

Big Holiday Cage Tournaments Started In LA, Portland Today

Two of the finest holiday basketball tournaments ever to grace the Pacific shores commenced firing today with every major team in the region involved except Washington and the teams of the West Coast Athletic Conference.

Five nationally prominent squads are among the eight entrants in the second annual Los Angeles Basketball Classic. Last year's first tourney was sensational with West Virginia's Jerry West and California's defense-minded Bears both putting on unforgettable shows.

The ingredients are there this year for more high-powered action. Contestants include four members of the Big Five and four Big Ten teams.

Indiana's 6 foot 10 inch Walt Bellamy, considered a sure All-American, will be there and is expected to dominate the action. But USC's John Rudometkin, California's Bill McClintock and Iowa's Dave Nelson also have an outside chance at post-season laurels and would certainly help their cases with starring performances in the classic.

Today's first round finds UCLA (5-1) facing Michigan State (3-2) and California (6-1) battling Iowa (5-1) in afternoon action. Southern California (6-1) faces Minnesota (1-5) and Indiana (5-1) takes on Stanford (1-4) in evening tussles. San Jose State upset defending champion Loyola Tuesday night, 53-51. The Spartans grabbed a six-point lead with four minutes to go and stalled their way home.

St. Mary's got an unexpectedly stiff tussle from Fordham before winning, 75-74. The Gaels led 75-70 with seven seconds to go and the Rams' Cornell Hess scored four points in the final seconds to almost bring off the upset.

Another holiday joust at Chico provided these first round scores: Cal Poly of Pomona 71, Chapman 68 in overtime; Pacific Lutheran 67, Humboldt State 60; Pasadena 67, Sacramento State 62; Willamette 57, Chico State 53. Chico's Hal Von Bergen and Humboldt's Felix Rogers had 23 each in losing causes while Arvin Winzelberg had 23 for winning Cal Poly. Bruce Alexander paced Pacific Lutheran with 22 markers.

Los Angeles State lost in first-round action at the Evansville, Ind., gym as Denver triumphed 79-74. Dale Ferber had 18 for the losers.

Arizona outlasted Santa Barbara for an 80-74 overtime victory. Joe Skaisgir had 19 for the winners, but five Wildcats broke into double figures. Buddy White had 21 in the losing cause.

Portland (AP) — Oregon State, which has won the Far West Classic basketball tournament four years in a row, sets out tonight to try to make it five straight.

The Staters will face a stiff test in the opening round, however, meeting Wisconsin at 7:30 p.m. Both teams have 3-3 records this season.

If Oregon State should falter, the tournament team with the best early season record — the University of Portland — could well become the favorite. Portland (6-1) will play Idaho (1-7) at 9:30 p.m.

A squad of ex-Malin High School basketball greats will appear once more on their home floor this Thursday night when they tangle with the Malin Town team of the City League in a special cage feature.

The squad includes members of both the 1960 and 1956 State B championship clubs from Malin. Numbered among them are Ray Johnson, a two-time all-stater, who played with the Mustangs in 1956; Jim Long, Randy Miller, Rick Illian, Dave DeMerritt, Abe Kirkpatrick and Ed Stastny, all of whom were members of the 1960 champions.

The game which is being sponsored by the Mustang Letterman's Club is slated to begin at 7:30 p.m.

NEW YORK (UPI)—Gail Cogdill, a 6-foot-2, 190-pound offensive end who caught 43 passes for the Detroit Lions, today was named the 1960 National Football League Rookie-of-the-year by United Press International.

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Halfback Tom Moore of the Green Bay Packers, and fullback Ted Dean and linebacker Maxie Baughan, key operatives in the Philadelphia Eagles' march to the Eastern Division title, each received four votes.

Guard Mike McGee of the St. Louis Cardinals and end Don Colchio of the San Francisco Forty-Niners each had two votes and six other players each got one vote in the wide-open balloting.

Cogdill, a native of Spokane, Wash., got his chance to play in the Lions' second game during the past season — against the Forty-Niners — and he made the most of it by catching 8 passes for 115 yards.

"That gave me a big lift, knowing they had that much confidence in me," said Cogdill. "From then on I had all the confidence in myself I needed."

Cogdill went on to catch 35 more passes for a season total yardage pickup of 642. Teammate Jim Gribbons caught 31 passes for the Lions but Cogdill gained more yards with his 43 receptions.

Basketball Titans Promise Struggle

There is going to be some tugging and pulling among the nation's college basketball powers before the week is out. That's for sure.

The situation in New York's Holiday Festival shapes up as a battle of giants after Ohio State, the nation's top-ranked team in the current Associated Press poll, third-ranked St. Bonaventure and seventh-ranked St. John's all emerged victorious Tuesday. Then add Utah to the list and there certainly are fireworks aplenty brewing.

Off the tournament trail, second-ranked Bradley had to go into overtime to beat Drake 83-77 Tuesday night while St. Louis, ranked eighth, and fifth-ranked Louisville warmed up for their Friday night clash with victories. St. Louis won over Southern Methodist 74-50 and Louisville easily dumped Brigham Young 95-67.

Tonight, Indiana (No. 4) gets into action against Stanford in the Los Angeles Classic while Duke (No. 6) and North Carolina State (No. 10) begin tournament play Thursday in the Dixie Classic against Villanova and Wyoming, respectively.

Ohio State, showing its overwhelming balance, easily beat Seton Hall 97-57. The Bonnies had no trouble defeating St. Joseph's 83-70 and St. John's started fast and handed Providence its first loss 76-64. Utah won over Penn 72-60.

In other tournaments Baylor upset Oklahoma City 73-63 and New York University beat Tulsa 70-61 in the first round action of Oklahoma City's 25th All College Tournament. Houston faces Wichita and Utah State meets Texas Christian tonight.

Four Packers made the first offensive team and two more made the regular defensive unit in a 50 per cent turnover of last year's first 22 men.

Norm Van Brocklin, Philadelphia's excellent quarterback, was an overwhelming choice for quarterback.

End Ray Berry and tackle Jim Parker of Baltimore, guard Jim Ray Smith of Cleveland, center Jim Rennie of Green Bay, halfback Lenny Moore of Baltimore and fullback Jimmy Brown of Cleveland were the six repeaters on the offensive team.

They were joined by end Sonny Randle of St. Louis, tackle Forrest Gregg, guard Jerry Kramer and halfback Paul Hornung of Green Bay and Van Brocklin on the first team.

End Gino Marchetti of Baltimore, and New York's Andy Robustelli and safety Jimmy Patton of New York, linebacker Bill George of Chicago and halfback Abe Woodson of San Francisco again made the All-Star defensive unit. Halfback Tom Brookshier and linebacker Chuck Bednarik of Philadelphia, tackle Henry Jordan and linebacker Bill Ferrel of Green Bay, safety Jerry Norton of St. Louis and tackle Alex Karas of Detroit rounded out the defensive unit.

Others on the offensive team are end Ken Gregory of Whittier (Calif.) College; tackles Tom Black, Whitworth (Wash.) College, and Richard Larkin, Hillsdale (Mich.) College; guards Houston Antwine, Southern Illinois, and Joe Hinton, Louisiana Tech; center Lou Caparzo, West Chester (Pa.) Teachers; quarterback Charles (Bo) Miller, Austin (Tex.) College; halfbacks Lee Farmer, Lenoir Rhyne (N.C.) College, and Stan Solomon, Willamette (Ore.) College; and fullback Raymond Hayes, Central Oklahoma.

Miller rolled up 5,500 yards of total offense in his four-year career at Austin College while Hayes, a 240-pounder, set an NAIA record this year by rushing for 1,433 yards.

Line averages 228 pounds. The No. 1 defensive unit has a line averaging 228 pounds and a

backfield averaging 184 pounds, led by 6-foot 3-inch, 270-pound tackle Ray Jacobs from Howard Payne (Tex.) College.

Others named to the defensive first team are ends Dick Lane, Lenoir Rhyne, and Ed Becker, East Stroudsburg (Pa.) State; tackle Bruno Raso, Slippery Rock (Pa.) State; guards Mark Cisneros, Willamette, and Frank Conners, Sal Haven, Humboldt State, and Powell McClellan, Arkansas Tech; and backs Jim Pribula, West Chester (Pa.) Teachers, Mike Cutchan, Colorado Mines, and Elbert Harris, Southeast Louisiana.

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National League Commissioner Places Time Limit On Drafters

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — "Two minute warning," said National Football League Commissioner Pete Rozelle.

Rozelle had to go to extremes Tuesday to get one of the slowest moving player selection meetings in modern history into even low gear. He finally put a 10-minute limit on selections and issued a two-minute warning. The teams took 15 hours to pick 126 players in nine rounds. The balance of the 20-round draft of 280 players was adjourned to 10 a.m. (EST) today.

The league's newest franchise, Minnesota's Vikings, wasted little time making the No. 1 pick. General Manager Bert Rose took Tulsa halfback Tommy Mason, a third team All America coveted by a number of clubs. Rose, who earlier gave the impression he might trade Mason for a veteran quarterback, said later the 21-year-old Southwestern Conference star would not be dealt.

After Mason was taken, the drafting made the snail look like a 10-second sprinter. It took five hours to complete the first round. Teams took as long as two

hours to decide on one choice, play baseball, wasn't selected until the ninth round.

Other early choices included quarterback Norm Snead of Wake Forest by Washington, Ohio State quarterback Tom Matte by Baltimore, Marlin McKeever, Southern California linebacker by Los Angeles, Bernie Casey, Bowling Green (Ohio) back by San Francisco, Michigan linebacker by San Francisco, Michigan State's Herb Adler by Green Bay, and Syracuse's Art Baker by the champion Philadelphia Eagles.

The 49ers, by dint of previous trades, had three first-round picks. In addition to Casey they selected Jim Johnson and Bill Kilmer. UCLA offensive backs, Washington picked two on the first go-round, naming Illinois tackle Joe Rutgens as well as Snead.

AFL teams earlier this month took most of the same players. They included Mason (Boston), Snead, Rice and Baker (Buffalo), Rutgens (Oakland), McKeever and Kilmer (Los Angeles Chargers), Ditka (Houston), Matte, Casey and Adler (New York), Bob Crispino, Mississippi end taken by Cleveland, and was selected by the AFL's Oakland team.

MIAMI (UPI) — There is a much-mouthing legend in the baseball world that a player would rather sit on the New York Yankee bench than play with almost any other team.

This probably could be classed as greatness by association; star-dom by assimilation or making the most of slightly tart grapes. To Hank Stram it is a huge gob of applesauce, particularly when you draw a parallel with pro football.

The fact that this isn't so, says the robust coach of the Dallas Texans, is what is going to put the fledgling American Football League on a par with the well-established National League in another two years.

Shot At Stardom
"The kids want to play," he says. "They know what they'll have an immediate shot at pro stardom," says the former Notre Dame ace who later coached at Purdue and Miami. "They don't want to sit on anybody's bench and that, at the moment, figures to give us our biggest shot in the arm."

Because, says Stram, there are only two items at the moment separating the two leagues. The first is filling in the weak spots with "name" talent which is a must for the AFL after its first season of operation.

The second is—customers. "We're ready to go out and give them a scrap for the top talent," Stram emphasized. "Let's look at it this way: be-

cause of college promotion, there are only a few big names available each year and we have to get our share.

Many Fine Players
"But," he added, "there are more than enough fine players to go all the way around. We had our share this first year in feldom like Billy Cannon, Richie Lucas, Ron Burton, Jack Spikes, Marv Terrell and so on down the line."

Stram illustrated that only 50 to 60 players made the pro grade under a one-league setup.

"But there are 2,000 to 2,500 football players graduating from college every year," he said. "Don't tell me only 50 of them are outstanding. You can look back at the rosters of the National League over the years and you'll find a gang of guys from little schools. They're there, all right."

Despite a financially disastrous season, the AFL is "pleased" with the results of its first year of operation.

Rough Year Financially
"We expected a rough year financially, and," he grinned ruefully, "we weren't disappointed. Still, we expected it to be a loser and not just for the first year. We might go into the red again next year — but after that it will be a different story."

From a football standpoint, however, Stram feels that the AFL proved its point that there is room for two leagues and that in a short time it will be a match for the National.

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The Houston Oilers, who won the Eastern Division title, placed five players on the 22-man two-division squad selected for UPI by the votes of 24 writers — three from each league city.

The Los Angeles Chargers, whom the Oilers meet in the championship playoff at Houston next Sunday, were represented by four players.

Haynes was one of nine first-year professionals who won All-Star honors following the AFL's maiden season. The 19 other players had previous experience in either the National Football League or the Canadian League.

Leads In Rushing
Haynes, who led the AFL in rushing and in punt returns and also ranked among the top 10 players in pass receiving, kickoff returns and scoring, polled 23 of a possible 24 votes.

Ron Mix of the Chargers, a rookie offensive tackle from Southern California, was the second highest vote-getter with 18, while the next most popular

choice was Bud McFadin, the Denver Broncos' 280-pound defensive tackle playing his fifth season of pro football. McFadin polled 17 votes and offensive end Lionel Taylor of Denver had 15.

Besides Haynes and Mix, the first-year pros honored were: Bill Groman, Houston offensive end; Rich Michael, Houston offensive tackle; Jack Davis, Boston Patriots guard; halfback Paul Lowe of Los Angeles; fullback Dave Smith of Houston; defensive end Mel Branch of Dallas, and linebacker Paul McGuire of Los Angeles.

The teams lined up as follows: Offense: Ends, Taylor and Michael; tackles, Mix and Michael; guards, Davis and Bob Mischak, New York Titans; center, Walt Cudzik, Boston; quarterback, Jack Kemp, Los Angeles; halfbacks, Haynes and Lowe; fullback, Smith.
