

# Cuban Break Took Time, But Seemed Inevitable

HAVANA (AP)—The break in diplomatic relations between the United States and Fidel Castro's Cuba was long in coming but many here for a long time believed it was inevitable.

Observers said it appeared the bearded revolutionary had no intention of getting along with Washington almost from the time he came out of the hills of eastern Cuba to take power two years ago.

Why Castro took this aggressive stand is disputed here. But a majority of foreign diplomats in Havana agree that the Castro regime never opened the way for normal diplomatic relations with the United States.

After he flew to the United States early in 1959, Castro is said to have expressed resentment to intimates over his failure to meet either President Eisenhower or Secretary of State Christian A. Herter. He expected Eisenhower and Herter to make overtures to him, telling his associates he could not seek such meetings himself and "still face my people."

Nearly a year after this visit, two American reporters were booted out of Cuba after reporting Castro had expressed willingness to meet Eisenhower or Herter in the interests of peace.

Castro said he could not have made this overture because it would have been misunderstood as a sign of weakness on his part. Veteran reporters interpreted this as a sign Castro wanted relations with the United States only on his own terms—if at all.

Castro's seizure of the billion-dollar American investment in Cuba was pushed vigorously, accompanied by violent propaganda blasts at American "monopolists" and "economic imperialism." # State To Get \$12.2 Million For Highways

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of Commerce Frederick H. Mueller Wednesday parceled out to the states \$21,250,000 in federal aid for building primary, secondary and urban highways in the 12 months starting next July 1.

The amount is in addition to the \$683,750,000 apportioned to the states for these programs on July 26.

The extra amount was withheld at that time pending completion of the 1960 census. Population is one of the elements involved in allotting road funds to the states.

Wednesday's apportionment will have no effect on the \$2.2 billion apportioned on July 26 for the interstate superhighway program.

The amounts allotted, including the July 26 amounts, for primary, secondary and urban highways (with funds provided earlier for the interstate system listed in parentheses) include:

Oregon, \$12,214,735 (\$37,530,281); Washington, \$13,775,110 (\$39,219,469).

# Lawmakers Vote For New Chiefs

SACRAMENTO (UPI)—Democrats and Republicans have completed selection of leaders for the 1961 legislative session.

Democrats, in control of the lower house by a 47-33 margin, reelected William A. Munnell, D-Montebello, as majority leader and chose Jerome Waldie, Antioch, for the new post of caucus chairman with Gordon H. Winton Jr. of Merced to serve another session as majority whip.

Republicans again voted to go along with Joseph C. Shell of Los Angeles as minority leader and Bruce F. Sumner of Newport Beach as GOP whip. John A. Buserud, San Francisco, was chosen caucus chairman replacing Walter I. Dahl, Piedmont.

Hagadone is publisher of the Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, Press, also an affiliate of the Scripps League. Kaen formed the present newspaper in 1950 when he bought the daily Oregon City Enterprise and consolidated it with his own twice weekly Banner Courier.

SACRAMENTO (UPI)—Three methods of banishing pornographic literature from California's newsstands are being prepared for introduction in the 1961 legislature.
