The Klamath Union Pelicans, thirteen strong, virtually smothered their second Southern Oregon Conference foe, the Ashland Grizzlies, Friday night. They won 63-23 but the Ashlanders won some kind of a moral victory when they spoiled the KU quint's "practice" plans.

In the other SOC Friday clash the Medford Black Tornado squeaked out a 66-59 win over the Grants Pass Cavemen.

Pel coach Dean White had planned to platoon his charges throughout the game, but he wanted to "mix" his platoons. This fell through when the Grizzlies failed to come out of a zone defense the whole night long. So, White, making the most of the situation, worked 10 of his men in alternating solid units and got some practice against the zone.

White had to go "back" on his promise to the second string in the second half. He had promised that the starting five would play only until Ashland had scored five points in the last two periods. The Grizzlies didn't cooperate and notched only one field goal and two free throws during the entire second half so White had to pull his first five just so that the second five would get another chance to play.

For probably the first and last time in the history of basketball at KU was the bench lined with players who were hoping, if secretly, that the enemy would score.

Junior Gary Patzke led the Whitebirds in both the scoring and rebounding department. He totaled 18 points off five two-pointers and added eight successes in 11 tries from the foul line. His 17 rebounds topped 12 pulled down by Bruce Brickner. Brickner scored seven points to trail guard Wally Palmberg who notched 14.

Gail Tepper was high for the losers with eight total points. The Pelicans outrebounded the Grizzlies 55-19 and connected on 25 of 60 field goals while the Ashlanders managed only seven in 43 shots. From the foul line the Pels hit 13 of 21 while the best the losers could contrive was 9-19.

Hula Bowl Set Today

HONOLULU (UPI)—Forty eight of the nation's best collegiate football players, representing every major conference in the United States, fight it out today in the 15th annual Hula Bowl classic at the Honolulu Stadium. The game pits the East all-stars against the West all-stars. Proof that the competition will be fast, furious and classy is seen in the fact that five All-Americans are on hand and 10 men who were first-round draft choices in the recent NFL draw at Philadelphia.

Opposing coaches will be Notre Dame's Joe Kuharich and Washington's Jim Owens. The lineups will have much of the flavor of the Dec. 31 Shrine classic of San Francisco, with a few stars thrown in from teams which performed in other bowls Jan. 2.

In fact, Kuharich announced Friday he would go with the same backfield that brought the East a 7-0 win in the Shrine game. This would be Tom Matte of Ohio State at quarterback, Tom Mason of Tulane and Herb Adkins of Michigan State at halfbacks and Tom Wiesner of Wisconsin at fullback. Matte, the Buckeyes' brilliant running quarterback, was named outstanding performer of the Shrine game.

Starting East line on offense will be All-American Mike Ditka of Pittsburgh and Mickey Mangham of Louisiana State at ends, tackles Frank Brixius of Minnesota and Jim Tyrer of Ohio State, guards Ken Rice of Auburn (another All-American) and Ron Maltony of Purdue, and center Jerry Smith of Michigan.

LOS ANGELES (AP)—The Boston Celtics and the St. Louis Hawks increased their respective leads in the Eastern and Western divisions of the National Basketball Association with victories Friday night.

With Tom Heinsohn and Bob Cousy leading the way, the Celtics scored their fifth straight victory on the road by beating the crippled Detroit Pistons at Detroit 108-102.

The Hawks moved to eight games in front of Cincinnati by beating the Los Angeles Lakers, 108-104. A Hawk reserve, Woody Sauldsberry, was the decisive factor. He replaced Cliff Hagan in the third period to guard the Laker ace, Elgin Baylor. Baylor was held to two points in the third quarter. Sauldsberry added 10 points to the Hawk cause.

Heinsohn contributed 31 points in the Boston victory while Cousy had 19, in addition to assisting on nine baskets. The win stretched the Celtics' Eastern Division lead to 1½ games over the Philadelphia Warriors.

'Dobermans' Net Victory

Bridges, 6-2 going on 6-4, had himself a big night. He connected on eight of 11 shots from the floor, hit 1-2 at the foul line, hauled down 13 rebounds over the heads of Owls Bob Petersen and Sammy Smith, and generally made a nuisance of himself so far as the Owls were concerned.

His 17 points was the game high, topping the 14 scored by Smith and the 10 of teammate Don Powell. Smith nabbed 10 rebounds, while Petersen grabbed 11 for the Techmen and counted nine points.

Playing a not particularly spectacular brand of ball, the Viks early threatened to run away and hide when Bridges and Powell teamed to give the visitors an 18-10 edge in the first 10 minutes.

At this point Owl coach Wally Palmberg called a timeout and directed a comment or two to his faltering charges. Whatever he said, it took.

Bob Cumford, a replacement for ailing Gene Branson, scored five points, Petersen stuffed a rebound, Smith contributed a lay-up, Hewlett Nash jumped one in and sub Norm Johns potted a set shot that gave the Owls their only lead of the game 23-22, with :52 left in the half.

The Viks evened the count two seconds later when Johns fouled Elton Lahti who counted his free throw to make it 23-23 at the gun.

Although the Owls had out-rebounded the Viks 15-8 during the first period, faulty ball-handling lost them the advantage.

At the opening of the second half Bridges counted a pair of quick ones and big Bill Turner notched one to give the Viks a 29-23 lead before Smith got in gear. He netted four two-pointers to make the count 33-31 for the Viks with 12:56 left, the closest the Owls were to get until the closing seconds.

Bridges and Powell worked the count to 39-31 with 6:25 left and again Palmberg called a timeout and made some changes in his lineup.

He called Charlie Wilson who responded with five quick points and Petersen added a free toss but they were still three points shy at the final horn.

Tar Heel Mentor, NCAA Slate "Talk"

PITTSBURGH (AP)—North Carolina basketball coach Frank McGuire sent his sixth-ranked Tar Heels against Notre Dame Saturday, then winged west for a possible showdown here with the National Collegiate Athletic Association.

The powerful NCAA Council will hear McGuire and two other North Carolina representatives answer questions Sunday on whether the university has recruited basketball players beyond permitted limits.

The team that plays the Fighting Irish in North Carolina tonight lists eight players from the New York, Pennsylvania and New Jersey area, a well-stocked hunting ground for Atlantic Coast Conference bird dogs.

A spokesman for the university said at Chapel Hill Friday night that McGuire, University Chancellor William Aycock and Athletic Director Church Erickson will appear before the council.

Erickson, already in Pittsburgh for the annual NCAA convention which opened with preliminary meetings Friday, refused comment.

Walt Byers, executive director of the NCAA and a member of the council, would not even confirm McGuire's scheduled appearance. But it is known that McGuire and others from North Carolina appeared before the council at meetings in San Francisco and Kansas City this year.

Byers did say progress was being made in the case of Oklahoma. The Sooners have been on indefinite probation for a year and a day now for football recruiting.

Byers said he has been in contact with Arthur L. Wood, the former Oklahoma City accountant in possession of the books kept on a recruiting fund available to the Sooners in 1952-54.

Last January, Wood, now living in Reno, Nev., refused to open the books, saying that since he was a certified public accountant federal law prohibited him from giving out such information. The university said it was powerless to help and the NCAA said it could not determine a definite penalty unless they knew the extent of the excessive recruiting.

Byers would not elaborate, but apparently he had been in contact with Wood and the impasse may be broken. The Sooners were banned indefinitely from post-season football and the lucrative NCAA-controlled football TV program.
