Pelicans Maintain 1st Place

Klamath Falls, which ran its season record to 8-1 with easy victories over Grants Pass and Ashland last weekend, is ranked Oregon's top high school basketball team in the first Associated Press poll of the season.

It was voted No. 1 by 12 of the 15 sports writers and broadcasters who participated. The other three, who made South Eugene No. 1, ranked Klamath Falls second.

Roseburg, which split two early season games with Klamath, won No. 2 rating despite a 51-44 defeat by South Eugene Saturday. South Eugene was No. 3.

Defending state champion Medford was a solid choice for fourth after strengthening its prestige with a lopsided victory over Grants Pass.

Next, ranked 5-6, are Grant and Wilson, undefeated at the top of the Portland city league.

Beaverton, despite a loss to David Douglas that dropped it from a first place tie in the Metropolitan League, was ranked No. 7.

Rounding out the top ten are Bend, Corvallis and La Grande, in that order.

La Grande, 10-0, has the best record of the ten, but Intermountain League teams have not fared well in recent state tournaments, which may account for its comparatively low ranking.

Getting most support among the also-rans were David Douglas and North Bend, which shaded Marshfield in overtime last Saturday.

KUHS, Oregon Tech Fives Test 'Toughies' On Weekend

Wildcats Defeated By V'Bilt

Vanderbilt's unbeaten Commodores, Hoosier-coached and Kentucky and Indiana fed, have sailed into college basketball's elite under a fast-spreading Southeastern Conference formula: If you can't beat 'em, get 'em to come and join up!

The Commodores of Bob Polk, packed with talent from Polk's home grounds of Indiana and bordering Kentucky, shot their winning streak to 11-0 and their season record to 11-0 Monday night at Nashville with a 64-62 victory over Adolph Rupp's Kentucky Wildcats.

Bill Depp, a 6-7 senior from Edinburg, Ind., Don Ringstaff, a 6-2 sophomore from Smithland, Ky., and Larry Banks, a 6-6 senior from Jeffersonville, Ind., were the big men in the feature of a national program in which top-ranked Ohio State whipped Evansville 86-59 without Jerry Lucas, sixth-ranked Iowa rallied to beat Wisconsin, 76-68, and pesky Drake spilled KU, 45-44.

Ohio State won its 11th of the season and 16th over a two-year span although All-America Lucas took the night off because of a twisted knee suffered against Illinois last Saturday. Larry Siegfried, with 21 points, and John Havlicek with 19 and Mel Newell with 1 more then took up the slack for big Luke Siegfried, with 7 straight free throws, now has hit 23 in a row in his last three games.

Iowa (10-1) ran its winning streak to eight with a 15-6 burst in the closing minutes after Wisconsin, 10 behind at the half, had taken a 62-61 lead. The Hawks did it without late help from Frank Allen, who scored 24 points and Don Nelson, who hit for 20. Allen fouled out and Nelson had to leave with a sprained foot and a deep head gash.

Drake nailed its 10th victory in 11 starts by building a 9-point lead and holding off a late St. Louis rally.

Sophomore Rod Thorn had 26 points as West Virginia (9-2) scored its seventh straight, 94-74 over Syracuse; Walt Bellamy's 24 points led Indiana to a 79-55 triumph over Michigan State; clutch overtime baskets by Al Roots and Bill Bowers enabled Nebraska to nip Colorado 65-61; and Virginia Tech won its fourth straight Southern Conference test, 77-72 over Furman.

Auburn, its 15-game win streak snapped Saturday started a new one 51-40 over Mississippi. Georgia, with Al Johnson scoring 27 points, beat LSU 80-66 and Florida topped Tulane 83-79 in other SEC games.

Bill Bridges' 20 points and 18 by Wayne Hightower triggered Kansas' 73-68 triumph over Oklahoma State and St. Joseph's (Pa) continued unbeaten in the Middle Atlantic Conference with an 84-56 rout of Delaware but lost top scorer Jack Egan with an injured knee.

Bratlio Baeza led stakes winning jockeys during the 1960 racing season in Chicago. He captured five stakes.

Tar Heels, Arizona Await NCAA Ruling

PITTSBURGH (UPI) — The 18-member ruling committee of the National Collegiate Athletic Association passes judgment today on the universities of North Carolina and Arizona which allegedly violated recruiting regulations.

Representatives of both schools presented their case Monday before the committee. It was the second time the Tar Heels had stated their facts. A four-man delegation headed by Chancellor William B. Aycock met with the committee behind closed doors for two hours and 20 minutes Sunday.

The governing body lifted a two year suspension against Southern Cal and a one-year penalty against Tulsa. A few hours later Oklahoma's "indefinite" probation was ended.

The Sooners were penalized last year because of alleged illegal recruiting methods before the 1953-54 season. It was charged that improper use of funds had been used for recruiting purposes. Arthur L. Wood, Oklahoma City accountant, was identified as the operator of the funds and the NCAA had asked for records of the money.

Wood said at the time he was unable to open the books for inspection because of the internal revenue code, pointing out that portions of the funds were investments for private clients.

Council Gets Report
However, NCAA Executive Director Walter Byers said the council was given a report of the fund and decided no students now in school had been involved in illegal recruiting. It was not disclosed how a copy of the report had been obtained.

Meanwhile, discussion will resume today on amendments proposed by a special committee on financial aid and endorsed by the NCAA. The report was submitted Monday. The amendments come up for adoption at the final session of the convention Wednesday.

An amendment governing "pre-registration" of student athletes drew widespread attention. This amendment was proposed to eliminate or at least limit spirited competition for high school athletes. 35th annual convention Mon-

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Bulletin

PITTSBURGH (AP) — The University of North Carolina was placed on probation for one year today and ruled ineligible for the National Collegiate basketball championships.

The National Collegiate Athletic Association imposed the same penalty on Loyola of New Orleans and slapped Arizona with a one-year probation without additional sanctions.

The Tar Heels had been under investigation since 1957 when it was alleged they had illegally recruited basketball players from Brooklyn St. John's.

Frank McGuire, who coached at St. John's before taking over the Tar Heels in 1952, denied wrongdoing.

School Pleads Innocent
"We're innocent of doing anything out of the way," he said. "That's why we're here — to prove it."

A formal decision was expected to be announced by mid-morning. Shortly after the NCAA opened its 35th annual convention Mon-

day the council acted on recruiting probations affecting Oklahoma, Southern California and Tulsa.

1960 'Big 5' Champions Face Stanford Indian Quint

The Bears lost two games to Southern California in their first two starts and a third home loss would spell the end of their hopes for a third straight crown.

Stanford has not played a Big Five game as yet, but does not figure to beat the Bears at Berkeley on the basis of their 3-6 season record. However, the Cards can match the Bears in height this year and have looked especially strong in their most recent outings.

At Los Angeles, Pepperdine

faces Loyola in a West Coast Athletic Conference game. Pepperdine seems destined not to go very far this year in WCAC play despite their newly discovered soph sensation, Noel Smith. However, Loyola (1-1) is a definite threat to the likes of USF, St. Mary's and Santa Clara, and needs a win tonight.

Pilots Shot Down
In action Monday night, Seattle won a big one from Portland at the Pilots' home base. The Chieftains converted hot free-throw shooting into a 71-64 win. Seattle hit 23 of 27 from the charity stripe while Portland could only sink 18 of 34.

It was Seattle's eighth win in 12 starts and Portland's fifth loss in 13 games. Soph Eddie Miles hit 23 to lead the winners, while Bill Garner had 17 for the Pilots.

Seattle, rolling now after a slow start, is eligible for post-season play after two years probation by the NCAA. A few more big wins in the home gyms of their Northwest independent rivals will land the Chieftains in post-season action somewhere.

Points Aplenty
Records fell like tenpins at Tempe Monday night, Arizona State's stubby Larry Anderson, one of the coast's best, hit 37 points as ASU defeated Texas Western 119-103. Ollie Payne helped out with 33 markers.

Texas Western's Al Tolton tossed in 38 in the losing cause. Armstrong was named Most Valuable Player at the Far West Classic at Portland last month and has led his team to a 9-4 record which finds them undefeated at home.

Sacramento State won another Far Western Conference game with a 60-55 win over inept Humboldt State, which is almost as weak in basketball as it was solid in football this year. John Dille and Ron Rohrer tossed in 19 each for the Hornets.

Arizona was flattened by the perennial terror of the Border Conference, New Mexico State. Score was 89-64.

In other action tonight UOP meets San Francisco State. For the uninitiated, UOP is College of Pacific now that it has become a university.

KF Legion Plans Made

A new secretary was elected to office and a decision to lower the cost of sponsorship was made when members of the Klamath Falls American Legion Baseball commission met Sunday night.

The group regrettably accepted the resignation of Fred Lawson, secretary, who stepped down because of ill health, and elected Jim Johnson, athletic director at Klamath Union High School, to take over in his place.

Among the other business considered by the group, it was decided to lower the cost of sponsorship of team players from \$150 to \$100 each. The money is used to defray the cost of uniforms, equipment and other items of expense necessary to the successful operation of the club.

The officers elected to lead the Legion during the coming season are Fred Floetke, commissioner, Harold Howard, team manager and vice-commissioner, and Elman Davis, treasurer, and Johnson.

Ohio State Unanimous Poll Pick

Mighty Ohio State, continuing to roll over its rivals with monotonous ease, was the unanimous choice again today for the third straight week as the nation's No. 1 college basketball team in the weekly Associated Press poll.

The unbeaten Buckeyes, who made Illinois its 10th straight victim, 91-65, last week, gobbled up all 36 votes from the nationwide panel of sports writers and sportscasters to retain easily the top spot it took over in the first balloting five weeks ago.

Goalby Luck, Putter Worth \$7500 At LA

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Bob Goalby, once a reserve quarterback but now a first string golfer, today had "lots of luck," a new putter and Arnold Palmer to thank for his biggest win yet — \$7,500 top prize in the \$45,000 Los Angeles Open.

He captured the big loot Monday in a stirring head-to-head stretch drive with crowd favorite Paul Harney — the leader at the halfway mark and going into the final 18.

Goalby broke the slender, gray-wigged Worcester, Mass., pro with a sensational birdie on the 12th. From there on in, he played it cool and careful to make it a waltz, increasing his winning margin to three strokes.

He listed his three charms thusly:

Must Put Well
— "You've got to have more than a little luck to win. I had mine."
— "You never win anything unless you putt well. I used a new putter for my last two tournaments and won them both."
— "When Arnold Palmer shot his 12 (the U.S. Open champion had a 12 on the final hole of his

Goalby, who plans to play in the San Diego Open this coming weekend "and just about every tournament I'm eligible for this year," wrapped the tournament on the par-three, 229-yard 12. He belted a tee shot 25 feet short of the hole. Then with a bold putt, he rammed it home — the ball hit the top of the cup, bounced a foot high in the air and dropped squarely in.

Nursed Stiff Neck
Harney, who has been nursing a stiff neck throughout the tournament, had his downfall on the same hole. He started the day one stroke ahead of the pack and had predicted it would take a "68 on my part to win." He made the turn at the front nine all even with Goalby. But he missed the green with his tee shot on the 12th, clipped up short, and missed a 20-foot putt to fall two strokes off the pace. This shook him so much he later picked up another bogey and finished in a tie for fourth.
