

Abramson To Head ASC Board

LAKEVIEW — Delegates to the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation elections convention Tuesday, Dec. 20, elected Erwin Abramson chairman of the ASC board for another year.

Vance A. Withers was held over as vice chairman, and Edwin O. Eskelin, Fort Rock rancher, replaced R. A. Long as a regular member.

Long, who asked to be replaced, has completed 14 years on the board, having served continually since 1947.

He is currently serving on the board of advisers to the state Department of Agriculture and gave this and need to devote more time to his ranch as reasons for declining to serve another year.

Charles A. Crump and George Manning were retained as alternate members of the board.

The ASC board is responsible for administration of conservation payment, CCC loan, and wool incentive programs of the USDA.

Earlier this month, community elections boards were busy naming officers for the five ASC community committees. These grass roots groups assist and advise the county committee and local farmers in making best use of funds available through the conservation payment and price stabilization programs.

TOKYO (AP)—Japan will continue to ride a high tide of prosperity next year, but the spectacular gains of recent years in production, exports and other signs of growth will flatten out, the Economic Planning Agency said today.

The agency's annual report will guide Prime Minister Hayato Ikeda in drawing up his economic blueprint for 1961.

A combination of circumstances, including a cutback in U. S. dollar spending abroad and a slackening of world trade, account for the expected leveling off in the rates of gain.
