vote taking part in the balloting.

To Get Plaques Results of the polling were announced by D. O. (Tuss) McLaughry, secretary of the football group who said the winners would be awarded Eastman Kodak plaques at the association's annual dinner in Pittsburgh.

Along with Warmath, whose Gophers will play in the Rose Bowl game against Washington, four of the other major college candidates also will be at the helm of bowl teams—Jim Owen, of Washington; William Murray of Duke, Frank Broyles of Arkansas, and Roy Graves of Florida. Jordan Oliver, coach of the undefeated and untied Yale Bulldogs, amassed the largest number of points among the major college voting with a total of 282.

Voting was based on three points for a first place ballot, two for a second and one for a third.

Small College Coaches William Hess of Ohio University and Chalmer (Bumps) Elliott of Michigan round out the eight major college coaches in the running.

## OCE Shooter On Sideline

MONMOUTH, Ore. (AP)—Ron Jones, leading scorer of the Oregon College of Education basketball team, was declared ineligible Thursday because of low grades.

Jones, who was top scorer in the Oregon Collegiate Conference last year, had scored 117 points in five games this season. In his final game last week he set a school record of 42 points in one game. That was against Pacific University.

The 6-1 forward from Coos Bay is a senior.

# Heavyweight King Early Choice To Beat Challenger In Rematch

NEW YORK (AP)—Heavyweight champion Floyd Patterson knocked Ingemar Johansson unconscious with a jolting left hook to the jaw.

Johansson already has expressed confidence in his ability to regain the crown. He even told Bill Fugazy of the promoting Feature Sports, Inc., to line up "a top contender" for another fight this year in the U. S.

This should bring a big smile to Ingemar's face, since the betting choice in this rivalry has been knocked off twice.

Patterson was an almost prohibitive 5-1 favorite to win the first fight June 26, 1959, at Yankee Stadium. The big Swede, then unbeaten, blitzed Patterson on a seven-knockdown, third-round technical knockout.

A year later, June 20, 1960, at the Polo Grounds, Johansson was

the 3-2 favorite. Patterson knocked Ingemar unconscious with a jolting left hook to the jaw.

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The site and the date for the rubber match were announced Thursday at news conferences in both New York and Miami.

In New York, Jack Fugazy, uncle of Bill and managing director of FSI, said William MacDonal, prominent Miami Beach sportsman, had offered a "substantial guarantee." No figure was an-

nounced, but it was understood to be between \$450,000 and \$500,000.

# 'Thinking' Buckeyes Really Tough

cells going 24 hours a day, too. Ohio State, currently the nation's top-ranked college basketball team, beat highly-touted and ambitious Detroit Thursday night 84-73. Big thanks goes to a successfully executed plan by Coach Fred Taylor and player John Havlicek.

Taylor said he knew that Dave Debuschere, Detroit's big scorer, had been under the weather and was seeing a doctor.

"This confirmed what our scout Frank Truitt told us, that he (Debuschere) had not been working hard for his shots," Taylor said. "We figured to force him far out on the floor and make him shoot long shots. In the second half he got only six shots off Havlicek and didn't make any."

In fact, Debuschere got only 14 points, 10 early in the game, and the Titans simply couldn't match the overall fire power of All America Jerry Lucas & Co. St. John's, which could possibly meet the Buckeyes next week in New York's Holiday Festival, beat Gonzaga 97-69 Thursday night. Both the Redmen (No. 6) and Ohio State have 6-0 records.

St. John's must beat scrappy Providence, and Ohio State has

to get by Seton Hall to set up a semifinal round pairing between the two. The winner is the most likely tournament champion.

Tom Kieffer's crucial points helped St. Louis beat Kentucky 74-72 in overtime and win the Wildcats invitational tournament. California took third place, beating Illinois 72-54.

Elsewhere Utah used reserves most of the second half and still walked Los Angeles State 105-78. Brigham Young defeated Kent State (Ohio) 66-51, Michigan State beat Iowa State 92-81, Virginia Tech ran over South Carolina 106-75, Oklahoma conquered Texas Tech 75-56, and NYU

squeaked past Long Island U. Arkansas defeated Tennessee 89-76 and Texas edged Alabama 78-76 to complete a four-game sweep of the Aluminum Bowl by the two Southwest Conference schools over the two representatives from the Southeastern Conference.

Lucas had his best scoring burst of the season, 30 points, and the Bucks got 18 from Mel Nowell and 16 from Larry Sigfried. A 14-10 rampage by Ohio State late in the first half gave it a 40-34 advantage, and another 8-0 spurt as the second half began made it 50-38, killing Detroit's chances. Charley North's 25 points paced the Titans (5-2).
