ANNUAL REPORT

This report is addressed to the customers of the South Suburban Sanitary District and covers the financial condition of the district at June 30, 1960, and its operations for the year then ended. It is a resume of the detailed audit report prepared by our firm (Kenneth Lambie & Co., Certified Public Accountants) and now on file at the district office, where it is available for inspection by the district's customers.

STATEMENT OF REVENUE AND EXPENSES Fiscal Year Ended June 30, 1960

Note: Beginning July 1, 1960, the monthly service fee was increased by \$1.00 per connection. At June 30, 1960 the District has 3,147 connections. Based on that number of connections service fee income for the year ended June 30, 1961 should increase approximately \$37,750.00 because of the increased rate.

BONDED DEBT

The original amount of bonded debt was \$1,800,000.00 of which \$45,000.00 was paid when due on June 1, 1960 leaving a balance payable of \$1,755,000.00 as shown above. All bond and interest payments have been met when due. The second installment on bond principal payments will be \$46,000.00 payable June 1, 1961. The bond interest expense for the year ending June 30, 1960 was \$100,460.00. The bond interest expense for the year ending June 30, 1961 will drop to \$82,660.00. The decrease of \$37,800.00 is accounted for in this manner: Interest paid to the bond broker, which was completed in the year ended June 30, 1960 \$36,000.00. 4% on \$45,000.00 bonds retired June 1, 1960 1,800.00.

DIRECTOR'S REMUNERATION

The only remuneration received by the directors is \$5.00 per director for each board meeting attended. Here is a summary of the remuneration paid the directors from the time the district was started through June 30, 1960, a period of three years:

All items of construction equipment used by the District are owned by the District, as follows: Bantam Shovel (used) under purchase contract, Backhoe (new), Case backhoe (used), Ford dump truck (used), Chevrolet dump truck (used), GMC flatbed (used) now used as water truck, Chevrolet panel (used), Chevrolet pickup (used), Drill truck, Chevrolet (used) chassis only, Road grader (used), Pumps, new and used, Compressor and tools for some (used).

No equipment has been rented at any time by the District from anyone connected with the administration of the District, with the exception of the machinery trailer and trencher rented from the Lewis Manufacturing Company. Normal rental of the trailer is \$10.00 for the first day and \$5.00 for each succeeding day. The District gets a special rate of only \$2.00 for each day of the trailer. All equipment used in the office of the District is either used equipment or donated equipment with the exception of three office chairs, three desk lamps, one file cabinet.

The District manager receives mileage at the rate of 10 cents per mile for his pickup on District business only. The manager maintains the vehicle and furnishes all gas and oil and tires used. There is a suit claiming \$250,000.00 damages pending against the District by the construction contractor. The records of the District indicate that it is doubtful the plaintiff will recover any substantial amount on its claim. The suit arises mainly because the District has withheld payment of \$26,083.07 on the contract, in order to recover damages arising from the contractor's operations. The District contemplates that any sums it may owe the contractor will be offset by its claim for damages against the contractor.

MILEAGE ALLOWANCES AND ADMINISTRATIVE EMPLOYEES' WAGES

Overtime for administrative employees is paid at straight time for hours in excess of 40 hours per week. Overtime incurred is due largely to the customer demand that the District keep its office open on Saturdays. Mileage is allowed administrative employees at the rate of 10¢ per mile. Oregon law permits mileage allowances for directors but the District has never paid mileage to the directors.
