

NCAA Takes Look At Tar Heels

Substitution Rules Included On Slate

PITTSBURGH (UPI)—The National Collegiate Athletic Association officially opens its 55th annual convention today and the powerful 18-member council may announce whether the University of North Carolina will be censured for alleged basketball recruiting violations.

The precarious position of the Tar Heels came to light Sunday when NCAA Executive Director Walter Byers acknowledged the rules infraction committee had met with a four-man delegation headed by University Chancellor William Aycock.

Aycock was accompanied by Athletic Director Charles P. Erickson, head basketball coach Frank McGuire and Asst. Coach Dean Smith. He was the spokesman for the group during a two-hour session and then departed abruptly for Chapel Hill, N.C.

Byers' acknowledgment of the meeting came as a surprise. The NCAA usually is noncommittal on such matters unless a penalty is imposed on the school involved.

Promises Statement Today
Byers promised a statement concerning schools facing action and the progress of schools already placed on probation would be issued at either the noon or 5 p.m. press conferences today.

Excluding the announcement that the Tar Heels had "presented their case," the North Carolina meeting remained "top secret."

It was reported the Tar Heels came under NCAA scrutiny after McGuire had recruited Northern

players who switched from Brooklyn St. John's to Chapel Hill several years ago.

In football, a return to unlimited substitution — which has been outlawed since 1953 — was the main topic Sunday for the rules committee of the American Football Coaches Association.

Jack Curtice of Stanford, new president of the AFCA, said the free substitution proposal and nine other recommended rules changes would be submitted to the NCAA Rules Committee Friday in Miami, Fla.

Other Changes Asked
Curtice made no comment when asked if he supported free substitution. However, Charles (Rip) Engle of Penn State, outgoing president of the coaches group, said he feels college ball is "good just as it is now."

The coaches also will ask the rules committee to:

— Institute a "more efficient" method of recording substitutes.

— Legalize coaching from the sidelines.

— Permit the kicking team to down the ball at any place on the field. Present rules prohibit it inside the 10-yard line.

— Number players' jerseys consistently.

— Eliminate useless "piling on" to avoid injuries.

— Clarify the rule on touchbacks and safeties resulting from intercepted passes.

— Number officials' jerseys.

— Have officials designate against which player a penalty is called.

— Order member schools to adhere strictly to NCAA rules, eliminating the possibility of conflict in inter-sectional games.

Harney Leading LA Open

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—Crowd-favorite Paul Harney took a shaky one-stroke lead into what should be the wind-up round today of the sun-blessed \$45,000 Los Angeles Open golf tournament.

But with the field so tightly packed, no less than 15 men were in easy shooting distance of the slender, graying 31-year-old Worcester, Mass., pro's 207 score.

It was almost anyone's choice as to who would take home top prize. And then there's always the chance that the 35th annual event would end up in a tie for the fifth time.

Harney, the man with the sou'-easter accent and the deft putting touch, was just one stroke ahead of a fearsome threesome of Bob Rosburg, Palo Alto, Calif., Bob Goalby of Crystal River, Fla., and Lionel Hebert of Lafayette, La., at teoff time this morning.

Right back of that trio was another group at 209 — Bob Gajda, Bloomfield Hills, Ill., Billy Casper, Apple Valley, Calif., and sentimental home-town pick Tommy Jacobs of Arcadia, Calif.

Evidence of Harney's tenuous position was the finish of last year's LA Open. Eric Monti of Los Angeles was four strokes ahead going into the final round of the 72-hole event — only to blow sky-high and finish in a tie for seventh as Dow Finsterwald came from four behind to take the win.

Finsterwald was in a little less ominous position this year, having a three-round 213 — six strokes back of Harney. But the cautious toe-master from Tequesta, Fla., has done it before and could not be counted out.

East 14-7 Victor In Hula Bowl Tilt

HONOLULU (AP)—They voted Mike Ditka as the outstanding lineman in the East's 14-7 Hula Bowl victory over the West Sunday, but East Coach Joe Kuharich of Notre Dame rates the Pittsburgh All-America end much higher than that.

"Ditka proved that he is one of the great pro prospects of the current college seniors," Kuharich exclaimed after the upset before a crowd of 17,017.

"He can go either way. His punting was terrific and his defensive play was outstanding. I had to use him both ways when Mickey (Mangham of Louisiana State) was hurt early in the game."

Ditka caught an 11-yard touchdown pass from Georgia's Francis Tarkenton in the fourth quarter to provide the East's margin of victory. The West had led 7-6 going into the last period.

Tarkenton, who replaced Ohio State's Tom Matte in the second quarter, was voted the game's outstanding back. He threw a 10-yard paydirt pass to Kentucky's Cal Bird after an 80-yard drive in 11 plays in the second quarter.

Bird's kick for an extra point was no good and the East trailed 7-6. But Tarkenton threw to Tule's Tom Mason for a 2-point conversion.

Owl Hoots Set Meeting
The Owl Hoots, the Oregon Tech backers' association, will resume regular Monday meetings tonight at 8:30 in the Chuck Wagon Restaurant.

Basketball coach Wally Palmberg, whose team split with the powerful Portland State Vikings in the Oregon Collegiate Conference opener Friday and Saturday, will be on hand to give a first-hand account of the progress of his club.

Also expected to give a report is OTI wrestling coach George Miller whose squad begins competition on Jan 18.

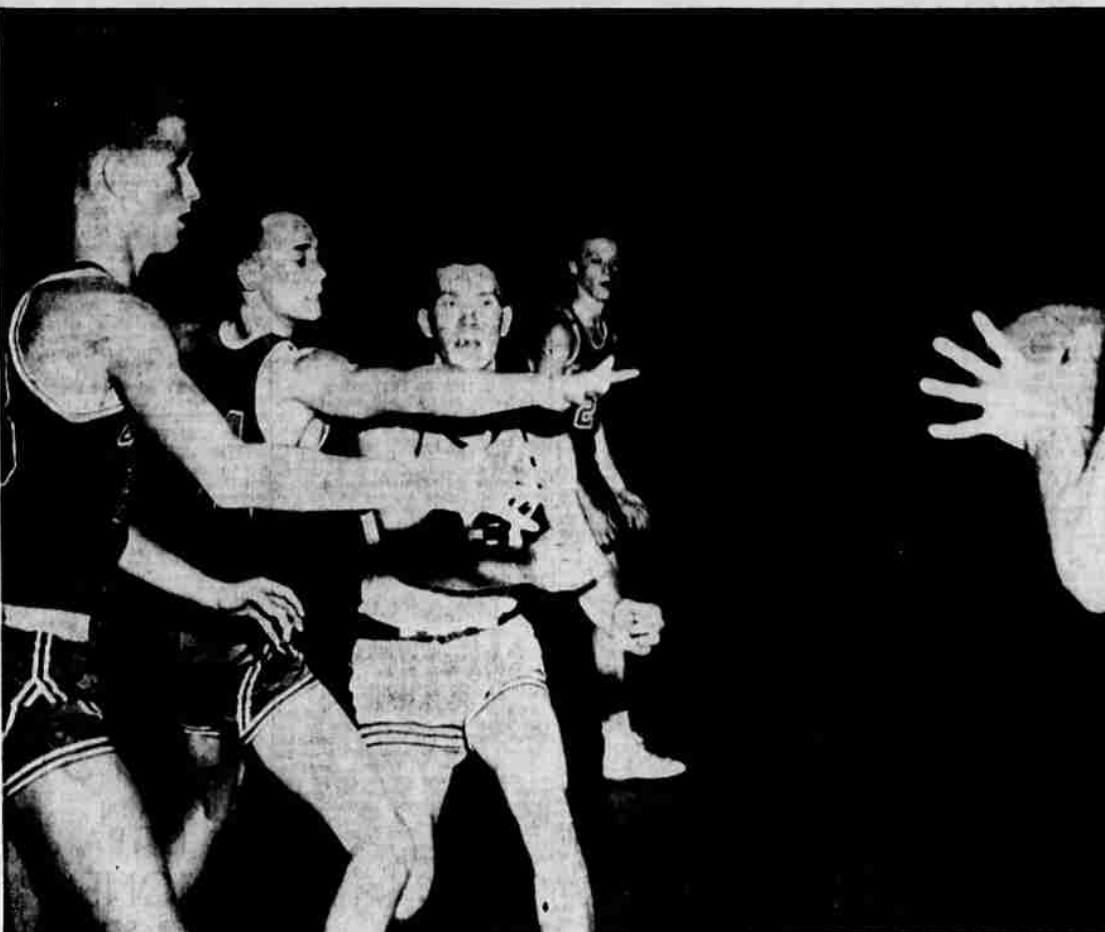
Pilots, Chiefs Mix Tonight

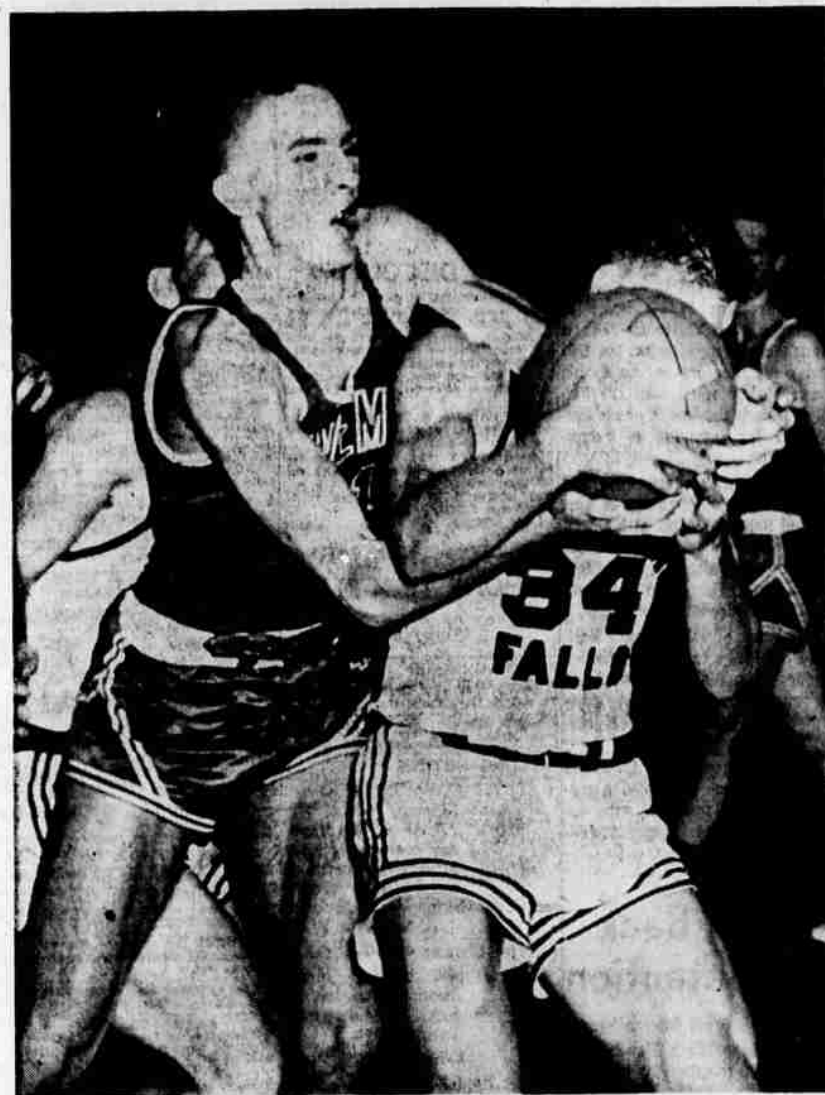
Next weekend Portland will travel to Spokane for a pair of games against Gonzaga.

Bob Pettit, a former National Basketball Association scoring champion, has a dozen reasons today to show why he rates top honors in the "guts" department, too.

Pettit, a patch covering the 12 stitches required to close a gash over his left eye sustained in the first half, helped the St. Louis Hawks to a 133-104 victory over the Boston Celtics Sunday that increased the Western Division leader's bulge to 8½ games over second place Cincinnati.

Boston maintained its 1½ game margin over Philadelphia in the Eastern sector as the New York Knickerbockers defeated the Warriors, 121-119. Syracuse topped Detroit, 138-115, in the only other NBA action.

Cliff Hagan, a former Celtic player, helped St. Louis to its runaway triumph over Boston with 37 points. Pettit tallied 19 points and grabbed 25 rebounds. He suffered his injury when hit by Tom Heinsohn's elbow during a melee at the Hawk foul line.

The Knicks won their third straight game by holding Wilt Chamberlain to 38 points, a substantial mark for the Warrior skyscraper who averaged 52 a game in his previous four outings against New York.

Heart Fails Schoolboy Rowe, Major League Pitching Great

EL DORADO, Ark. (AP)—him, was really 51. Schoolboy Rowe, the big, tough major league pitcher great of the 1930s, died Sunday night at his home here after suffering a heart attack.

Baseball records listed his age as 48, but his family said "Schoolboy" as the players used to call him previously had served as a

coach on the Tigers' staff and manager in the Detroit farm system.

Rowe was born in Waco, Tex., but grew up in El Dorado, and it was here he got the nickname Schoolboy. As a high school kid, he once pitched against and beat one of his teachers in a semi-pro game.

The headline in the El Dorado Daily News the next morning read, "Schoolboy beats teacher."

Rowe's 15 seasons in the majors saw him in one All-Star game (1936) and three World Series. His lifetime record in the big leagues was 138 victories, 101 defeats. His greatest year was 1934, when as a Tiger he won 24 games and lost 8. He was a 19-game winner in each of the next two seasons.

It looks like another tough week ahead for the underdog in college basketball what with such major powers as Ohio State, Bradley, St. Bonaventure and St. John's gaining momentum in their battle for top national honors.

All the top 10 teams won their games over the past weekend, most of them by overwhelming margins, and the evidence points to more of the same in the next few days.

Ohio State, No. 1 in the nation and boasting a 10-0 record, meets Evansville on Monday and Northwestern Saturday. Neither of these colleges are up to par this season and the Jerry Lucas-led Buckeyes don't figure on running into much trouble. Ohio State ripped Illinois, 91-65, last Saturday as Lucas scored 35 points.

Bonnies Meet Gannon
Second-ranked Bradley, off to a 12-0 start, also is heavily favored against both Houston and North Texas State this week. The Cougars have only a 7-8 record while

Missouri Valley Conference for North Texas State is a weak 1-9. Bradley is 4-0 in conference play, including a 76-66 decision over Tulsa Saturday.

St. Bonaventure has won 96 straight games on its home court and nothing short of a minor miracle will interfere with No. 97 against Gannon on Tuesday. The third-ranked Bonnies, who increased their record to 11-1 with an 89-78 victory over Duquesne Saturday, close the week with a contest against Niagara.

N. Carolina Edges Irish
St. John's scored a convincing 21-point victory over Temple last Friday and hopes to further solidify its No. 4 ranking in games with St. Joseph's and St. Francis (N.Y.) this week.

In other Saturday games involving the top 10, North Carolina squeaked past Notre Dame, 73-71. Louisville humbled Marquette, 84-63. Kansas State beat Oklahoma State, 69-58; UCLA topped Washington, 62-56; Iowa trounced Minnesota, 71-46; and Duke defeated North Carolina State, 81-67.
