South 11 Led By Rifleman

MOBILE, Ala. (AP)—Rifleman Norman Sneed of Wake Forest passed for four touchdowns in directing the South All-Stars to a 33-26 victory over the North in the 12th annual Senior Bowl game Saturday.

Sneed's final touchdown strike, a 42-yarder to back Fred Brown of Georgia, came with seven seconds of play remaining and provided the margin of victory in the wildest of all Senior Bowl games.

The 6-foot-4, 208-pound Sneed edged Stanford's Dick Norman in a stirring aerial duel that saw the South pick up 328 yards passing to 311 for the Northerners. Norman, who rallied his club time after time, was voted the game's outstanding player.

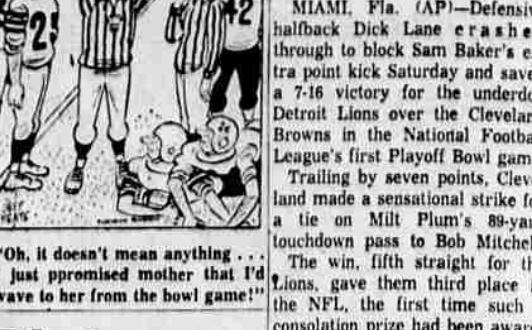
Norman had pulled the North into a 26-20 tie with three minutes to go on a 29-yard touchdown pass to Don Smith of Missouri. But an attempted conversion by Skip Face, also of Stanford, was blocked by defensive back Bobby Lauder of Auburn.

This set the stage for the fabulous finish in the final seconds. Sneed and the great Bobby Crespi of Mississippi, who took in two long touchdown passes from Sneed, tied for the South's most outstanding back. One of the scoring plays by the two covered 70 yards, the other 47.

Guard Mike Zeno of VPI was chosen outstanding lineman for the South, and another guard, Joe Dean of Ohio University, was picked as the North's top lineman.

Detroit Saved By Defender

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—Defensive halfback Dick Lane crashed through to block Sam Baker's extra point kick Saturday and saved a 7-16 victory for the underdog Detroit Lions over the Cleveland Browns in the National Football League's first Playoff Bowl game.

Trailing by seven points, Cleveland made a sensational strike for a tie on Milt Plum's 89-yard touchdown pass to Bob Mitchell.

The win, fifth straight for the Lions, gave them third place in the NFL, the first time such a consolation prize had been awarded. Detroit finished second in the Western Division and Cleveland was runner-up in the East.

As it turned out, Detroit might have scored again. A pass interception by Gary Lowe, his third of the game, gave the Lions possession at the Cleveland 12. But Detroit deliberately let the clock run out.

A shirt-sleeved crowd of 34,981 saw the massive Detroit team continue its domination of Cleveland. The Lions now have beaten the Browns 18 times in eight games out of nine.

Trailing 7-0 at the half, Detroit went ahead 10-7 in the third on a five-yard touchdown run by Nick Pietrosante and a field goal and conversion by Jim Martin. The Browns tied it at 10-10 before Ken Webb scored the decisive touchdown on a one-yard dive in the last quarter.

Both Cleveland touchdowns were scored on passes by Plum, the first going nine yards to Rich Kreitling. Baker hit a 27-yard field goal.

Champion Bowlers In Series

SAN BERNARDINO, Calif. (AP)—The world series of bowling opens a 10-day run Thursday with leading bowlers from 42 states competing for \$68,150 in prize money.

The 240 men and 96 women, selected from nearly 12,000 bowlers in local and state eliminations, will be competing in the All-Star Bowling Tournament for the first time on the West Coast. The event is sponsored by the Bowling Proprietors Association of America.

Defending Champion Harry Smith and four-time titlist Don Carter will be shooting for a 10,000 first-place prize. They are members of rival St. Louis teams.

Leading contenders for the \$5,000 top woman's prize are Sylvia Wene and Marion Ladewig. Miss Wene, of Philadelphia, won her second All-Star crown last year with the first 300 game ever rolled in the women's division. Mrs. Ladewig, seven-time winner from Grand Rapids, Mich., lost the title to Miss Wene by less than one point.

Ohio State Defends Title

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP)—Ohio State thundered past Illinois 91-65 Saturday night to open defense of its Big Ten basketball title in true championship style.

With the regulars playing little more than three-fourths of the game, the top-ranked Buckeyes easily won their 10th straight contest this season, 15th in a row over two years and 16 straight in St. John Arena.

Scoring leader for the Buckeyes was Jerry Lucas with 35 points in less than 30 minutes of action. Big Luke was removed before the rest of the regulars as he fell heavily on the floor, slightly injuring his right knee.

Long Hitter Takes Lead; Palmer Out

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Long-hitting Paul Harney took the lead at the midway mark of the \$45,000 Los Angeles Open Saturday with his second straight 3-under-par 68 as the big name of the tournament, Arnold Palmer, fell out.

Palmer, the National Open and Masters champion of 1960, failed to qualify for the final two rounds as the ranks were cut to the low 90s and ties.

Saturday the 31-year-old "golfer of the year" took a 72 for a total of 149.

That horrendous 12 strokes on the final hole for a 77 Friday wrecked Palmer's chances in this, his hard-luck tournament.

Harney, former Eastern collegiate champion from Worcester, Mass., posted a 36-hole score of 136 to take a precarious one-stroke lead.

Ted Kroll, the first-round leader from Fort Lauderdale, Fla., with a 66, fell back with a 72 for 138.

Knotted in the runner-up spot at 137 were Ken Venturi of Palo Alto, Calif., 69-68; Bob Goalby, Crystal River, Fla., 67-70; and Los Angeles' Eric Monti, 67-70.

Scores of 148 or better qualified for the third round.

This was the first time Palmer had failed to survive the cut since the Indianapolis "500" last year, and that was at the 54-hole mark.

At 138 tied with Kroll after Saturday's round were the 7,000-yard par 36-35-71; Rancho municipal golf course, were ex-national PGA Champion Lionel Hebert, 68-70; Bill Collins, Crystal River, Fla., 67-71; and Tommy Jacobs of Palm Springs, Calif., 69-69.

The 140 group included Billy Casper Jr., Bob Rosburg, Gardner Dickinson, England's Eric Brown and 23-year-old Tommy Aaron of Gainesville, Ga., whose 66 was the low round of the day.

Van Brocklin Wins Trophy

HOLLYWOOD, Fla. (AP)—Norm Van Brocklin and Joe Schmidt Saturday were named winners of awards as most valuable offensive and defensive players, respectively of the National Football League.

Schmidt, linebacker for the Detroit Lions, accepted the award following the Cleveland-Detroit playoff game at Miami. Van Brocklin, quarterback for the Philadelphia Eagles, is in Los Angeles and was unable to accept the trophy in person.

Duke Hits Bucket

DURHAM, N.C. (AP)—Duke's eight-ranked basketball team hit the bucket in the clutch here Saturday for a sweeping 81-67 Atlantic Coast Conference victory over North Carolina State.

Sophomore sensation Art Heyman provided the major Duke fireworks with 27 points, high for the game. The conference scoring leader bagged 10 field goals and 7 for 10 from the free-throw line to lead the Blue Devils to their 11th victory in 12 starts. He also grabbed 16 rebounds.

The Wolfpack, trailing most of the first half, turned on a surge to lead 36-33 at halftime. The first of the second half was nip and tuck, but with 16:35 remaining, Duke jumped ahead 41-40. At that point, the Blue Devils scored eight straight points. They padded the lead to 12 and 14 points but the Wolfpack was never able to get closer than eight points.

Leading State was Bob Distefano with 19.

Brave Pours 'Em In

PEORIA, Ill. (AP)—Chet Walker, Bradley's candidate for All-America honors, poured in 46 points Saturday night, leading the Braves to a 76-66 victory over Tulsa in a Missouri Valley Conference basketball game.

Walker, who earlier this season scored 50 points, connected on 16 of 25 field goals and 14 of 18 free throws. In addition, he grabbed off 17 rebounds.

The victory was the 18th straight for the second ranked Braves who are 12-0 for the season and 4-0 in conference competition.

Farm Boy Scores 104

CAMDEN, Tenn. (AP)—"Everybody on the team said they wanted me to set a record," explained Danny Boyd, a 16-year-old farm boy who poured in 104 points in a high school basketball game.

"So I just kept going."

The 5-foot-11, 155-pound senior with the de-an-eye set the record—24 above the recognized Tennessee mark — Friday night as Camden overwhelmed Clarksburg 130-43 for its 18th victory in 19 games.

"I was embarrassed about scoring all those points," Boyd said Saturday at his home near here.

"I didn't want to play the last half."

He played 28 minutes, sitting out the last four.

Danny scored 44 field goals and 16 free throws, with his quarter totals 24, 31, 27 and 22.

Low Outshoots Gophers

IOWA CITY, Iowa (AP)—Iowa streaked to its ninth basketball victory this season, and its first in Big Ten competition by outshooting Minnesota 71-46 in a regionally televised conference game Saturday.

The Hawkeyes appeared to be seeking revenge for the trouble the Gophers caused them in two defeats last year and blazed away to a 40-16 halftime lead. With the triumph stashed away early in the second half Iowa Coach Sharm Scheuerman started using all of his reserves.

Durocher Signed As Bum Coach

LOS ANGELES (AP)—The Los Angeles Dodgers are calling a press conference next Monday afternoon, presumably to announce that Leo Durocher has signed as third base coach.

Buzzie Bavasi, vice president of the Dodgers, said that Durocher and Manager Walter Alston will be present at the conference. Alston already has given his blessing to Durocher as replacement for Coach Greg Mulleavy, who is sidelined by illness.

NCAA Down On Boxing

PITTSBURGH (AP)—The executive committee of the National Collegiate Athletic Association took a step Saturday toward ending national competition in college boxing.

The committee, in a meeting preliminary to the NCAA business session next week, voted to sponsor an amendment to the by-laws which would remove boxing from the list of championship events sponsored by the association. The reason given was that too few colleges still have boxing teams to make a national tournament worthwhile.

The amendment must be passed by the NCAA convention Wednesday to become effective. If it passes as expected, the NCAA will continue to have a boxing rules committee for the benefit of colleges which want to carry on boxing competition locally.

Vikings Eye Van Brocklin For Coach

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Norm Van Brocklin, retiring quarterback of the National Football League championship Eagles, is under consideration for the coaching job with the Minnesota Vikings.

Bert Rose, general manager of the Vikings, who starts play in the NFL next fall, held a private conference Friday with Van Brocklin shortly after he flew here to play in the Pro Bowl Game Jan. 15.

After the session Rose said that Van Brocklin is "one of about five" screened candidates for the job. Another is Sid Gillman, who coached the Los Angeles Chargers to the Western Division title in the American Football League this season.

Jack Ardon of Lakeside, N.J., who averaged 15.1 points a game for Tulane's basketball team last season, is majoring in zoology.

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP)—The rematch between NBA World Middleweight Champion Gene Fulmer and ex-champ Sugar Ray Robinson was officially set Saturday for Feb. 25 at the desert gambling resort.

The announcement was made at a news conference by Norman Rothchild, Syracuse, N.Y., promoter, Fulmer's manager, Merv Jensen, and the two local promoters, Jack Doyle and Mel Greb.

Fulmer kept his title in his last meeting with the aging Robinson in an action-packed draw in the Memorial Sports Arena in Los Angeles Dec. 3.

The rematch will be a regularly televised Saturday night fight. It will originate from the convention center, a dice roll or two from the gambling strip.

Rothchild had reached a written agreement for the fight last Thursday with Robinson in New York.
