

Lady Golf Pros Get Big Chance

PALM BEACH, Fla. (UPI)—The lady golf pros long have contended that aside from driving and long wood play they can match the men stars and plans are underway today to give them a chance to prove all this loose talk.

What makes this possible is a "long iron" course opened here today which is different from most any other fairway test extant. It's somewhere between a regulation course and the liltability par three courses which have sprung up all over the nation.

Mike Phipps, the former eight goal polo player who bosses the joint, has lined up six top lady and a half dozen top men pros for a \$10,000 54-hole tournament Feb. 14-15.

"This should settle something," grins Phipps. "I don't know what, exactly, but it should be fun, anyhow."

Course Is Killer

It'll be fun for the players who are expected to include Betsy Rawls, Mickey Wright, Louise Suggs, Arnold Palmer, Doug Finsterwald and Sam Snead. Because this little course is a killer when the wind whips in off the ocean and keens over the half-mile wide layout to tear on across Lake Worth.

Five holes border the ocean and three others are located along Lake Worth. But that isn't what makes this course so unusual. What does separate this 27-acre layout from the "lilt" par threes is that six of its holes are

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longer than 170 yards and two are more than 200 yards, the longest being 212 yards.

And, while there are large, county-club type greens, the task of scoring a string of par threes is complicated more than somewhat by the 55 traps sprinkled liberally through the palm trees.

Men's Par-54

Men's par for the 2,688-yard course is 27-54 while the lady of the house gets the best of it, as usual. Four of the holes which are better than 180 yards are rated as par fours for the women, giving them a par of 28-58 at which to shoot.

The lady pros, however, will have to aim at the par 54 standard when they step up on the tee to match shots with the men in the inaugural "long iron" tournament next month. This test, incidentally, will be a 54-hole affair with 18 holes on the first day and 36 holes on the second day.

Two of the rules on this ocean-side course are of particular interest to golfers. A ball on the beach may be played from the beach without penalty or dropped back onto the fairway with a one stroke penalty. Balls landing in a crab hole may be lifted without penalty.

Intriguing Finish

How far ahead, how even or how far behind the best lady pros finish in this unusual tournament will be intriguing. Marilyn Smith, one of the top gal golf stars, long has contended that if you take away the long shots the ladies could play the men to a standstill.

There is a different psychological approach notable, however. "The par threes are the key to any tournament because all the men hit the ball far and it's the short game that counts," Snead observed recently. "Any time I play the par threes under par I figure I've got a chance to win the tournament."

"Any time I play the threes in par, I figure I have a chance," says Barbara Romack of women's tournament play.

This time it'll be all par threes with a lot of real tough ones thrown in. And that clamor you hear in the background is just a whisper of the noise that will be created if the girls make good their boast and bury the men on those big, beautiful greens.

Rematch OK Says Champ After Victory

PARIS (UPI) — Davey Moore, the world featherweight champion, indicated today he was willing to give France's Gracieux Lamperti a title shot later this year — either in France or the United States.

The Springfield, Ohio, brawler survived a sixth-round knockdown in punching his way to a disputed decision over Lamperti in a 10-round non-title bout Monday night before a capacity crowd of 6,000 at the New Palais des Sports.

"I will fight him (Lamperti) again with pleasure," said Moore. "He is a very good boy."

Willie Ketchum, Moore's manager, agreed that Lamperti "is a good fighter."

"After this fight," Ketchum added, "we are ready to give Lamperti a return bout — this time for the world title, either in the states or in France. But we want a lot of money for a title bout."

Monday night's bout originally was scheduled as a title scrap but when the promoters declined to post Moore's requested guarantee it was reduced from 15 rounds to a 10-round non-title fight.

Moore, who sealed 127 pounds to Lamperti's 129, floored the Frenchman for a nine-count in the third round with a powerful left hook to the head. Lamperti, however, recovered quickly and retaliated by dropping Moore with a similar left hook in the sixth.

The champion, obviously surprised by the blow, regained his feet at the count of three. He boxed more cautiously during the remaining rounds and piled up enough points to gain the decision.

HONOLULU (UPI) — After months of negotiation and bickering, it looked as though this city might finally get a professional baseball team today.

Nick Morgan Jr. of Salt Lake City, owner of the proposed Pacific Coast League club, said Monday that he expected the final decision to bring a franchise here would be made today.

The prime factor holding back the final decision for a Honolulu franchise has been the negotiations for use of the local stadium. Morgan said he had drafted a contract for use of the stadium with Chin Ho, president of the stadium corporation.

League president Dewey Soriano and Morgan's assistant, Robert Hatfield, arrived Monday to help prepare the way for the new club.

Morgan said he had picked a general manager, but declined to disclose his choice until the club was certain to be playing here this season. Walker Cooper, one time National League catching great, and Ralph Kiner, former Pittsburgh Pirate slugger, have been rumored as possible choices.

Unstoppable Warrior Ace Lead Scorer

NEW YORK (AP) — Unstoppable Wilt (The Stilt) Chamberlain of the Philadelphia Warriors has reached the halfway mark of the National Basketball Association season scoring at a pace well ahead of the one that carried him to a record last year.

Figures from the NBA today showed Chamberlain with 1,481 points in 39 games for a 38.0 average. In his rookie year last season, the 7-foot-11 Warrior ace established eight records—among them total points (2,707) and per game average (37.6). His current pace would enable him to top last year's total by more than 300 points.

Wilt, averaging 49 points in his last five games, edged ahead of Los Angeles' Elgin Baylor in total points although he has played three fewer games than Baylor. In 42 games, Baylor has scored 1,444 points for a 34.4 average.

Cincinnati rookie Oscar Robertson is the only other pro averaging over 30 points a game. Big O has 1,329 points in 43 games, a 30.9 pace, and continues to lead in assists with 402, a 9.3 per game average. Oscar also is challenging Chamberlain in field goal accuracy. Chamberlain has hit 489 per cent on 617 of 1,285 shots. Robertson has hit 466 of 973 for a 47.9 percentage.

Clyde Lovellette of St. Louis is the free throw percentage leader with 133 of 150 for 88 per cent, and Chamberlain leads in rebounds with a 27.9 per game bag compared to 23.6 for Boston's Bill Russell.

Griffith's Club Nicked

MINNEAPOLIS-ST. PAUL (AP) — Calvin Griffith's Minnesota Twins are shelling out \$540,000 to the American Association for their takeover of the Minneapolis-St. Paul territory.

Griffith was nicked for just about what he stands to make in television rights for his first year of operation away from Washington.

Not everybody in the association agrees the figure is high enough.

Board Chairman Frank McKinney of Indianapolis said his club voted against it as too small. He pointed to the total \$900,000 in indemnity the Pacific Coast received three years ago when the Dodgers and Giants moved West. Each reportedly paid \$450,000.

The settlement was reached Monday in an exchange of telegrams between Griffith here and association directors meeting in Denver.



TIME OUT!

Portland — The "Cinderella Man" of American track and field, Otis Davis of the Emerald Empire AA, makes his first appearance since winning two gold medals at the 1960 Olympic Games in Rome when he races in the featured 500-yard dash at the Memorial Coliseum next Saturday night in the Oregon Invitational Indoor meet.

Davis, who set a fantastic world record in the 400 meters at Rome when he won a photo finish decision in 44.9 seconds, will face a tough field as he opens his competition for the 1961 season.

Both are capable of threatening the world mark held by Lou Jenkins in the 500, and if Davis' brilliant finishing kick doesn't come close to wiping out the Villanova runner's world record, then Southern's overall power may turn the trick.

LOS ANGELES (AP) — It wasn't long ago that Leo Durocher was saying there was a conspiracy among owners to keep him out of baseball.

Today he is back in the game — as a coach of the Los Angeles Dodgers, but under warning from General Manager Buzzie Bavasi that under no circumstances is he to second-guess Dodger Manager Walt Alton.

Durocher spoke his lines very well at Monday's news conference. Asked if he considered his new coaching job a stepping stone to another major league managerial post, the Lip, 54, told reporters: "I'm not looking for anything."

Ingo Claims He'll Dump The Champ

GOTEBORG, Sweden (AP) — In general Johansson flatly predicted today he would win back the world heavyweight championship when he meets Floyd Patterson for the third time.

"This fight I will win," said Ingo before heading for his Geneva training camp. "I know what mistakes I made the last time. And I know how to avoid them."

"I also learned a couple of other things from the movies that will help me win."

Johansson, who was knocked out by Patterson in the fifth round of their last title fight, will spend a week in Geneva working before heading for New York on Jan. 16.

He already is in serious training and has been doing seven miles a day in road work and has been boxing almost 20 rounds a day.

Chieftains Belt Pilots

PORTLAND (AP) — Seattle made it two straight over Portland and became the leading major independent college basketball team in the Pacific Northwest with a 71-64 victory Monday night.

Portland trailed at the half 36-31, but rallied to tie the score at 38-38 with six minutes to go.

Then Eddie Miles and Dave Mills, the leaders of Seattle's big front line, took over, scoring 10 of the 13 points Seattle got thereafter.

Miles emerged as the game's high scorer with 23 points. Bill Garner led Portland with 17.

Seattle, which downed Portland last week at Seattle 69-67, now has an 8-4 record. Portland's is 8-5.

Barrow KO Ring Winner

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Kirk Barrow jabbed a straight right and then slugged Sixto Rodriguez with a left hook Monday night to win a light heavyweight scrap.

Sixto dropped twice under the blows at the end of the fourth and came out wobbling in the fifth. After 12 seconds, Referee Jack Silver stopped the bout.

Barrow, of Spokane, Wash., weighed 180. Rodriguez, of San Anselmo, Calif., weighed 173.

It was the second time the Spokane brawler whipped Rodriguez, but Barrow went into Monday night's fight a 10-7 underdog.

OSC To Miss Denver Club

CORVALLIS (AP) — Oregon State College has empty dates in its 1961 and 1962 football schedules because Denver University is dropping the sport as too expensive.

OSC was to have played at Denver next Nov. 18 and to have been host in a return game Nov. 17, 1962. Athletic Director R. S. (Spee) Keene is expected to fill the dates.

USFWB Picks New Director

PORTLAND (AP) — The new regional director of the U.S. Fisheries and Wildlife Bureau here is Paul T. Quick, who has been head of the bureau's wildlife division in Washington, D.C.

He fills the position vacated by the retirement of Leo Laythe after 42 years of government service.

Husky Back Files Charge In Seattle

SEATTLE (AP) — An investigator on the State Board Against Discrimination said Monday his agency would ask the 1961 Legislature to amend present state laws involving cases of housing discrimination.

Investigator Glen Mansfield said the board does not have the authority to check on incidents of discrimination at privately-owned apartment houses of more than five units.

A complaint filed by a University of Washington Negro football player, fullback Joe Jones, touched off the investigator's revelations.
