Pilot's Widow Critical Of Agency

HEMET, Calif. (UPI)—The widow of an airline pilot killed in a collision over New York bitterly criticized the Federal Aviation Agency Friday calling for a reorganization of its "horse and buggy control in a jet age."

Mrs. Robert Sawyer, who buried her husband Thursday in this small Southern California town, made the charges in a draft of an open letter she said she hoped would be printed throughout the country. The letter was to all members of Congress.

Mrs. Sawyer, widow of the pilot of a United Air Lines DC8 which collided in flight with a TWA Super Constellation over New York Dec. 16, called for a "complete overhaul of the Federal Aviation Act of 1958."

"This legislation permits one small group of military men to arbitrarily run civil aviation's dissembling reports on FAA action controls with deliberate exclusion of the commercial pilots and commercial airlines and of their overwhelming greater experience."

In addition to his widow, Pat Sawyer is survived by three children, Pam, 14, Robin, 13, and Kim, 8.

Mrs. Sawyer said "my grief is almost overwhelming." She said her husband and other pilots had been reluctant to file dissenting reports on FAA action in the past because they feared reprisal, possibly including the loss of their license.

Searchers Find Body of Victim

HARRISBURG (AP)—Searchers Friday found the body of Tony Senger, 49, of Portland in the waters of Muddy Creek, near Shedd, about 13 miles north of here.

Senger, foreman of a Spokane, Portland & Seattle Railway crew that was repairing a bridge across Muddy Creek, fell into the stream and drowned Monday. His body was found about 300 feet downstream.

TREES SOLD OUT

NEWTON, Iowa (AP)—The bright Christmas season might be a little bleak in some Newton homes. It seems there isn't a Christmas tree to be bought in town. Merchants said Wednesday they have been sold out since last Saturday. More than 3,000 trees have been sold.

Collection Total Down

SALEM (AP)—State tax collections in the five months that ended Nov. 30 were down 5.4 per cent from a comparable period of last year, the Tax Commission said Friday.

The commission added, however, that does not mean the state's economy is suffering. It attributed the decrease to the reduction in the number of installment accounts and greater withholding tax refunds.

Total collections for the period were \$40,141,824; \$35,724,809 from personal income taxes and \$3,965,933 from corporation taxes.

Form cards for 1960 income taxes will be mailed to all residents of the state after Christmas. These taxes are payable by April 15.
