Vancouver Services Held

YREKA — Funeral services were held for LeForest Waterman Sawtelle, 86, Yreka, at Vancouver Funeral Chapel, Vancouver, Wash., at 11 a.m. Thursday, Dec. 22. Interment followed in Evergreen Cemetery there.

Sawtelle died Saturday, Dec. 24, in Siskiyou County General Hospital after a six-month illness.

He was born April 11, 1874, in Rock County, Wis. His family moved first to Minnesota and then to South Dakota, where he attended school. He was graduated from Madison Normal School. He taught in rural schools in Oregon and Washington, then attended McMinnville College, (now Linfield College), and obtained a B.S. degree in 1898.

Following attendance at the University of Chicago, Sawtelle was a member of the staff at Michigan State College for three years. He received an M. A. degree in 1931 from the University of Southern California.

Sawtelle served in the English department of North Central High School in Spokane, from 1908 to 1920. In 1920 he went to Walla Walla to teach at Whitman College until 1925. He moved to McMinnville and served from 1927 to 1933 as a professor at Linfield College.

He retired from teaching to enter the insurance field. He moved to Yreka in 1954.

Sawtelle was married to Annie Andrews June 17, 1909. Mrs. Sawtelle is residing with her daughter, Mrs. Kenneth Young, Yreka.

A sister, Gertrude, and a brother, Claude, preceded him in death.

In addition to his wife and daughter, Olive, Sawtelle is survived by a nephew, Hans Nicolaisen of Portland; three nieces, Mrs. Alta Greene of San Jacinto, Mrs. Mable Burdon, Willamina, Ore., and Mrs. Bessie Agee of Aberdeen, Wash.

MOUNT SHASTA — Funeral services were conducted in Mount Shasta Memorial Chapel Thursday afternoon, Dec. 22, at 2 p.m. for Harvey A. Johnson, who died Monday in Grass Valley. The Rev. N. North of Grass Valley will conduct final rites.

Johnson, a native of Oregon, was born March 10, 1876. He had lived in Mount Shasta for many years, where he was a member of the city council for a long period, and mayor for 14 years. He had been employed by the state at Mount Shasta Fish Hatchery from 1923 until 1946, when he retired to Castro Valley, where he resided until his death.

Survivors include the widow, Julia, Castro Valley; three daughters, Mrs. Ulma Brown, Covina, Mrs. Peter Bell, Mount Shasta, and Mrs. Irene Christopherson, Hayward; a son, Warren A. Johnson, Vallejo; two grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

The deceased was affiliated with Knights of Pythias and Woodmen of the World lodges during many years of his life.

Interment was in Mount Shasta Memorial Park.

Suit Asks For Damages

YREKA — A damage suit was filed by Arnold O. Thompson against John Winsell, 8 and H Propane Company and all persons unknown asking \$20,000 for an alleged accident on Highway 99 near Castella, Dec. 19, 1959.

According to charges in the suit, Winsell or an unknown person caused his car to collide with the back of Thompson's truck, causing injuries in the amount of \$20,000.

Also asked are costs of the suit and of medical care and treatment. The Hurley, Messner and Bigler law firm of Yreka is representing Thompson.


In a personal injury suit, Gladys Cook is asking \$35,000 damages from Dorothy Crouch, Charles W. Russell, Luke Lange, Wagon Tongue, Inc., and all unknown persons. Representing the plaintiff is Mark M. Brawman, Yreka attorney, who filed the suit Dec. 21.

The suit charges negligent, careless and unlawful conduct of the defendants in failing to protect, light and guard a step on the premises of the Wagon Tongue, a local establishment, on which the plaintiff slipped and fell. The suit charges the plaintiff was not warned of the alleged hazardous condition.
