if no settling occurred by June 1, presuming the freeze and thaw cycle had happened, there was a possibility that the foundation might be considered "reasonably secure."

Wales also advised the council that an experienced soil testing laboratory could probably make a check and give the council an expert opinion on future action necessary.

The question of rental paid the city for a grocery store on a portion of Veterans Memorial Park confronted the city when it was stated that the county assessor had indicated that the city would be taxed for this property, valued at \$15,000.

A letter from James Stilwell, appraising the situation, stated that the land and building were valued at about the \$15,000 figure, but because of the store's location and business volume, it would not seem possible to raise the rent from the present \$80 a month to cover the proposed taxes amounting to \$315.59.

Money from the rental goes into the Veterans Memorial Park fund for maintenance of the park. Councilman Fleet suggested that the city contact the League of Oregon Cities to see if they are going to contest the recent assessor's ruling in court.

City Manager G. S. Vergeer informed the council that estimated cost of repairs at the municipally-owned terminal building would be \$13,721 for reconstruction, not including such items as equipment replacement and damage to the Satellite Room.

He indicated that temporary repairs had been made and reconstruction would begin as soon as the council gave its approval to the estimate of the Brosthouse Construction Company.

U.S. Will Hold At Guantanamo

WASHINGTON (AP) — The White House said today the breaking of diplomatic relations with Cuba "has no effect on the status of our naval base at Guantanamo."

Presidential press secretary James C. Hagerty dictated this brief statement to emphasize this country's determination to maintain the big naval base located in Cuba.

"The termination of American diplomatic and consular relations with Cuba has no effect on the status of our naval station at Guantanamo."

"The treaty rights under which we maintain the naval station may not be abrogated without the consent of the United States."

SALEM (AP)—Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton today said Oregon, Washington and Idaho should seek payment for salmon he said were lost because of Idaho Power Co. dam construction on the Snake River.

In a letter to Gov. Mark O. Hatfield, Thornton urged Hatfield to discuss such joint action at Hatfield's coming meeting with governors of Washington and Idaho.

Hatfield said he had not seen the letter and thus had no comment.

Thornton said his office looked into the law on the question and found there is a legal precedent for a claim against the company.

The company may settle as a matter of public relations without the necessity of filing a suit, Thornton said.

Idaho Power Co. blocked the river while constructing Brownlee Dam and the fish were lost, Thornton said. He said biologists had counted 4,680 dead salmon and estimates of the number that died ranged up to 10,000.

Thornton said damages should be measured by replacement cost and recommended an indemnity large enough to defray the cost of building a hatchery to replace the salmon.

While Brownlee Dam is on the Idaho-Oregon border, both states have thoroughly investigated the fish loss, he said.

Thornton said it would appear that Washington might also have an interest in the destroyed fish. He said in view of this it would be impossible for any one state to claim sole ownership of the entire spawning run.
