The Klamath Auditorium is a focal point for community activities—both for adults and youth.

Whether the activities are basketball teams thundering back and forth on the floor or a group of tots attending play school, the big building serves them well.

George A. Price, director of the Klamath Falls Parks and Recreation Department, has compiled this list of activities currently being conducted in the auditorium.

Play school for pre-school children—More than 20 children between the ages of 4 and 5 attend this school. The more advanced pupils go on Monday, Wednesday and Friday and the younger tots attend on Tuesday and Thursday. Instruction is in singing and group play. Mothers have been enthusiastic about the program and given their help.

Basketball—The City and Victory leagues practice and play games regularly in the auditorium. The Victory League consists of more than 100 teen-aged boys. The City League is made up of more than 100 men.

Teen Recreation Council—Junior Class presidents of each school in the county are members of the Teen Recreation Council and work in cooperation with the Park and Recreation Department in order to program activities for high school students.

A "Hi Nite" is scheduled every second and fourth Wednesday of the month. One room is set aside for dancing to records and the gymnasium is reserved for various sports. About 200 students attended the first "Hi Night" and attendance has held up well since then.

Baton and Marching Instruction—About 50 girls participate in this activity.

Pelican Players—This theatrical group, formed by the Park and Recreation Department during the past summer, has a membership of 35. The group meets in the auditorium two or three nights a week.

Women's Recreation Night—Every Thursday evening, through mid-November, a group of 20 women enjoyed various activities in the auditorium. The group has since concentrated on modern dance and has changed its meeting time.

Meeting Rooms—Rooms are available to various groups such as the Coin Club and Chess Club. About 50 members attend meetings of each of these groups. Rooms are rented for \$5 per meeting and the money is used for building maintenance.

Golden Age Club—More than 100 area oldsters meet every Wednesday afternoon in the auditorium dining room free of charge. The group was formed by the recreation department last year.

Free Play Time—Each afternoon from 3:30 to 5 the auditorium is open for free play. About 40 children a day take part in various sports. In the evenings, when the auditorium is not in use, the free play period is extended under supervision of a department employe.
