

OTI Staffers Get Info For Propulsion Course

Five of Oregon Tech's personnel were hosted by the Aerojet-General Corporation at Sacramento on Monday and Tuesday, Dec. 19 and 20.

Dr. Winston Purvine, dean of educational services, and instructors J. D. Frost, G. L. Phillips, and Earl Kurtz visited Aerojet to get information which will help Oregon Tech establish its thrust propulsion program.

The group visited the laboratories where they calibrate the instruments used in testing rockets. Incidentally, four full-term OTI graduates reported for duty in that department on the same day.

"The control room for testing a rocket is jammed full of electrical measuring devices," Meier stated, "and we had the opportunity to view everything that goes on on a rocket stand through a closed TV system." The main job of an electronic technician at Aerojet is to maintain, install, operate and calibrate all of the instruments used in that laboratory.

Purvine mentioned the fact that attitudes toward a job well done are one of the most important requirements for these technicians and that this was mentioned in every department visited. It is possible that one wire improperly installed may cost up to a million dollars.

Two new courses at Oregon Tech will be included in the next catalog as a result of these discussions: one will be an electronics course in rocket test instrumentation and the other a mechanical course in mechanical testing and calibrating in the area of linear measurement.

"It will be our purpose," Purvine stated, "to establish these courses in a way that will give students the quality and level of training required for these positions."

WANT ANSWER

President Is Adamant On Records

WASHINGTON (AP)—In the closing days of his administration, President Eisenhower has taken a strong stand on refusing to turn over documents demanded by a House subcommittee investigating foreign aid.

It is a stand the President often has taken before, but this time he had to contend with a provision Congress wrote into the act that created the inspector general's office in the State Department.

The provision said that all funds for the inspector general's office, set up in 1958 to check on foreign aid operations, would be stopped if the office refused to turn over documents requested by Congress.

The 90 persons working in that office were shifted to other positions when the House subcommittee invoked the law Dec. 8 and shut off operating funds through the comptroller general, an arm of Congress.

Eisenhower repeated Friday that to turn over the documents would be an invasion of executive privilege and contrary to the national interest.

And he ordered the secretary of the treasury to direct that until Eisenhower's term expires Jan. 20, the treasury should write checks to cover the pay of the employees of the inspector general's office. He ordered the treasury to ignore the comptroller general on the matter.

The House subcommittee on foreign operations, under the chairmanship of Rep. Porter Hardy, D-Va., has long fought for information on foreign aid from various State Department divisions.
