Pels Dump GP; Owls Earn Split

KUHS Five Takes Two From GP

A withering fourth quarter basket barrage broke a tight game wide open Saturday night on Pelican court and gave the Pelicans a 69 to 52 victory over a pressing gang of Cavemen from Grants Pass.

The victory was the third consecutive conference triumph for Coach Dean White's charges who belted Ashland Friday night 63 to 23 on the Grizzlie's court.

For three quarters the Saturday night clash was a "nip-and-tucker" with the Pels holding the lead but the Cavemen threatening.

KU held a seven point 50-43 edge to open the final quarter and ran 14 points before the visitors could counter a point. Wally Palmberg and Fred Biehne paced the 14 point barrage that sank the Cavemen hopes for an upset triumph.

Grants Pass held the lead for only the first minute of the game. Larry Janssen sunk a push shot to give Coach Gordon Prehm's team a short-lived lead. Biehne countered a gift toss on a foul shot and Bob Lewellyn added another point for Grants Pass on a free throw.

Palmberg High
Wally Palmberg who was the game's top scorer with 27 points scored from outside with 1:05 gone in the first quarter to tie the game at 3-3.

He came back 25 seconds later with another two-pointer and put the Pels in front, a lead they never gave up although Grants Pass closed to a single point a number of times in the first three quarters.

Palmberg again provided the offensive spark for the Pels as he scored 10 of their first 17 points and poured in 10 field goals and seven of 10 free throws for his 27 point total.

Klamath held quarter leads of 17-14, 38-35 and 50-43. The big scoring spurge of the night came in that fourth quarter when the quarter 10 seconds old and Palmberg followed 30 seconds later. Biehne added another two pointer, then sunk three free tosses on two separate fouls. This made the score 59-43.

Palmberg dumped in a charity toss, Gary Patzke, the game's second high scorer at 16 points, counted two free throws. Palmberg a gift loss and Bob Lapsley a free throw to make it 64 to 43. With three minutes remaining in the fourth quarter, Jim Davis dropped in a two-pointer for the Cavemen's first counters of the quarter.

Brickner On Bench
The Pels played without the services of Bruce Brickner throughout much of the third quarter when he picked up his fourth foul and spent the bigger share of the frame on the bench.

He re-entered the game in the final quarter and didn't foul out. Meantime, Grants Pass lost both Dave Haunz and Clyde Murray, both 6-4 ball players, on the personal foul route.

Klamath shot a warm 380, converting 23 out of 60 field goal attempts, while Grants Pass was right behind with a .320 on 16 for 51 shooting.

The Pels dominated the rebounds despite the tall Cavemen, snaring 54 while the visitors got 29. The KU Jayvees also chalked up a pair of victories over the weekend, dumping Ashland's Jayvees 56 to 46 Friday night and turning a big second half into a 57 to 45 win over the Grants Pass Jayvees Saturday night.

Idaho Tops Oregon, Moore Held to Four

MOSCOW, Idaho (AP) — Utilizing a sterling defense and charging their guards with most of the offensive responsibility Idaho rolled to a 64-49 victory over Oregon's Ducks here Saturday night.

The victory was a form of a revenge for a 68-66 last-second-defeat suffered at the hands of the Ducks Friday night.

The Vandals, who began their defensive push mid-way through the first half, after trailing as much as 10 points through the early going, came to life with zest in the second half and rolled up a safe margin toward victory with some 6 or 7 minutes remaining.

Co-captain Dale James, who thought he might have lost a starting berth to the fast improving Rich Porter, showed Saturday night he still is dangerous and tallied 25 points for game honors.

Charlie Warren hit for 18 points, the only double figure performer for Oregon.

James got 22 points in the second half.

Running guard Chuck White with 17, Porter, who had scored 20 last night, started Saturday but got 3 and saw only limited action.

Virtually the same was true for Oregon's high scoring Glenn Moore, 6-foot-7 center, who went wild last night with 32 points and had to settle for only 4, a field goal in each half tonight.

Idaho held a 23-22 edge at the half but had trailed through most of the first. With three minutes remaining until the half, Oregon led 22-16. Ther White and James, established the pattern which continued into the second half as they scored seven consecutive points in the three minutes and sent the Vandals to the rest period with the one point edge.

The victory gives Idaho a 3-10 record and sent Oregon back to Eugene with a 5-4 season mark.

Owls Post OCC Win In Thriller

The Oregon Tech Owls cracked the Oregon Collegiate Conference win column Saturday night when they edged the cozy Portland State Vikings 46-45 in a thrill-packed five minute overtime.

At the end of regular play the score was 43-41 after the Techmen had blown a 43-37 lead that existed with only 1:28 left in the game.

The victory evened the two-game weekend series one each, the Vikings having grabbed a 42-39 win Friday night on the Mile High court.

Sammy "Cool Cat" Smith proved he was just that when he climbed high on the backboard with a two-pointer that wrapped up the Saturday triumph for the Owls with less than 15 seconds left in the overtime period. Smith scooped in a rebound after guard Hewlett Nash had missed a jumper, which, in turn resulted from a missed free throw by Smith.

Sammy Produces
Smith hauled in 23 rebounds and counted 17 points to become the second high producer for the night.

Although the Owls had momentum leads at 4-2 and 12-10 during the first half they were actually in arrears the biggest portion of the ballgame.

They managed to break the tight defensive thrown up by the Portlanders with 7:20 left of regular playing time when Smith dumped a rebound to make the count 35-34. He came right back with a jumper and a set shot, both from outside to add four more points, and guard Charlie Wilson drilled one that made the count 41-36. Smith drew a foul with 3:00 left and sunk both shots to make it 43-36 but at this point the Owls began to falter.

Viking Bill Turner, the game's high-pointer with 19 tallies, came up with a pair of jumpers, and Eldon Lahti intercepted an Owl pass for an easy layup that made the score 43-41 with 25 seconds left to go.

One Big Shot
Coach Sharkey Nelson called a time out and sent in Gary Morton, who cast off with one shot, but it was a big one. It tied everything up with three seconds left.

Turner led off with a jumper from the key just seconds into the overtime and the Viks settled into some real ball-control. Don Bridges fouled Bob Petersen with 2:14 left and Petersen sunk one to make the count 45-44.

The Owls got the ball with just 55 seconds left and Smith drew the foul that led to winning bucket.

The Owls earned a 64-44 rebound advantage as Petersen followed up Smith's fat total with 13. Turner was high for the losers with nine.

Owl coach Wally Palmberg, enthused over the way his squad came through when it counted, said, "You can see we still have a lot of work to do. We just weren't ready for this series—only three days practice after a long layoff... but I think we've got the stuff."

Fouls Cost Beavers Game With Pilots

CORVALLIS (AP) — The University of Portland cashed in on Oregon State fouls for a 47-44 victory in a fiercely played basketball game here Saturday night.

Oregon State trailed until late in the contest when it forced ahead, 39-36, on two free throws by Jay Carty and another by Steve Pauly. But Portland fought back to a 44-39 lead on two field goals by Roland Carpenter and two more by 6-10 Bill Garner and Mike Doherty.

Oregon State made a final bid when field goals by Jim Woodland and 6-10 Karl Anderson cut the margin to two points. But Portland bagged three more free throws and limited the home team to a single point in the final seconds.

Portland used only six players in gaining its first victory over Oregon State since November, 1956. Doherty, with 11 points, and Garner and Carpenter, with 10 each, paced a well-balanced offensive.

Jim Woodland of Oregon State led all scorers with 13 points.

Oregon State fouled 20 times to 10 for Portland, which had 11 free throws to 10 for OSC. That offset a 17-13 OSC field goal edge.

Honkers, Hornets Have Hot Weekend

EAGLE POINT (Special) — The Lakeview Honkers and the Henley Hornets may have had a long ride but they made the most of their first venture into Rogue League action over the weekend.

The Lakeview quintet dumped Rogue River 56-42 after having topped Eagle Point Friday night, while the Hornets just reversed the procedure, whipping Eagle Point 44-36 Saturday night after stopping the Rogue River five Friday night.

The two teams now stand tied at the top of the Rogue loop with a pair of wins each against no losses.
