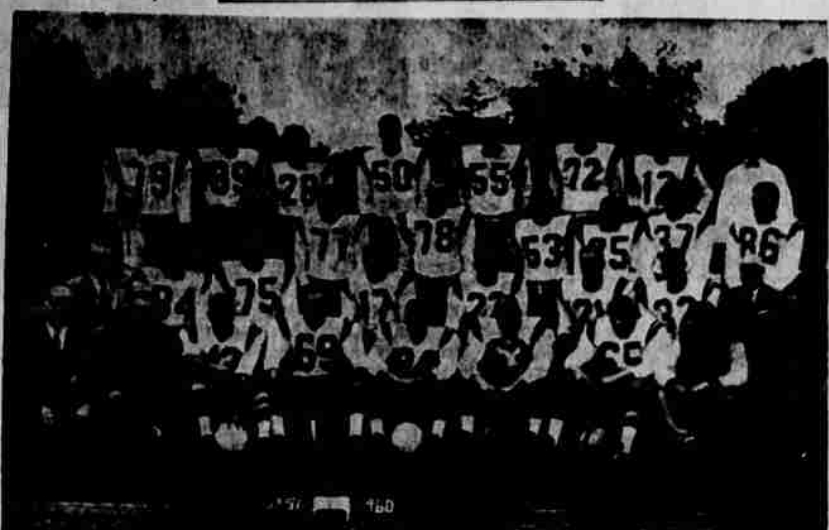

East, West Both T Operators But Vast Difference In Usage

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — They day's Shrine charity game at both operate from the T format. Kezar Stadium. Coach Milt Bruhn's East squad present vastly different ways of doing it when they meet in Saturday.

Barnes' West will also run, but they'll be passing often in this game for the benefit of the Shrine Hospital for Crippled Children.

Barnes has two of collegiate football's ablest passers in his own Bill Kilmer from UCLA and Rich Mayo of Air Force Academy. Plus that, halfback Keith Lincoln of Washington State provides a triple threat.

In the pass-catching department there are ends Marlin McKeever of Southern California and Marv Luster of UCLA plus flanker back Jim Johnson from UCLA and fullback Jerry Hill of Wyoming.

Barnes plans to use the T as the primary offense, but he may use the spread and short punt formations to loosen up the big East defense.

Bruhn indicated plenty of running when he named Tom Matte of Ohio State as the starting quarterback. Halfbacks Tom Mason of Tulane and Herb Adderley of Michigan State run with speed and power while fullback Tom Wiesner of Wisconsin provides the short smashes.

Bruhn's East enters the nationally televised (NBC) game a touchdown favorite at the 1:50 p.m. kickoff before an expected capacity Kezar crowd of 60,000. Both squads provide a coach's dream with size and speed. The East linemen average 224 pounds and the West 221. Both clubs have outstanding place-kickers with Ed Dyas of Auburn performing for the East and Skip Face of Stanford for the West.

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — Old Father Time is coming round again—so it's the season to count our blessings.

In this sports writing dodge, a fellow admittedly doesn't make much money. But he has more thrills, spills and chills in one year than the average man gets in a lifetime.

Now, nobody asked me, but my top sports thrill of 1960 came early on the first day of the Winter Olympic Games at Squaw Valley.

Down through the years, I've had my share of the big moments in sports. The thrill, for instance, I felt when the U.S. Flag passed by during the 1955 Pan-American Games in Mexico City and some of the crowd boomed.

Or the thrill the night in 1957 when Pete Rademacher, the Olympic champion who had the audacity to fight the world champ in his first battle as a pro, had Floyd Patterson on the floor at Seattle.

Or a week-long hunting safari on the Hawaiian island of Molokai with the late Paul Fagan, gunning for deer — and, of all things, wild burro.

Or the desperate under-water fight between the Hungarians and the Russians at the 1956 Summer Olympic Games in Australia.

But Squaw Valley was different. This was a more or less hometown effort. There was the squawking and squabbling that usually precedes everything that is as big as the international games.

Leo The Lip Able, Ready For LA Job

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Leo Durocher, baseball's most controversial figure as an acid-tongued manager, was ready and willing today to return to the game as a coach for the Los Angeles Dodgers.

Manager Walt Alton will come here early next month to "persuade" Durocher to take the coaching job vacated by the temporary retirement of Greg Mulleavy.

"I sincerely hope that Leo will become a Dodger coach," Alton said at his home in Darlington, Ohio. "I can think of no finer man available for the job."

"I'm very much interested and flattered by the report," said Durocher. "I'd be tickled to death to be back with the Dodgers."

But he said he would not have additional comment until he has a chance to confer with Alton. Durocher only two weeks ago complained about an apparent blackballing which barred him from any of several managerial jobs.

Leo "retired" as manager of the then New York Giants at the close of the 1955 season, taking a lucrative post as a network sportscaster. He became available for a managing job more than a year ago, but never could reach agreement with any of a dozen clubs on the market for managers.

E. J. (Buzze) Bavasi, general manager and vice president of the Dodgers, said "Leo may be coming back to baseball for the 1961 season—with the Los Angeles Dodgers." Mulleavy was transferred to scouting assignments because of poor health after serving as a field coach for the Dodgers.

Cal Poly reversed a 35-32 Willamette halftime bulge in the second half, going ahead to stay, 50-57, on a tip-in by Ed Johnson with 3:47 still on the clock. Johnson had 24, Willamette's Salto 20.
