Northern Californians Expect Year Of Progress

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—New energy from Canadian natural gas and strides forward in atomic energy development will make 1961 a significant year of progress for Northern Californians, according to the president of Pacific Gas and Electric.

Norman R. Sutherland today outlined PG&E's prospects for growth next year in a year-end statement.

He said that deliveries of Canadian gas, initially at a rate of 415 million cubic feet a day beginning next winter, will supplement PG&E's present supplies from fields in California, Texas and New Mexico, and will increase peak-day supplies by more than 50 per cent.

The gas will be transported from fields in Alberta to the San Francisco Bay Area through a 1,400-mile, 36-inch diameter pipeline, construction of which was begun in October.

Sutherland said the Alberta-California pipeline is part of a \$600 million program of construction in

New Jet Fuel Mixtures Called Dangerous

LONDON (AP)—The world's big airline companies buzzed today over an argument by two British officials about a new jet fuel one of them says is dangerously explosive.

The new fuel, called JP4, is a mixture of gasoline and kerosene. Many airlines now use it, but an airline executive in New York said no domestic airline he knows

of uses JP4 in normal operations in the United States.

The argument came to light through Lord Brabazon, chairman of the British Air Registration Board and an aviation expert decorated by the queen.

He published in the "Listener," British Broadcasting Corp. weekly organ, a series of letters between himself and Sir William Hildred, director-general of International Air Transport Association.

The IATA represents the major airlines.

Brabazon is critical of JP4 and demonstrated its explosiveness recently on a television program. He repeated his argument against its use in correspondence with Hildred.

Hildred said the television demonstration was "harmful to the worldwide airline industry." He wrote Brabazon and accused him

of putting dangerous statements before "emotional millions."

Brabazon said no group of experts could dispute his claim that JP4 flashes quickly into flame while kerosene does not. No planes using the fuel have been known to crash and Brabazon did not cite any cases.

Spokesmen for the airline industry said the fuel was adopted after stringent testing and is technically superior.

Paul Vaughn and a panel of three members presented a trophy board on which were displayed many ribbons won by all the members during the past club year.

Parents of 4-H Club members, Mr. and Mrs. Albert Miles, Mr. and Mrs. Claude Cassidy, Mr.

and Mrs. Glenn Barnes, and Malcolm Hayden, presented a skit demonstrating how a 4-H Club meeting should not be held. Nancy Mathews explained that each year the club has a local dress revue and a food show. Judging is done in the food department and ribbons are awarded to the winners.

In the county dress revue ribbons are given to winners and awards are presented to the most outstanding dresses or outfits modeled. The highest award is given to the girl who will be sent to Davis.

Sharon Young said that, at the Dress Revue in June, three of the club's girls won the Simplicity award. They were Sharon Young, Sharon Woodley and Sheridan Hayden.

Arleen Hayden and Ronda Eller gave an interesting talk on importance of demonstrations in 4-H work. "We learn as we show others," they said.

Elizabeth Dudley, recipient of a white 4-H hat, explained that several of the members received these hats to replace green ones that they have been wearing. As each member goes into high school and has completed four years of club work, he or she is presented a white hat by Scott Valley Grange during a special ceremony.

It is possible to earn bronze stars, silver stars and gold stars. To be eligible for these a member must have completed a certain number of projects, and par-

ticipated in many 4-H activities. Chris Sorenson explained to the group that bronze star is the first one earned, and when a silver star is earned, the bronze star is removed from the hat and the silver star takes its place. The diamond star is the highest attainable and can be earned only by state winners.

During an agricultural panel demonstration, Tom Hayden, Clint Custer, P. J. Hayden and Carl Hammond, through a question and answer discussion, gave a resume of correct feed rations for a beef animal. They illustrated their talk with jars of different feeds that make up this ration.

The diet consists mainly of proteins and carbohydrates. Some foods are higher in one than the other and a balanced ration is necessary to develop the ideal animal.

Bill Ruddiman, Siskiyou County farm adviser, explained the national awards program and introduced county winners.

Sharon Deppen presented a ballet dance and Tom Hayden provided a humorous background of mimicry.

Ruth Mathews told about the

outstanding club award which is presented to just one club in the county each year, and the charter and gold seal.

For two years the club has earned this award. In accepting, members were given a set of game books, a book about 4-H, and a metal file cabinet.

Outstanding local club awards were presented to Nancy Mathews for her beef projects, Lorena Dillman for "best in clothing" and Wendy Cassidy for cooking. Steven Dillman made the presentations.

The club is feeling the loss of one of the clothing leaders, Mrs. Donna Eller, who has moved to Montague. Nancy Mathews gave her a gift of appreciation from the club.

At this point Nancy Mathews introduced Wendy Cassidy as the girl All-Star County winner. Club members are very proud that one of the members has earned this coveted award.

It is given each year by Yreka Business and Professional Women. After a talk by Wendy Cassidy, the program was brought to a close and refreshments were served.

Bob O'Connor of Hollister, Calif., told police that he had given a ride to a hitchhiker who was called "Tony." O'Connor stopped for gas at a station at 2560 South Sixth Street, and Tony got out of the car. He failed to return from the restroom and O'Connor discovered that his wallet, personal papers and the money were missing.

Police issued an all-points bulletin to law enforcement agencies in Southern Oregon and Northern California. Tony was described as being about 25, with a slim build and a mustache. It is thought that he poses as a deaf mute.
