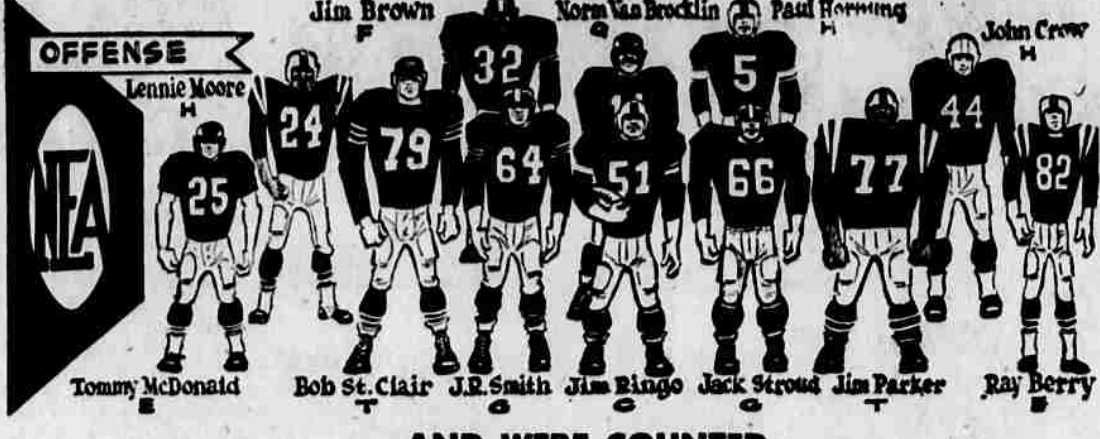

East, West Balance All-Pro Elevens

NEW YORK (NEA) — Balance was the motif in the National Football League this year.

The Green Bay Packers have it. The title-flying Philadelphia Eagles finally achieved it.

The men of the NFL proved it in their sixth annual All-Pro game. All-Pro team, released today by Newspaper Enterprise Association and the Herald and News.

The team will be assembled in Los Angeles Jan. 15, the night of the Pro Bowl Game, and honored at an awards dinner (sponsored by the Fleer chewing gum company).

The ballots of the 500 performers on the 13 teams in the NFL revealed a virtual dead heat between East and West in naming the 22 honor spots on the offensive and defensive platoons.

The Western Division placed six each on offense and defense. The Eastern half of the league featured six on offense and five on defense.

If that counts up to 23, you're right, because the 1960 All-Pro team takes a distinct digression with 12 men on the attacking unit. There was no splitting unit. There was no splitting unit.

Paul Hornung of Green Bay and John David Crow of St. Louis for the second halfback spot. Hornung merely set a new NFL season scoring record. Crow was the anvil for the pounding ground attack in professional ball.

Leader of the unit is Norm Van Brocklin, the Eagles' Player-of-the-Year, winner of the Jim Thorpe Trophy, an inspirational veteran who supplants Baltimore's Johnny Unitas, at least for this year, as the finest quarterback.

The only other issue on offense involved Tommy McDonald Van's favorite target, and the Cardinals' Sonny Randle in contention for the second end position to pair with popular Raymond Berry of the Colts. The little Eagle finally roosted there because he delivered the touchdowns (at the rate of one a game) when they meant most.

Berry and guard Jim Ray Smith and center Jim Ringo of Cleveland were the leading vote attractions on offense.

Joe Schmidt, who recovered from a shoulder injury to perk up the Detroit Lions, keys the defensive unit from the middle line-backer's position. Schmidt is the sole survivor of the first ballot.

Despite their late season tailspin, the Colts still managed to corral five spots on both units. Only three teams—Pittsburgh, Los Angeles and Dallas—are not represented. The Steelers and Rams find solace in second team placements.

1960 West Coast Sports Scene Had Booms, Busts

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — The all-encompassing sports boom rolled over the West again in 1960, setting attendance records in some places and meeting lack of interest in others.

But the gold rush prospectors pushed ahead seeking new worlds to conquer in professional sports. Los Angeles, which gains more new citizens per year than do most states, appeared to be reaching the saturation point.

By the close of the year, the City of Angels was host to two professional football clubs, two major college grid teams, two major baseball squads and a pro basketball team—just to mention a few activities.

Additionally, the city became the world's fight capital; was the home of the western skin-diving business; and was one of the world's greatest horse racing centers and was fast becoming a mecca for auto racing.

Some of the other cities had it even better. Seattle, for instance, just about sold out the University of Washington stadium for every college football game this year.

And the northern city drew the biggest single crowd of the year for the West—about 250,000 for the hydroplane races during the sea fair.

On the other hand, some found the going too rough in professional sports to survive. Sacramento, for more than half a century a member of the Pacific Coast League, threw in the sponge at season's end and the franchise was transferred to Honolulu.

Here's break-down of the sports in the West:

Major league baseball—The Los Angeles Dodgers finish out of the running for the National League pennant, but set a Dodger attendance record of 2,620,627. Work

starts on a new home. San Francisco introduces Candlestick Park to the majors and 1,796,356 turn out during the windy season. Giants fire Bill Rigney as manager in June when club is in second place and it finishes in fifth. Los Angeles awarded new franchise in American League—team to be called "Angels." Arizona becomes major league training camp headquarters with five clubs slated there for spring of 1961.

Minor league baseball—Pacific Coast League has mediocre financial season. Sacramento franchise moved to Honolulu for 1961. Only one PCL team now left in California—at San Diego. California (Class C) League struggles along with six teams.

Pro football—American League opens for business and finds it mighty poor in both Los Angeles and San Francisco. Attendance for the two new teams averages around 10,000 per game—at most. National league prosperity continues despite fact both Los Angeles and San Francisco fail in pennant bids. Average about \$0.00 per game each.

College football—Attendance down in both Los Angeles and San Francisco areas. But up in others. Seattle tops list. Utah and Arizona schools show big attendance increases. University of Washington top team in West and wins Rose Bowl bid for second year in row. Utah State tops in Rocky Mountain area. Humboldt State leads all small Western teams, gets bowl bid and loses to Lenoir-Rhyne in St. Petersburg, Fla., by one point. Oregon loses in Liberty Bowl to Penn State.

Hydroplane racing—Growing with the West. Biggest race at Seattle, where 250,000 watch Silver Cup. Other major races attract good crowds. But most important trophy race of all, the Gold Cup at Las Vegas, flops when drivers refuse to go on Lake Mead in choppy waters.

Borling—Los Angeles takes over from New York as fight center. Six title bouts staged. Fight of year is Sugar Ray Robinson vs. Gene Fullmer for latter's NBA middleweight crown. Ends in draw.

Basketball—San Francisco plays host to NCAA championships and University of California goes to finals in effort to defend crown. But Ohio State wins in walk. Minneapolis Lakers move to Los Angeles, where crowds below expectations.

Sports car racing—Riverside attracts 80,000 fans and world's top sports car drivers, including Stirling Moss of England, Jack Brabham of Australia. Laguna Seca races at Monterey, with same drivers, draw 60,000.

Horse racing—Hollywood Park leads in pari-mutuel handle and attendance again, although there is a slight drop-off. California tracks handle \$382,408,000 in 1959, compared with \$369,796,798 this year. Attendance for 291 days of racing is 4,746,916.

Golf—The western golf tour is expanded to include both spring and fall dates. Palm Springs stages the first \$100,000 golf event in the West with its desert classic. Los Angeles, San Diego, Seattle, Portland, Las Vegas, Phoenix and other cities all hold successful shows as the purses go past the quarter-million dollar mark for the Pacific slope.

Winter sports—An all-time high reached with the staging of the VIII Olympic Games at Squaw Valley. Impressively handled, they drew acclaim throughout the world. New ski lodges and lifts spring up in nearly every mountain area.

Rudometkin cracked a school marks held by Vaughn and Sharmann when he went on a one-man rampage against Hawaii Friday night. The score was 91-60 and Rudometkin accounted for 40 points.

This topped the mark of 36 set by Vaughn in 1939. His 17-for-27 performance from the floor also set new marks. Vaughn's 16 field goals and Sharmann's 26 shots were former records.

Even more remarkable was the fact that Rudometkin also grabbed 19 rebounds—only two short of Roy Irvin's school mark of 21.

Rudometkin averaged 11.7 points per game as a soph last year, but came on fast toward the end of the year. His average is well over 20 this season, but no matter how many he scores, it seems doubtful he can crack the All-American picture with such highly publicized stars as Lucas, Belamy, Stith, Kaiser, Jackson, McGrill, etc., grabbing the headlines. But chances would seem bright for Rudometkin in '61-62.

Rudometkin's fine play is also reflected in the improved Trojan record. USC was 16-11 last season and is now 6-1 this year. But coming in is the rugged Los Angeles classic tournament and then the Big Five race—tough tests for any quintet.

In another battle Friday night, Gonzaga's scoring machine, Frank Burgess, popped in 36 points, but the Bulldogs lost their fourth game of their eastern swing as Xavier dumped them 87-82.

The Bulldogs lined up an ambitious eastern schedule this year in an attempt to showcase Burges and gain a little national Colorado State 67.

Elsewhere Friday night, Chico State downed Orange County State 72-67 in an even game that saw the lead change hands 27 times. In another hot scoring performance, Hal von Bargan had 31 for the winners.
