### MONTAGUE SCHOOL

Brewer also touched on the problem of mentally ill or retarded children, stating there was a surprising number of these cases in Siskiyou County in need of psychiatric care.

Members of Cub Scout Pack No. 51 of Montague, presented the charter to Lester Owens for the PTA, which sponsors the group.

Lester Owens, principal of the Montague School, announced that Mrs. John Foster would start a beginner's sewing class at the Montague School, providing at least 15 persons signed up. The course would last 12 weeks, starting Tuesday evening, Jan. 31. It will be given under the adult education program of the College of the Siskiyou.

It was also announced that if enough women were interested to make up a class, a 10-week cake decoration course would be started, beginning Feb. 1.

A brief report was heard on the plans for the spring production of the Montague PTA, "Frantic Antics," to be presented March 9, 10 and 11, in joint sponsorship with the Shasta Valley Community Club. Proceeds from two nights of the show will be earmarked for the Montague swimming pool project, which is currently nearing the \$7,000 mark in the junior division contest.

The fifth grade class won the room prize for having the largest representation at the meeting. Refreshments were served by the fifth grade room mothers. The next meeting will be Jan. 19.
